SUMMARY DESCRIPTION

Lyon Village is a cohesive residential neighborhood in northern Arlington County, Virginia, located immediately north of the Clarendon Commercial District and roughly nestled between Wilson Boulevard to the south and Lee Highway to the north. These major thoroughfares both provide access to commercial and employment centers in the surrounding county and nearby Washington, D.C. The neighborhood extends east to North Veitch Street and westward to North Kirkwood Road. This eastern border provides direct access to the county courthouse and governmental center at Courthouse Square. The first portion of the neighborhood to be platted as Lyon Village was landscaped with tree-lined streets, traffic circles, and an intricate system of curvilinear roads that complemented the less-than-one-acre housing lots. This section of Lyon Village was platted in 1923 by Frank Lyon, who purchased the property from Robert Cruit's heirs. Aurora Heights and portions of Clarendon now fall within the current boundaries of Lyon Village and contain residential buildings constructed prior to Lyon's purchase of the Cruit property. Further, Lyon Village was further enlarged by the platting of adjacent blocks with a more grid-like street pattern from the 1930s to the 1950s. Consequently, the Lyon Village Historic District occupies approximately 191 acres, forty-three acres more than the original 148 acres platted by Frank Lyon in 1923.

Lyon Village is defined by a variety of 20th-century architectural styles and building types ranging from early-20th-century high style to vernacular interpretations of the elaborate styles traditionally erected

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decades earlier. Primarily, the domestic buildings in Lyon Village range from the 1880s to infill housing of the late 1990s. Building forms and styles extend from the imposing brick Colonial Revival-style dwelling to the smaller bungalow. Architectural styles presented in Lyon Village were often diluted, illustrating modest examples of Queen Anne, Colonial Revival, Craftsman, Tudor Revival, Classical Revival and Spanish Mission Revival styles. The community is primarily made up of single-family dwellings, supported along the borders by multiple-family apartment buildings, a landscaped park and community building, churches, and commercial buildings (which are not included in the historic district). Many of the properties include freestanding or attached garages and sheds. The buildings, particularly the single-family dwellings, are buffered from the public streets by sidewalks and grassy medians.

DETAILED DESCRIPTION

Development Prior to the Platting of Lyon Village (1846-1922)

Lyon Village was originally a portion of the 163-acre parcel of land purchased by Robert Cruit in 1846 as a retreat from his Washington City home. The dwelling that now bears his name still stands as an early remnant of 19th-century architecture in the early-20th-century suburban subdivision of Lyon Village. Located at 1614 North Highland Street, the dwelling was constructed circa 1846, prior to Cruit's purchase of the property. The imposing building now reflects high-style elements of the Greek Revival style, which is believed to have been the result of alterations. The house has a square form with a steeply pitched front gable roof. The main entry is recessed deeply within the plane of the wall. The overhang of its asphalt shingle-clad roof presents a boxed cornice that has been encased in vinyl. Historic photographs indicate a molded frieze and raked cornice once edged the enclosed tympanum of the front gable. In the 1920s, Frank Lyon altered the dwelling by constructing a front gable portico, which is composed of two sets of three Ionic columns supporting a wide Roman entablature. Additional alterations in the latter part of the 20th century have resulted in a new foundation of poured concrete and vinyl siding on the wood frame structure.

Although the Cruit Farmhouse is the earliest extant building in Lyon Village, other domestic buildings remain from the period before Lyon Village was platted, particularly in the neighborhoods of Aurora

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Heights and Clarendon. Many of these buildings feature elements of the Queen Anne style of architecture, albeit diluted in many instances. One of the most imposing, and oldest, examples of the Queen Anne style noted in Lyon Village is the dwelling at 1400 North Jackson Street (1885-1900). This building is the only 19th-century Queen Anne-style building remaining in Lyon Village. It exhibits one of the more prevalent forms documented within many of the Queen Anne-style residential neighborhoods of Arlington County: an irregular plan with a T-shaped form augmented by a wrap-around porch. The wood frame building is clad with narrow vinyl siding mimicking weatherboard. The porch, set upon masonry piers, has a half-hipped roof ornamented with turned posts, scroll-sawn brackets, and square balusters. The building displays projecting gables with fishscale wood shingles, cornice returns, bed molding, corner boards, single and paired 2/2 double-hung, wood sash windows, and a hipped roof sheathed with standing seam metal.

As the Queen Anne style continued during the 20th century, the irregular forms of the buildings were generally retained. In Lyon Village, these buildings often drew their influence from neighboring communities that had been established at the turn of the 20th century, such as Cherrydale (1893) and Maywood (1909). Examples include houses at 1314 North Jackson Street and 1414 North Jackson Street, constructed in 1906 and 1905 respectively. Both examples have cross-gabled roofs with projecting front gables, corbeled brick chimneys, and wrapping porches. The now-enclosed porch at 1314 North Jackson Street has scroll-sawn brackets and turned posts, while the fashionable influence of the Colonial Revival style is evidenced by the Tuscan columns at 1414 North Jackson Street. The dilution of the Queen Anne style as the 20th century progressed is further accentuated at the latter property, which lacks many of the applied details indicative of the style.

By the second quarter of the 20th century, the irregular form commonly associated with the Queen Anne style was lost in favor of the rectangular box. The front-gabled form, complete with full-width or wrapping porch, displayed turned posts, cornice detailing, and window configurations of the Queen Anne style. However, these dwellings – 1313 North Herndon Street (1920) and 1409 North Hudson Street (1900) for example – show the dilution of the applied detailing in an effort to provide more economical housing on narrow lots.

The area originally known as Aurora Heights was partially developed in 1906, seventeen years prior to the

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platting of Lyon Village. Therefore, there are some dwellings along North Veitch, North Wayne, North Adams, North Barton, and North Bryan Streets that were constructed prior to 1923 and currently fall within the Lyon Village community. In general, many of the dwellings in this section of the community are small, wood frame bungalows. The bungalow mimicked the plan and massing traditionally associated with the fashionable Queen Anne style; yet, the bungalow form was invariably one to one-and-a-half stories in height, rather than two to two-and-a-half stories. Although considered an architectural style, the bungalow is actually a form that is typically covered by a low-pitched, intersecting gable roof that encompassed the often-wrapping porch.

The modest bungalow erected throughout Lyon Village and Aurora Heights during the early 20th century was often trimmed with stone and brick, half-timbering, exposed rafter ends, multi-light fixed windows, and massive porch supports, thus, melding the bungalow form with the Craftsman style perpetually. This is illustrated on the modest bungalow at 1706 North Adams Street. Constructed in 1915, the wood frame dwelling is set on a rock-faced concrete block foundation and has an inset front porch set under the continuous roofline. Typical of the Craftsman style, tapered columns set atop concrete block piers support the three-bay-wide porch. Other notable examples of the bungalow form in Lyon Village include 1711 North Barton Street (1919), 1626 North Adams Street (1914), and 2530 North 18th Street (1920).

The Craftsman style was also applied to other building forms, particularly the American foursquare. The term foursquare is often used in reference to an architectural style, yet it means a particular house form – just as bungalows and cabins are forms rather than styles. The two-story, four-room-per-floor house plan without a hall is a much-used concept that refers to the hall/parlor plan of the 18th century. One of the earlier foursquares that represents the construction in Aurora Heights during the first quarter of the 20th century is at 1714 North Bryan Street. Constructed in 1908, the wood frame dwelling rises two-and-a-half stories in height with a hipped roof and a hipped dormer. Craftsman-style detailing is seen on the full-width front porch, which is supported by tripled columns atop stone piers. Other illustrations of Craftsman-style foursquares in Lyon Village and Aurora Heights include 1723 North Bryan Street (1920), 2311 North 18th Street (1922), and 1706 North Bryan Street (1910).

In addition to the early domestic buildings in Lyon Village, religious edifices were also constructed prior to the platting of the community. Most notable is the First Baptist Church of Clarendon that is located at

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1210 North Highland Street in the Clarendon section of Lyon Village. Constructed in 1913, the building is sited on a triangular lot at the intersection of North Highland, North 13th, and North Hartford Streets. The two-story structure is built of brick laid in six-course Flemish bond and features an imposing temple front. The limestone detailing of the watertable, entablature, tympanum, and Tuscan columns contrasts the red brick of the structure. Colonial Revival in style, the building features enclosed pediments, round windows, and a steeple with square lantern of brick and conical spire of wood frame.

Development of Lyon Village (1923-1950)

The first section of Lyon Village to be developed was the area to the east of North Highland Street. This section of the neighborhood was largely developed in the 1920s with wood frame and brick-faced dwellings. The larger brick houses that help define the neighborhood came a little later with development to the west of North Highland Street. Overall, the dwellings throughout Lyon Village largely represent the Colonial Revival style and the Craftsman bungalow, with some examples of the Tudor Revival, Mission, and Classical Revival styles of architecture noted. The domestic buildings from this period ranged from more imposing two-and-a-half-story brick dwellings to one- to one-and-a-half-story bungalows and three-story garden apartment buildings.

Following the heels of America's Centennial celebrations in 1876, the Colonial Revival style emerged again in the early 1880s. The style, which borrowed heavily from early American architecture—particularly Georgian and Federal buildings—was largely an outgrowth of a nationwide pride in the past and a rapidly growing interest in historic preservation. In the early phase, the Colonial Revival style remained the exclusive domain of fashionable architectural firms and was favored for the large residences of wealthy clients. In general, as the style spread to the suburbs and increased in popularity, the detailing and form became increasingly more modest. The stylistic impression presented in the first years of development in Lyon Village epitomizes the suburban expression of the Colonial Revival, and the closely related Dutch Colonial Revival style.

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Commonly found features of the Colonial Revival style in Lyon Village include accentuated main entry doors, symmetrically balanced facades, single and paired double-hung wood sash windows, and side gable or hipped roofs. A good example of the larger-scale residential buildings illustrating the Colonial Revival style is the two-story dwelling at 1812 North Hartford Street. Constructed in 1939, the brick-clad building has a central entry marked by an oversized Colonial Revival surround. This wood frame surround has wide Tuscan pilasters, a wide entablature with decorative molding, and a broken semi-circular pediment with urn. Characteristic of the style, the main entry has sidelights with tracery and a six-paneled wood door. The entry is flanked by 6/6 double-hung, wood sash windows with wood sills and flat-arched brick lintels. A shallow boxed cornice accentuates the dominating side-gable roof with a wide frieze marked by modillions. Neighboring examples of the Colonial Revival style in the more imposing single-family dwellings in Lyon Village include: 3175 North 21st Street (1934-1938); 1815 North Hartford Street (1939); and 1804 North Harvard Street (1936), to name a few.

Between 1933 and 1940, developer Frederick E. Westenberger erected a substantial number of Colonial Revival-style brick dwellings in Lyon Village. In the 1930s, Westenberger purchased a parcel of land at North Hartford and North 18th Streets from Frank Lyon, and subsequently built twenty-three Colonial Revival-style houses on the land including the dwellings at: 1800, 1806, 1812, and 1900 N. Hancock Street; 1800, 1820, 1826, 1831, 1834, 1837, and 1842 N. Hartford Street; 1805 and 1806 N. Harvard Street; 1831 and 1839 N. Herndon Street; 1504 N. Jackson Street; 2616 and 2715 Key Boulevard; 3164 N. 17th Street; 3131 and 3134 N. 18th Street; 3176 N. 20th Street; and 3156 N. 21st Street. Constructed in 1940, the dwelling at 1800 North Hancock Street is three bays wide with flanking one-story side wings that include a side porch and an attached garage. Featuring seven-course Flemish bond construction, the house has a centered entry framed by sidelights and a front-gabled portico with a round-arched opening. The second story, now clad in aluminum siding, is slightly overhanging with acorn drops at the corners.

Westenberger's own house, constructed in 1938 at 1842 North Hartford Street, is the most imposing example of Colonial Revival-style houses the builder constructed in the neighborhood. Rising two-and-a-half stories in height, the Flemish-bond brick dwelling features one-story side wings, a denticulated cornice, a full-height elliptical portico with Tuscan columns, and a centered entry with sidelights and a fanlight. The first-story windows have inset wood panels beneath the sills and brick jack arch lintels. Three front gable dormers are detailed with round-arched, multi-light double-hung sash windows and

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cornice returns. In 2000, the building was substantially enlarged at the rear by an addition that follows the Colonial Revival style embraced by Westenberger in the second part of the 20th century.

Like the Queen Anne style, the Colonial Revival style was adapted to meet the middle-income housing needs of suburban Arlington County in the middle part of the 20th century. Consequently, the larger high-style suburban dwellings were frequently reduced to three-bay-wide rectangular structures with projecting porticos, returns, open pediments, and Tuscan columns. The dilution of the style was frequently seen on Dutch Colonial Revival-style houses as well. A prime example can be seen at 1548 North Edgewood Street, which is a mail-order kit house. Constructed in 1929, the house plan and design of this dwelling was produced by Sears, Roebuck and Company and was known as the Van Jean model. This dwelling features the typical side gambrel roof with three-bay-wide shed dormers. A front-gabled portico covers the centered entry and sidelights. According to the Sears, Roebuck and Company catalogue, the Van Jean model was available in 1928 and 1929 and ranged from \$2,499 to \$2,899. It featured seven rooms, one bath, a fireplace in the living room, French doors in the hall, and a dog-leg stair.

Kit houses were often purchased by a builder and the plans copied to construct other dwellings of the same design. As a result, it is often difficult to determine from the exterior which dwellings are actual kit houses or merely a copy of one of the models. Some examples of buildings believed to be kit houses are 1515 North Garfield Street (1939), 1617 North Garfield Street (1929), 2900 Franklin Road (1939), 1502 North Fillmore Street (1925), and 1422 North Fillmore Street (1924). Set on a brick foundation, the wood frame house at 1502 North Fillmore Street is three bays wide with vinyl siding. It features a Tuscan entry portico with a broken pediment and a wooden fanlight motif at the entry.

The one-and-a-half-story "Cape Cod" cottages of the 1930s and 1940s also exhibit the familiar detailing and form commonly associated with the Colonial Revival style. This form provided an adequate and affordable housing mode for the growing population of working- and middle-class residents of Arlington County, while mimicking the fashionable style of the period. Cape Cod buildings are typically constructed of brick with side gable roofs and front gable dormers. Those found in Lyon Village are typically three bays wide, two bays deep, and have a central-passage plan. Detailing includes the flat door surrounds with shallow Tuscan pilasters supporting a slightly projecting entablature, a corbeled brick cornice on the facade, and rectangular 6/6 double-hung, wood sash windows with brick sills. It was noted

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that in addition to the denticulated brick cornice, a carved panel was often applied over the main entry. As seen at 3194 North 18th Street, this wood panel is a continuation of the entry surround. The sides of the casing are continued upward, reading as Tuscan pilasters. The center of the panel has a sunburst motif framed by a trefoil design. Other examples of Cape Cod-style dwellings are 2511 North 16th Street (1935), 1810 North Bryan Street (1937), 1711 North Calvert Street (1939), and 1559 North Bryan Street (1934).

The Craftsman style and bungalow form, which had come into popularity after the turn of the 20th century, continued to be widely applied in the second quarter of the century. This is illustrated at 1313 North Hudson Street, which was constructed in 1925. Stylistic elements displayed include the rock-faced concrete block foundation, tapered Tuscan posts on masonry piers, full-width front porch, wide eaves, and paired window openings with six lights in the upper sash. Another prime example of a Craftsman-style bungalow can be seen at 2515 Custis Road. Constructed in 1925, the wood frame bungalow exhibits a full-width front porch that has an arched opening supported by massive, wood-shingle clad tapered piers. The side gable roof has wide, overhanging eaves, exposed rafter tails, and Craftsman-style cut-out brackets. As the popularity of the form was heightened, the bungalow form of Arlington County was equally embellished with Queen Anne, Craftsman, and Colonial Revival detailing. Other examples of bungalows in the area can be seen at 1713 North Bryan Street (1924), 2531 North 18th Street (1929), and 1806 North Calvert Street (1926).

Similarly, the American foursquare continued to be a popular and economical building form for residents of Lyon Village. One illustration of the American foursquare from the second quarter of the 20th century is the house at 1731 North Adams Street. This imposing freestanding dwelling was constructed in 1924, one year after the platting of Lyon Village. The Colonial Revival-style building has the characteristically distinguished two-story height, hipped roof with pronounced eaves and dormers that light an extra half-story, a large front porch, and the lack of ornate exterior ornament. The overall shape is a cube, and the main entry opening is located off-center. As stated earlier, the American foursquare was also detailed with Craftsman-style elements. The Craftsman influence can be seen on the dwelling at 1800 North Wayne Street. Constructed in 1924, the masonry foursquare has the typical form and hipped roof that are commonly associated with the form. The Craftsman-style detailing is evident in the use of panel-faced concrete block construction with rock-faced concrete block detailing at the foundation, windows, and

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corners. The roof features scroll-sawn exposed rafter tails and the half-hipped porch is supported by paired wood posts. Other examples of foursquares in Lyon Village are 1554 North Danville Street (1928), 1602 North Fillmore Street (1925), 1608 North Fillmore Street (1939), and 1605 North Danville Street (1934).

Lyon Village is also home to a substantial number of Tudor Revival-style dwellings. As with the Queen Anne and Colonial Revival styles, many of the Tudor Revival-style resources found in Lyon Village, and Arlington County as a whole, reflect the suburbanization of the style rather than the initial high-style expression. The distinguishing features in Lyon Village include multiple-gabled roofs, the placement of an exterior brick chimney on the façade, application of stone as an accenting material around openings or on chimneys, and steeply pitched front gables, sometimes detailed with half-timbering. Both wood frame and brick facing are found as cladding materials on these dwellings. One of the most high-style suburban examples of the Tudor Revival is the two-story dwelling at 2831 North Franklin Road. Constructed in 1927, this two-story brick-faced building has the emblematic front-end chimney with shoulders, front gable roof with flared eaves, soldier-coursed lintels, stone sills, and brick quoins. In addition, the masonry joints of the six-course American-bond bricks are beaded. Another high-style expression of the Tudor Revival style is the dwelling at 1622 North Highland Street. Constructed in 1929, this wood frame building is set on a parged brick foundation. It has stucco cladding and exposed brick nogging and half-timbering in the projecting bay. The dominating hipped roof is clad in slate shingles and has a wide overhang. The tripartite openings hold casement windows topped by fixed lights. The openings have wide half-timbered muntins with hand-hewn marks. The windows are exceptionally ornate with leaded tracery.

Modest examples of the Tudor Revival style are more prevalent in Lyon Village, with more than sixty examples noted. For example, the dwellings at 2515 and 2615 Franklin Road are both illustrations of the more modest Tudor Revival-style dwellings in Lyon Village. Constructed in 1944 and 1935, respectively, the brick dwellings are similar in design and form. Rising one-and-a-half stories in height, both feature stretcher-bond brick cladding, front-facing chimneys, projecting front gable bays with steeply pitched roofs, narrow openings above the entries, and narrow casement windows. Brick detailing on these houses includes rowlock sills, a corbeled cornice, and a soldier course stringcourse. Other examples of the Tudor

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Revival style are 1422 North Herndon Street (1930-1946), 1712 North Hartford Street (1938), 2510 North 16th Street (1935), and 1315 Kirkwood Road (1933).

Spanish-inspired houses began appearing at the turn of the 20th century in the form of the Mission style, which reflected a loose adaptation of features often found on Spanish Colonial Mission buildings. Typically asymmetrical in plan, the Mission-style buildings in Lyon Village are modest in size, generally one-and-a-half to two stories in height. The circa 1925 dwelling and associated garage at 1611 North Highland Street is one of the more high-style suburban examples of the Spanish Colonial Revival style in Lyon Village. This two-story dwelling, constructed of wood frame with a stucco finish, has a rectangular form. It has a projecting entry bay topped by a segmentally arched parapet. This bay also has a tripartite window with semi-circular-arched openings and second story wrought-iron balcony with an undersized opening that reads more like a niche than entry. Two floral medallions of plaster, that are set symmetrically over the casement windows, accent the entablature of the flat roof. The stylistic expression of the primary resource is accented by the freestanding garage, which is similarly detailed. The two-story garage is constructed of wood frame with a stucco finish. The entablature of the flat roof is pierced with clay-tile pipes that allow for drainage as well as provide ornamentation. The two garage openings hold cross-paneled wood doors. The second story has symmetrically placed 6/6 windows. Low stuccoed walls and ornate wrought-iron gates further accent the property. More modest examples of the Mission style can be seen at 3108 and 3112 Key Boulevard, to name a few. Similar in form and detailing, these two dwellings were constructed circa 1925. Each of the buildings is one story in height with arched openings, inset porches, and stucco finishes.

As development of Lyon Village neared the middle of the 20th century, multiple dwellings began to appear as an alternative to the single dwelling. These often took the form of the low-rise garden apartment. The complexes generally consist of three to five apartment buildings, the best example of which is the Lyon Village Apartments on Lee Highway. The buildings are positioned to create a landscaped interior courtyard connected by walkways. This three-building complex rises three stories in height with projecting Classical Revival-style entry pediments. Another example of a multiple dwelling is the McClaine Apartments at 2420 North 16th Street. Constructed between 1945 and 1955, the U-shaped apartment building was stylistically influenced by the Art Deco style of architecture. Featuring six-course Flemish-bond brick construction, the ten-bay-wide building rises three stories in height with a flat roof.

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The two main entrances, set at angles within the interior courtyard, have curved concrete hoods and glass block openings above them. The apartment building at 2500 Lee Highway (1936-1945) also features elements of the Art Deco style.

Other apartment buildings in the area are more modest in scale and design, reflecting the architectural trends of the mid-20th century. Primarily two or three stories in height, these modest apartment buildings generally feature gable roofs and brick construction. For instance, the multiple dwelling at 1832 North Veitch Street is two stories in height and features five-course Flemish-bond brick construction. Built between 1936 and 1950, the building is constructed of scored, oversized brick with paired and tripled windows with rowlock sills. Exhibiting a slight reference to the Colonial Revival style, the entry has a front-gabled portico and a transom. Additional examples of multiple dwellings can be seen at 2608 Lee Highway (1936-1950), 1315 North Irving Street (1950s), and 1319 North Irving Street (1950s).

By the middle of the 20th century, domestic buildings began to take on a smaller scale and more modest detailing, as reflective of the trends of the period. The lack of detailing on many of the houses, apartments, and commercial buildings countywide allowed for quick inexpensive construction using readily available materials. Many of these buildings are vernacular in nature and do not represent a particular architectural style. The most prevalent form was the L-shaped dwelling with a cut-away front porch. Typically, these buildings feature brick or stone façades. A number of houses constructed on North Jackson Street in 1953 are vernacular dwellings with six- and seven-course American-bond brick veneer on part of the façade and weatherboard or aluminum siding on the remaining section. Typically, these one-story houses have side gable roofs with asphalt shingles. Examples of these dwellings can be seen at 1812, 1816, 1817, 1820, and 1821 North Jackson Street.

Showing the influence of the automobile, another trend exhibited in these vernacular dwellings is the attached garage, which can be seen at 3211 North 19th Street, where the attached garage is set in the projecting gable bay and takes a place of prominence on the façade of the dwelling. Ninety-two houses throughout Lyon Village have attached garages. For the most part, these attached garages are set either in side wings or on the façade of the dwelling and have roll-up garage doors.

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In addition to those with attached garages, many of the dwellings within Lyon Village have freestanding garages and sheds. These structures were typically built of wood frame or brick, depending on the construction material of the main dwelling. By the 1920s, the main dwelling house and the garage were being erected simultaneously. Traditionally, garages of this period mimicked the architectural style and detailing exhibited on the dwelling. This was particularly true in regard to building materials, roof form, and building plan. One illustration of this harmony is seen at 1548 North Edgewood Street. The main dwelling and garage, both erected in 1926, are similar in material and form. Both of the structures were produced by Sears, Roebuck and Company; the house identified as the Van Jean and the garage identified as the Avenue. The one-story wood frame garage is clad with German siding and has molded corner boards and a watertable. The hipped roof, now sheathed with asphalt shingles, has a wide overhang. The Craftsman-style doors consist of three leafs with hexagonal-shaped panels and three vertical lights. The Sears Company sold the one-car garage in 1928 for \$173, with an additional \$2.00 charged for foundation posts.

In addition to garages, there are a large number of sheds within the historic district. The shed, which is actually a catch-all term often applied to any storage or unidentified structure, is typically one story and constructed of wood frame or pre-fabricated metal. Although many of the properties have sheds, few of these are actually considered to be historic, most having been erected in the last quarter of the 20th century. Other notable outbuildings include carports, gazebos, barbecue pits, guesthouses, playhouses and tree houses, greenhouses, and swimming pools.

To serve the growing community of Lyon Village several religious facilities and a community house were constructed. The Clarendon Presbyterian Church at 1305 North Jackson Street, for example, dates from 1924. More modest in form and styling than the previously mentioned First Baptist Church, the Clarendon Presbyterian Church is in scale with the surrounding residential community. The structure, clad with stone facing, has an open nave plan that was augmented in 1947 by a one-and-a-half-story rear addition. This mid-20th century alteration prompted the main block of the building to be reclad, thereby obscuring many of the original stylistic details and giving the building its present irregular form. Colonial Revival-style detailing present on the building includes the denticulated entablature, raked bargeboard, stone casings, and a round stained glass window with a soldier-course surround.

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The Community United Methodist Church at 1701 North Bryan Street was constructed in the second quarter of the 20th century. The one-story stone building is dressed in the Gothic Revival style, complete with lancet-arched openings, steeply pointed gables, parapets, limestone watertable, and buttresses. The additions to the main church are similarly detailed with rubble stone, limestone surrounds and coping, and have stained-glass tracery windows. The building has an open nave plan with a projecting corner tower that houses the main entry.

Lyon Village also boasts a landscaped park, which was allotted for in the original subdivision plan. Located at North Highland and North 19th Streets, the park is located at the rear of the Colonial Revival-style Lyon Village Community House at 1920 North Highland Street. The park, encompassing six lots, is landscaped with trees and shrubs and has a playground and community parking for residents. The adjacent community house, constructed in 1949 after a lawsuit between the residents and developer Frank Lyon, features six-course American-bond brick construction and a front gable roof. Eimer Cappellmann, a Lyon Village resident, designed the Colonial Revival-style building. It has a classically inspired entry surround on the double-leaf main doors. The entry is flanked by 6/6 double-hung, wood sash windows with louvered shutters and splayed soldier-coursed lintels. The corners of the rectangular building are finished with brick quoins and cornice returns marked with a Greek key motif. At the western end of the building, a steeple pierces the gable roof. This wood structure is composed of a square tower and lantern. The detailing and form of the steeple is reminiscent of a Chinese pagoda.

Although the religious and social institutions of Lyon Village seem to reflect the prominent styles exhibited in the surrounding dwellings, the commercial buildings take a different tack. Rather, commercial buildings in Lyon Village often reflect the Art Deco and Moderne styles of architecture, as well as forms that follow the function of the building rather than any particular architectural style. With improvements in transportation, the county was opened to development, particularly commercial enterprises that flanked the major thoroughfares. Wilson Boulevard, to the south of the Lyon Village residential neighborhood, was transformed into a primary transportation route in the early 1920s. As a result, many of these commercial buildings were related to the auto industry, and included such uses as showrooms, repair shops, and gas stations. The development along Wilson Boulevard was primarily low-scale, rising just one- or two-stories in height. Many of the masonry structures have flat roofs with parapets, large show windows, and ornamentation presented by the varying of building materials. The

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development of these commercial buildings, however, is not directly related to that of the residential neighborhood, although at least two of the mercantile buildings were constructed for Frank Lyon. As typically was the fate of commercial buildings along major transportation corridors like Wilson Boulevard, these buildings have been altered and no longer truly reflect their original design or use and therefore have been excluded from the historic district.

A number of commercial buildings have been constructed along Lee Highway as well. However, the majority of these buildings were constructed after the period of significance and as such have been excluded from the historic district. Lee Highway, however, has some houses that have been converted to commercial use. One such example is 2522 Lee Highway (1925-1936), now used as a store. This wood frame bungalow is clad in both stretcher-bond brick and square-butt wood shingles in the gable ends. Craftsman in style, the former dwelling has a full-width front porch with paired and tripled posts atop parged masonry piers. A number of the dwellings, which are excluded from the historic district, have been rehabilitated for commercial use near the Clarendon Commercial District and were converted as a result of the expanding commercial center.

Development After 1950

Lyon Village has experienced little construction after the middle of the 20th century as residential buildings had improved most of the interior lots by this time. A few of the remaining unimproved lots, however, have subsequently been improved in the last quarter of the 20th century with single-family dwellings. The western edge of the historic district, in particular, has been improved with a number of houses that were constructed in the last half of the 20th century. For the most part, these houses are compatible with the historic housing stock seen throughout Lyon Village. In particular, the houses along North Johnson Street and Kirkwood Road are small vernacular dwellings that were primarily constructed between 1953 and 1960. These modest dwellings predominantly feature brick or stone cladding and are one to two stories in height with gable roofs. For example, the house at 1401 Kirkwood Road (1957) is constructed of brick laid in six-course Flemish bond. Rising two stories in height, the vernacular house has a cross gable roof of asphalt shingles. The four-bay-wide dwelling is set into a hill and has entries at both the first and second stories with an attached garage. Other examples of this modest infill housing can be seen at 1830 Kirwood Place (1953), 1507 Kirkwood Road (1958), 1829 North Jackson Street (1959)

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and 1400 North Johnson Street (1958).

Although most of the infill housing from this period is compatible, there are some buildings that are not characteristic of the neighborhood. One such example is the house at 1835 Kirkwood Place. Constructed in 1990, the concrete dwelling rises four-and-a-half stories in height with a tower-like projection and a flat roof. However, the Modern-style dwelling is built into a hill, presenting only two stories on the façade, in keeping with the surrounding neighborhood on North Herndon Street.

Despite few intrusions in the interior lots of the neighborhood, some incompatible larger commercial and apartment buildings have been constructed along the boundaries. In many cases, particularly along Lee Highway and Wilson Boulevard, near the Clarendon Commercial District, and in the Courthouse Square area, this late-20th-century construction has resulted in the demolition of historic resources. New construction at the southwest corner of Lyon Village also resulted in the loss of late-19th- and early-20th-century dwellings. These dwellings were demolished in 2000-2001 and replaced with three-story Colonial Revival-style townhouses. Along Lee Highway and on blocks adjacent to the Clarendon Commercial District in particular, former dwellings have been rehabilitated for use as commercial buildings, including stores, restaurants, and auto-related facilities. Late-20th-century buildings, such as modern gas stations, flank the historic buildings. Additionally, the Francis Scott Key School, formerly the James Monroe School, at the southwest corner of Key Boulevard and North Veitch Street has been subsumed within late-20th-century additions, leaving no remnant of the original building visible on the exterior.

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STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Lyon Village is an excellent example of the many residential subdivisions that emerged in Arlington County in the second quarter of the 20th century to support the burgeoning population flocking to the nation's capital. The middle- and upper-middle class suburban community, which is framed by major transportation corridors, expanded with the advents of the streetcar and automobile. Lyon Village was the second suburb in Arlington County platted by speculative developer Frank Lyon. The community developed primarily over several decades between 1923 and 1950, under the direction of Lyon Properties, Incorporated. Lyon Village, as designed by landscape architect William R. Sunderman, incorporated a series of landscaped traffic circles, sloping lots, and a community park. The nine sections of the suburb intentionally varied lot dimensions and building restrictions, thereby creating blocks targeted towards upper-middle-class residents in the northwestern corner with more modest middle-class housing surrounding. The original subdivision of Lyon Village was smaller than the present neighborhood, which now includes land owned by Robert Cruit, the subdivision of Aurora Heights, a portion of Clarendon, and additions to the original plat along the northwestern border. The chronological development of the now-enlarged Lyon Village neighborhood is documented by its architecture, which includes a wide range of construction dates from the 1880s to the infill construction of the late 1990s. Varying from large two-and-a-half-story brick and wood frame dwellings to smaller bungalow residences, the neighborhood is generally defined by its eclectic collection of imposing Colonial Revival-style houses, and more modest examples of Georgian Revival, Craftsman, Tudor Revival, and Spanish Mission Revival-style dwellings.

As a whole, the early-20th-century suburb of Lyon Village has achieved significance as the product of the distinctive period between 1923 and 1950, with individual components combine to create a distinguishable entity with high artistic value. Further, the Robert Cruit Farmhouse documents the initial development of the area as a county retreat and its use as a farm and dairy in the 19th century. The district meets National Register criteria A and C, and is significant under the themes of architecture and community planning/development with the period of significance extending from circa 1846 to 1950. The neighborhood consists of 778 properties including 762 single dwellings (the earliest of which dates to around 1846), eleven multiple dwellings, three

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churches, one meeting hall, and one shelter. There are 711 contributing primary resources and sixty-seven non-contributing primary resources, supported by a total of nearly 438 secondary resources, such as garages and sheds. Of the substantial secondary resources, 363 are contributing and 75 are non-contributing.

Criterion A: That are associated with events that have made a significant contribution to the broad patterns of our history.

Lyon Village meets Criterion A of the National Register of Historic Places as a planned community that developed because of its support of the expanding middle- and upper-middle-class suburban population of Washington, D.C. in the second quarter of the 20th century. This streetcar suburb was served by the early 1920s by the Washington-Virginia Railway Company (formerly the Washington, Alexandria and Mount Vernon line), which had a total of sixty-four stops. Additionally, the Washington and Old Dominion Electric Railway serviced the neighborhood. The increasing acceptance of the automobile and the need for efficient transportation routes into the District of Columbia, however, dictated the 1932 construction of the Memorial Bridge, the opening of the George Washington Memorial Highway, and the demise of the railway.³ Consequently, Lyon Village was firmly established as a commuting suburb of Washington, D.C. by 1950.

In 1923, Frank Lyon, a newspaper publisher and speculative land developer, purchased 165 acres of land that historically was part of the Cruit farm. One hundred and forty-eight acres of the property were platted as Lyon Village under the direction of the real estate company, Lyon and Fitch. Landscape architect William F. Sunderman designed the plan for Lyon Village, dividing the suburb into nine sections.⁴

Frank Lyon had several commercial buildings erected along Wilson Boulevard between North Barton Street and North Fillmore Street in the second quarter of the 20th century to serve the needs of Lyon Village residents. The one- and two-story commercial brick buildings that are not a part of the historic district operated in concert with the regional retail center of Clarendon, which had developed along Wilson Boulevard to the southwest of Lyon's suburb. Clarendon was platted at the turn of the 20th century as a residential and commercial community that

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evolved into a primary retail district with the advent of the electric railway and automobile. Consequently, several residential blocks historically within Clarendon were integrated into Lyon Village. This extended the neighborhood to the southwest along Washington Boulevard and 13th Street. Similarly, the joining of Aurora Heights, which had been subdivided in 1906, with Lyon Village extended the suburb to the east from North Barton Street and North Cleveland Street to North Veitch Street. The new western border of Lyon Village was platted by speculative developers and land owners. Begun in the 1930s with the platting of Kirkwood Terrace, the smaller subdivision created as part of Lyon Village include part of the "Alonzo Hayes Plan" (1945), "La Porte's First Addition" (1952), "Culler's Second Addition" (1956), "Baldwin's First and Second Additions" (1957), "Mitchell's Addition" (1958), and "Butler's Addition" (1965). The expanded sections framed Sunderman's landscape design with a more linear street plan that included narrower, flatter lots interspersed with larger lots and curvilinear streets.

The pace of development in Lyon Village was directly affected by the influx of government workers brought to the nation's capital. Costing between \$1,600 and \$2,400, the lots were predominantly sold in the 1920s, with sales picking up again after the end of the Great Depression. Ten percent of the purchase price of these lots was set aside, establishing a trust fund for the benefit of the owners. The money, held by the real estate company until 75% of the land was sold, was to be used for the maintenance of streets, sewers, and electric lights. Additionally, \$5,000 was set aside for the construction of a community house on property donated by the real estate company, and a park was to be created, providing swings, sandboxes, and other public amenities. By 1929, approximately 134 buildings were erected in Section I to the east of North Highland Street and the area known as Aurora Heights contained over 135 buildings, including single-family dwellings, stores, and a school. The residential area of Clarendon encompassed just over 200 buildings. By the mid-1930s, development of Lyon Village had increased, focusing on the area to the west of North Highland Street. By 1936, Lyon Village was improved by the construction of nearly 550 buildings, compared to the 477 buildings standing in 1929. The community had largely developed by 1950, with nearly 800 buildings. After 1955, about thirty-five additional buildings were constructed, most located on lots that had not yet been improved. By this time, the growing community of Lyon Village had roughly expanded to Wilson Boulevard on the south, Veitch Street on the east, Lee Highway to the north,

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Kirkwood Terrace along the western edge, and 13th Street in the southwest corner, with commercial establishments framing much of the neighborhood's borders.

Criteria C: That embody the distinctive characteristics of a type, period, or method of construction or that represent the work of a master, or that possess high artistic values, or that represent a significant and distinguishable entity whose components may lack individual distinction.

The suburban neighborhood of Lyon Village meets Criterion C of the National Register of Historic Places for its substantial concentration of domestic architecture of the early 20th century representing the Queen Anne, Colonial Revival, Craftsman, Tudor Revival, Mission, Classical Revival, and Art Deco styles that were popular during the period. Local builders and architects, including Frederick E. Westenberger and Keith A. Brumback, speculatively designed the majority of the residences. The earliest houses erected within the original Lyon Village subdivision were generally imposing Colonial Revival-, Classical Revival-, and Tudor Revival-style residences built for upper-middle class residents. Set back from the street, these larger dwellings were augmented by sun porches, side wings, rear ells, and attached garages.

By the time residential construction began to take off in the 1930s, house sizes and stylistic features had begun to change in response to a new clientele. Consequently, a substantial number of smaller, less ornate houses were built within the original borders of the neighborhood. The dominant styles were modest dwellings devoid of wings and applied ornamentation. Many of these smaller dwellings were the products of mail-order companies or local realty enterprises that offered modest foursquare buildings, Cape Cods and bungalows ornamented in a variety of styles, including the Tudor Revival, Craftsman, Spanish Revival, and Colonial Revival.

The number of turn-of-the-20th-century Queen Anne-style buildings in Lyon Village is worth noting as the community was not platted until 1923, several years after the fashionable style's zenith had passed. These buildings, dating primarily from the 1880s through the 1910s, are significant examples of the residential development of Aurora Heights and Clarendon prior to their integration with Lyon Village.

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Further, as a result of this type of early 20th century suburban development, 19th century farms were often subdivided to provide buildable lots for single-family dwellings. Typically, the original dwellings that stood on the property during its tenure as agricultural land were razed in favor of modern housing. This was not the case in Lyon Village, however, where the mid-19th-century Robert Cruit Farmhouse was retained by 20th century developer, Frank Lyon. Thus, the 19th century improvement of the land was not totally lost by 20th century suburbanization.

HISTORICAL BACKGROUND

Arlington County

Arlington County is a twenty-six-square mile community located in Northern Virginia along the Potomac River across from Washington, D.C. The county is bounded by Fairfax County to the north and west, the town of Alexandria and Four Mile Run to the south, and the waters of the Potomac to the east. The county's association with the nation's capital began as early as 1791, when Virginia ceded approximately thirty-one square miles of land that is now known as Arlington and Alexandria as the site for the nation's capital. Forty one-foot-square sandstone markers were erected in 1791-1792 at one-mile intervals marking the District of Columbia boundary. Major Andrew Ellicott was the chief surveyor, assisted by Benjamin Banneker, an astronomer, and others. Ten of these stones still mark the boundary of Arlington, although one of them has been moved from its original location.

At the time of the founding of the nation's capital, Arlington was still a small crossroads community with only scattered development within the environs. Andrew Ellicott commented on Arlington's rural character on June 26, 1791 in the "Surveyors Camp, State of Virginia:"

The country through which we are now cutting one of the ten-mile lines is very poor. I think for near seven miles, on it there is not one house that has any floor except the earth, and what is more strange is it is in the neighborhood of Alexandria and Georgetown..."⁵

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At the time that Virginia officially ceded the land in 1801, the population of the county was 5,949 with all but 978 living in the Town of Alexandria.⁶ It was during this period that Arlington ceased to be under the jurisdiction of Virginia and Fairfax County and became part of the County of Alexandria of the District of Columbia. With the introduction of a circuit court, orphan's court, and levy court, the town of Alexandria became the seat of local government, and the commercial and social center for the thirty-one square miles ceded by Virginia. Referred to as the "country part" of the county, Arlington remained rural with agricultural interests. The land was improved and maintained by just a few large plantations throughout this period, most notably the Alexander-Custis plantation known as Abingdon. The remainder of the cultivated land was primarily made up of small plots held by farmers and tenants.

Although the population of the Arlington area continued to increase in the early 19th century, the majority of the county's population remained concentrated in the Town of Alexandria. Of the 8,552 who lived in the county in 1810, only 1,325 lived in the rural part of the county. By 1820, the rural population had increased by only 160 persons with a total of 1,485 of the 9,703 total county residents living outside the town limits.⁷

The ties of the Arlington area to Washington, D.C. were physically manifested with the construction of bridges that replaced the ferries of colonial times. The first bridge to cross the Potomac River into Arlington was located at the site of the current Chain Bridge. The new bridges, and Arlington's proximity to the Town of Alexandria, resulted in the development of local turnpike companies and several turnpikes running west to Leesburg.⁸

Alexandria County, including the city of Alexandria and Arlington, was returned to the Commonwealth of Virginia following a referendum among its citizens in 1846-1847. Alexandria remained the area's center of commerce, trade, and domestic development, spurred on by the construction of canals, railroads, and trading routes. Improved roadways and the railroad further encouraged commercial prosperity by providing the necessary links between farms and commercial centers. The railroads, however, did not cross the river until after the Civil War, when Union forces laid rails along Long Bridge.⁹

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In the decades leading up to the Civil War, the population of Alexandria County continued to grow with 9,573 residents in 1830. By 1840, the population had increased by only 394 residents.

The 1850 census shows a steady increase to 10,008 and to 12,652 in 1860. Those living in the rural part of the county in this period remained in the minority, numbering 1,332 residents in 1830 and 1,508 residents in 1840, with a decline to 1,274 residents in 1850.¹⁰ Most of those employed in rural areas were listed in the census of 1850 as farmers or laborers, although other professions included teachers, merchants, papermakers, carpenters, millers, shoemakers, clerks, tollgate keepers, blacksmiths, and clergymen.

New farms continued to be developed in the Arlington area throughout the early to mid-19th century. Attracted by a less industrial way of life and the availability of good inexpensive land, a number of new residents from New England and the Middle Atlantic states settled in the vicinity. Many of the residents erected dwelling houses in the county, although not all buildings were constructed as permanent residences. Providing a holiday from the sweltering heat of the District of Columbia swamps, the ridge of rural Arlington was home to a number of summer cottages and hunting lodges. The best example of the resort ideal of the area was started by George Washington Parke Custis, who invited friends to the area for a Fourth of July celebration in 1824.

Eventually becoming a commercial enterprise, Custis' Arlington Springs was improved by the construction of various structures including a kitchen, dining hall, and dancing pavilion. Frequented by as many as 200 guest a day, the resort was accessible by boat from Washington, D.C. and Alexandria.¹¹

Robert Cruit Farmhouse

The Robert Cruit Farmhouse, located in the center of what was to eventually become Lyon Village, is another reminder of the area's popularity as a local resort. Robert Cruit, born in Washington City in 1795, purchased land in Virginia from Robert and Mary S. Widdicomb in July 1846 for \$1,345 as a country retreat for his family.¹² The property conveyed by the Widdicombs to Cruit was denoted as "Subdivision No. 10...[a] tract of land lying on the Potomac River inherited by John Mason from his father George Mason of Gunston [that] has been subdivided by survey and plat of Lewis Carberry...."¹³ Carberry had surveyed the land in

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1835 at the request of the Bank of the United States, which had foreclosed on John Mason in 1833 because of his numerous business failures and heavy debts. Subdivision No. 10, as noted in Carberry's survey, consisted of 56 acres 1 rood and 6 perches and, according to the deed of sale, included buildings. Cruit purchased twelve additional acres in February 1847 and another 129 adjacent acres in October 1847. Living in Washington, D.C. on F Street near 14th Street, N.W., Cruit was a successful butter merchant who used the Arlington property as a vacation spot.¹⁴ A tenant caretaker occupied the property full-time, tending to the horses, cattle, and running the dairy that Cruit maintained on the Arlington property. In fact, Cruit was the first person in the United States to import Jersey cows.¹⁵ At the center of this farmstead was a wood frame dwelling that appears to have stood on the property prior to its purchase by Cruit in 1846. Erected circa 1846, this two-and-a-half-story dwelling at what is now 1614 North Highland Street was constructed with hand-hewn timbers.

Robert Cruit continued to own the property throughout the mid-19th century. Upon his death in 1861, reportedly as a result of a fall from a horse, Cruit's Virginia landholdings were bequeathed in trust to his daughter, Susan Cruit. The will was written in September 1858, and probated in February 1862. His family continued to reside on F Street in Washington, D.C. well into the second half of the 19th century.

In order to secure Washington City during the hostile years of the Civil War, it was necessary for Federal troops to occupy the Virginia shore of the Potomac River, and on May 23-24, 1861, Federal troops entered Virginia. In order to provide extra protection to the forts located at the low-lying edges of the river crossings, additional forts were established throughout the Arlington area. By the end of 1861, a total of 23 forts and connecting roadways had been constructed on the south bank of the Potomac River, most of them in Arlington, in an effort to defend the nation's capital.¹⁶ Upwards of 10,000 Union troops occupied the forts in this region of Virginia, overwhelming the 1,486 rural residents of Arlington.

During the occupation, the residents of Alexandria County suffered, Union and Confederate sympathizers alike. The economic base of the county declined as residents were circumscribed by heavy military traffic. Depredation by the troops was not uncommon, as was the

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appropriation of land and buildings in the "necessity of public interest."¹⁷ Certainly the most famous illustration of this occupation was the Union possession of the Custis-Lee family mansion known as Arlington House as the headquarters of the commanding general. Although every effort was made at first to protect the property of the Lee family, who had vacated the site when Robert E. Lee took command of the Confederate Army in 1861, many articles of furniture disappeared. Inevitably, the grounds suffered because of the large number of men encamped there. After the First and Second Battles of Manassas, many wounded troops, including Confederates, were brought to Arlington House. Many of the dead were buried on the estate near the house; thus, establishing Arlington National Cemetery (officially founded in 1864).

With the end of hostilities, the Arlington area was left in disarray. The Union troops disbanded, leaving in their wake abandoned forts and ruined farmland. Accordingly, in March 1871, Susan Cruit petitioned the federal government for losses incurred during the occupation of her father's Virginia property during the Civil War. The claim indicated Federal troops had taken wood, corn, hay, sod, peaches, potatoes, horses, cattle, rails from fencing, and farming utensils. The claim, which totaled \$15,520, also indicated that the property was occupied for six months by Union troops (3rd and 8th Pennsylvania Cavalry Regiments), who used the dwelling as a hospital.

Throughout the reconstruction era, the Cruit property remained under the ownership of the heirs. In 1912, granddaughters Jessie Owen Cugle, Kate Dean Owen, and Evania F. Mackall began to subdivide the farmland in response to housing needs and the new modes of transportation transversing the area. The first subdivision consisted of thirty-one acres that were sold to the Conservative Realty Company and platted as part of the community of Maywood. The second subdivision was conveyed to Frank Lyon.

Frank Lyon

Frank Lyon purchased 165 acres of land in Arlington from the Cruit heirs for \$185,000 in 1923, intending to subdivide the property and create a middle- to upper-middle class residential suburb. Lyon was born in Petersburg, Virginia on December 30, 1867. He was educated in Richmond public schools, and attended Richmond College for eighteen months. Lyon worked as a clerk for

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the Richmond and Danville Railroad Company in Charlotte, North Carolina, before being transferred back to his hometown of Richmond, where he worked as a private secretary to one of the railroad's officers. In 1886, Lyon moved to Washington, D.C. to work for the Southern Railroad. Accordingly, in 1887, Lyon became the private secretary to Walter L. Bragg of Alabama, a commissioner with the newly formed Interstate Commerce Commission (ICC). He later became the official stenographer for the ICC, a position he maintained until 1899. While working for the ICC, Lyon attended Georgetown University Law School, receiving a master of law degree in 1890. Lyon was stenographer for the Constitutional Convention of Virginia from 1900 to 1902, when he began to practice law in Alexandria County. Frank Lyon and his wife, Georgie Hays Wright, moved to Alexandria County in 1889, having a modest dwelling erected on Lubber Run.

Lyon's interests in real estate in Arlington began in the early 1900s. However, the area's reputation as the home of saloons, gambling houses, brothels and frequent violence, particularly in the area now known as Rosslyn and the present site of the Pentagon, prevented many newcomers or speculative developers from investing in the area. Accordingly, Lyon bought the *Alexandria County Monitor*, a local newspaper that was initially published by the *Falls Church Monitor*. Through his association with the *Monitor*, Lyon was able to crusade against the negative vices plaguing Arlington. One such attack was against liquor. As Ruth P. Rose recounts in "The Role of Frank Lyon and his Associates in the Early Development of Arlington County," Lyon served as attorney for John D. Payne and George W. Hawkhurst, the leaders of the dry forces. Lyon found a clause in a legislative act that in effect kept liquor licenses from being granted to localities without sufficient police protection. The police force of Alexandria County at that time consisted of one sheriff and one deputy. On April 29, 1905, a number of Alexandria County merchants filed petitions for liquor licenses and Lyon argued against granting the licenses on the basis of incomplete police protection. Judge Nicol denied all applications."¹⁸ This court action virtually ended the era of open saloons in Alexandria County, and thereby opened Arlington to new residents.

Together with law partner Robert Walton Moore, Lyon became involved in the development of Moore's Addition to Clarendon (now part of Lyon Park), land north of Pershing Drive and

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southeast of Clarendon Circle that Moore had purchased in 1910. Moore, who later became involved in politics, eventually sold his interest in the subdivision to Lyon.¹⁹ Lyon's first solo venture in real estate was on a tract of land adjacent to Clarendon, a large suburb that had been formed at the turn of the 20th century. The property Lyon wished to purchase was the subject of litigation and was ordered by the court to be sold at public or private sale. Lyon's offer of \$500 an acre for 12.538 acres was accepted in April 1904. "The property was adjacent to [land] owned by Charlotte L. Drain on the southeast side of the Georgetown Road and north of the Georgetown Road and Ball's Lane intersection. The property became known as Lyon's Addition to Clarendon."²⁰

As a real estate developer, Lyon's personal attitude regarding liquor was forced upon prospective buyers. Every deed of sale clearly stated that "liquor shall never be sold or dispensed on the property or from any building erected thereon, nor shall said property be used for the conducting of any business that constitutes a nuisance to other lot owners in the subdivision, such as a soap factory or like industry."²¹ Covenants regarding the prospective residents and the cost of the buildings to be constructed in the suburb were also included in the deeds of sale. As recited by Rose, the covenants for Moore's Addition to Clarendon stated that "neither said property nor any part thereof nor any interest therein shall be sold or leased to any one not of the Caucasian race, nor shall any house costing less than \$2,000 other than an outbuilding, be erected thereon."²²

In 1920, Lyon's development firm was renamed Lyon and Fitch, when C. Walton Fitch became a partner. The stated "purpose of Lyon and Fitch, Inc. was to buy, sell, improve, develop, lease and exchange real estate, to borrow money, make and secure same on real estate; to build sewers, and to provide and construct all other betterments and facilities; to contract for the contracting business; to subdivide real estate into lots, parks, streets, and alleys, and to sell or dedicate the same to the use of the public..."²³ The company name was eventually changed to Lyon and Fitch, Incorporated, with Charles W. Smith (Lyon's son-in-law and law partner) serving as treasurer. Fitch, a graduate of Cornell University, oversaw the land sales for the company. He and his wife, Margaret Lyon Parham (Frank Lyon's niece) lived in the suburb of Lyon Park. Fitch, Smith, and later Lawrence Michael, operated the Virginia real estate company, while Lyon continued his law practice in Washington, D.C. Lawrence Michael had joined the firm as a

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salesman in the 1920s, later becoming president of the company. Fitch left the real estate business in Arlington to become the director of exhibits for the 1933 Chicago World's Fair, and remained in Chicago after the closing of the fair in October 1934 to serve as the manager of the Museum of Science and Industry. With his departure, Lyon and Fitch, Incorporated was renamed Lyon Properties, Incorporated.

The success of the real estate company was largely due to advancements in local transportation, beginning with the introduction of commuter railroads as early as 1904. The first of these was the Great Falls and Old Dominion Railroad, which cut across northern Arlington and provided easy access for commuters between Great Falls and Rosslyn. Linked with the Washington lines, the Great Falls and Old Dominion Railroad Company was chartered by an act of the General Assembly of Virginia in January 1900 to build a double-track railway from Georgetown across the Aqueduct Bridge through Rosslyn, parallel to Lee Highway. The line traveled north of what was to become Lyon Village by 1904, and moved onto Great Falls over what is now Old Dominion Drive by 1906.²⁴

In 1912, the Bluemont branch of the Washington and Old Dominion Railway was laid to the north of Lyon Village, following the present-day route of U.S. Interstate 66. The double-track line ran from Bluemont Junction near Glencarlyn to Thrifton Junction (now Lyon Village Shopping Center). The railway connected with an older railroad line that extended past Leesburg. This older steam line, known as the Alexandria, Loudoun and Hampshire Railroad, opened in 1857 and played a major role in the formation of many Northern Virginia communities. The Washington and Old Dominion Company acquired the older company in 1911. The route, which traveled across the Aqueduct Bridge by a single track at M Street into Washington, D.C., included about thirty-five stops in Arlington. Similarly, by 1924, the Washington-Virginia Railway Co. (formerly the Washington, Alexandria and Mount Vernon line) had a total of sixty-four stops located within Arlington.

These commuter trains and streetcars provided an inexpensive, reliable form of transportation for people living in the growing suburbs of Arlington, and were often tools used by real estate developers to attract residents. In 1920, Lyon and Fitch advertised the transportation amenities

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afforded prospective residents of Lyon Park, the first of Frank Lyon's suburban subdivisions in Arlington:

Elevation 260 feet above Washington – three miles west of White House. One mile west of Arlington Amphitheater...Macadam Road to Georgetown via Key Bridge, and to Potomac Park via Military Road through Fort Myer, Arlington and Highway Bridge. Falls Church cars of Washington-Virginia Railway from 12th and Pennsylvania Avenue reach property in twenty minutes. Also cars via Georgetown and Rosslyn. Commutation rates.²⁵

The increasing acceptance of the automobile and the need for efficient transportation routes into the District of Columbia, however, dictated the 1932 construction of the Memorial Bridge and the opening of the George Washington Memorial Highway.²⁶ In turn, this led to the abandonment of the Great Falls and Old Dominion Electric Railway in 1935, which historically had been the area's fastest mode of transport into Washington, D.C. for employees, local farmers, and tourists.²⁷

Because of the availability of advanced modes of transportation to its citizens, Arlington was home to over 16,000 residents when it was named an independent county in 1920. Ruth Rose states that "five hundred houses had been constructed in the County during the past year (1920), 150 of them in the area of Lyon Park and Clarendon...."²⁸ The suburb of Lyon Park included Moore's Addition to Clarendon and encompassed over 300 acres of land. Platted in 1919, the neighborhood plan was designed by landscape architect William R. Sunderman, who was employed by Lyon and Fitch, Inc. The rectangular building lots, available with or without trees, were divided by a street plan that was predominately rectilinear. The plan of Lyon Park did include some curvilinear streets with building lots of varying dimensions and a centrally located commercial district along Washington Boulevard at its intersection with Pershing Drive.

The residents of Lyon Park, and later Lyon Village, were afforded the best available amenities, including natural shade, pure water and sewers, gas, electricity, cement sidewalks, playgrounds

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and parks. The death of one of Lyon's sons from a fever he contracted while playing in a polluted stream was the driving influence for Lyon requiring good water and sewer drainage systems for residents of Lyon Park. Furthermore, to ensure moral stability, Lyon saw to it that the neighborhoods encompassed schools, churches, commercial resources, and community buildings.

The Platting of Lyon Village

With the successful development of Lyon Park by 1922, Frank Lyon looked elsewhere in Arlington County for additional real estate to subdivide and improve. This coincided with the division of the former Cruit property by the heirs. Ruth Rose tells that "Lyon arranged a meeting with Chapin Brown, the attorney handling the [Cruit] property, at the Cosmos Club in Washington. Lyon gave Brown a check for a down payment of \$5,000 on the 162 plus acres for which [Charles Watson] Smith had made an offer of \$175,000."²⁹ Lyon signed a contract with the Cruit heirs for approximately 163 acres of land on May 26, 1922. Before the contract became effective, however, the family attempted to void the sale. The repudiation of the initial sale and the death of Evania F. Mackall (one of Cruit's three granddaughters who inherited the property) only delayed the conveyance to Lyon. Consequently, the sale of the 165 acres that were ultimately platted as Lyon Village was not finalized until July 1923, and had been increased to \$185,000. The final sale included 148 acres denoted on a May 1915 survey as being the "area south of Georgetown-Falls Church Road" (now Lee Highway). Additionally, Lyon purchased slightly less than seventeen acres of land "north of Georgetown-Falls Church Road." Collectively, the two tracts were platted by Frank Lyon as Lyon Village.³⁰

Landscape architect William R. Sunderman of Lyon and Fitch worked with Frank Lyon on the design of the suburb, which was marketed towards middle- and upper-middle-class residents. The suburb was divided into nine sections, two of which were ultimately excluded from the boundaries of Lyon Village with the establishment of Interstate 66 and the expansion of Lee Highway. The residential community of Lyon Village was designed with curvilinear streets that were contrary to the perpendicular grid plans of surrounding neighborhoods. The plan as designed by Sunderman incorporated a series of landscaped traffic circles, sloping lots, and a

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community park. The original nine sections of the suburb intentionally varied lot dimensions and building restrictions, thereby creating blocks targeted towards upper-middle-class residents in the northwestern corner with more modest middle-class housing surrounding them.

Section One, east of North Highland Street (then known as Virginia Avenue), was the first area in the original borders of Lyon Village to develop. In the *Arlington Historical Magazine* article "Lyon Village," Carolyn V. Boaz indicates that by about 1927 the area had been improved by the construction of "eighty to ninety homes."³¹ This number included only those buildings in the original borders of Lyon Village. Neighboring Clarendon, Aurora Heights, and the western additions, all of which ultimately became part of Lyon Village, were improved by 1929 with over 335 buildings collectively.

Residential development in Clarendon began in 1897, when Bostonian Robert Treat Paine, Jr. purchased twenty-five acres of land near the intersection of what was then the Georgetown-Falls Church Road and the Washington, Arlington & Falls Church Electric Railway line (today the path of Washington Boulevard). In 1900, Paine had the property platted as "Clarendon," which consisted of four north-south streets and one east-west street. The new subdivision was named in honor of the Earl of Clarendon (1609-1674). The area grew so rapidly that by 1910 five additions to Clarendon had been subdivided and developed. By 1919, Clarendon had been expanded by twenty-odd additions. Its convenience to the electric railway and its burgeoning commercial district attracted many newcomers between 1900 and 1920. In 1920, the Clarendon Citizens Association, which had been aggressively promoting the area since its formation in 1912, applied to the state to incorporate the area as an independent town. After two years of court battles, the Virginia Supreme Court denied the request stating that Arlington was a "continuous, contiguous and homogenous community which could not have cities or towns incorporated within it."³² Despite this defeat, Clarendon continued to grow with new subdivisions developed through the 1920s and into the 1930s. The two most successful of these subdivisions were Lyon Park and Ashton Heights, which retain their character as individual residential communities today.

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With the growth of flanking residential neighborhoods like Lyon Village, Clarendon took on a new role as the economic center of the County. This area is recognized today as the Clarendon Commercial District. The Clarendon Commercial District predominantly lies along Wilson Boulevard, North Highland Street, and Washington Boulevard, with additional buildings facing North Irving, North Hudson and North Herndon Streets and Fairfax Drive. As the neighborhoods were growing, social and civic institutions began to arise in and around the commercial center. Some of these facilities include the 1909 Masonic Lodge (3193 Wilson Boulevard); Clarendon Elementary School (Matthew F. Maury School,); St. George's Episcopal Church (1911); and Clarendon Citizens' Hall (1921, 3211 Wilson Boulevard) which housed the post office, volunteer fire company, dance hall, gymnasium, meeting room, and library. With the creation of the commercial district to the southwest of Lyon Village, several residential blocks historically within Clarendon were ultimately integrated into Lyon's second suburb. This extended the neighborhood of Lyon Village to the southwest along Wilson Boulevard and Washington Boulevard.

Similarly, the joining of Aurora Heights with Lyon Village extended the suburb to the east from North Barton Street and North Cleveland Street to North Veitch Street. G.E. Garrett surveyed Aurora Heights in 1906, seventeen years prior to the platting of Lyon Village. Like Lyon Village, Aurora Heights was smaller and was platted and expanded over a period of time to include at least two additions. "Jones' and Gloth's" rectangular addition, which was bordered by North 18th Street, North Veitch Street, Lee Highway, and North Wayne Street, was not drawn until 1954. One year earlier, in 1953, "Preston's" triangular addition, lying between North Custis Street, North Barton Street, and Wilson Boulevard, was finally laid out, thirty-three years after it was initially surveyed and mapped. In 1954, the enlarged community of Aurora Heights was rededicated, encompassing the neighborhood bordered by North Veitch Street, Lee Highway, North Cleveland Street to Key Boulevard, North Barton Street, and Wilson Boulevard. Aurora Heights has been subsumed within the Lyon Village Citizen Association service area, although the community retained its own identity well into the latter part of the 20th century.

Eight additions to Lyon Village occurred over the thirty-five years following Frank Lyon's purchase of the Cruik tract in 1923. Most of these additions were located on the northwest side of

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the subdivision and were developed by different individuals or companies. The first of the additions, comprising a portion of the neighborhood known as Kirkwood Terrace, was added in units in the 1930s. Developed shortly before 1934, the parcel of land known as "Kirkwood Terrace Unit 1" included five lots at the intersection of North Johnson Street, North 13th Street, and Kirkwood Road. In 1936, "Unit 5" was platted with ten lots at the northern edge of Lyon Village, where Kirkwood Road and Lee Highway intersect. Six of the lots fronted along North 19th Road and four additional lots, which were slightly smaller, lay on the northeast side of North 19th Street.

The seven lots lying northeast of "Kirkwood Terrace Unit 1" were added to the community in 1945. Fronting on North Johnson Street and Kirkwood Road, the lots were the result of the subdivision of one acre of land formerly owned by Mary J. Clarkson as late as 1938. Between 1938 and 1945, this acreage was subdivided and comprised a small part of "Alonzo Hayes Plan" prior to their addition to Lyon Village. The majority of the "Alonzo Hayes Plan" was composed of small blocks of subdivided land interspersed between larger estates lying west of Lyon Village.

One of the larger additions to Lyon Village came in 1952, with developer J. A. La Porte's subdivision of land east of Kirkwood Road, lying south of North 19th Street and fronting along the cul-de-sac at North Johnson Street. Unlike the earlier additions, La Porte's subdivision of the Jessica A. Harrison and Rose A. Marstellar estates conformed to the curvilinear plan established in Frank Lyon's original subdivision. Also in that year was the platting of "Culler's First Addition," which was located west of the terminus of North 15th Street at North Johnson Street. This large parcel of land comprised a portion of the two-acre E.G. Baldwin estate that existed in 1938.

Between 1956 and 1958, four more additions were made to the neighborhood of Lyon Village. "Culler's Second Addition," consisting of five lots, was platted in 1952. Three of these five lots fronted along Kirkwood Road, while the remaining two lots were situated between North Johnson Street and North Jackson Street. In 1957, "Baldwin's First and Second Additions to Lyon Village" were laid out between Kirkwood Road and North Jackson Street. Five lots that

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straddled North Johnson Street north of "Culler's Addition" comprised the majority of the first Baldwin addition. One lot, located south of "Culler's Addition," was included in the Baldwin subdivision. "Baldwin's Second Addition" was composed of three lots that fronted along Kirkwood Road to the west of "Baldwin's First Addition." The "Mitchell Addition to Lyon Village" came in 1958 with the creation of three lots between the "Hayes Estate" and "Culler's Additions." Like the neighboring additions, the Mitchell lots also fronted along Kirkwood Road and North Johnson Street. In 1965, the final lot, known as the "Butler Addition to Lyon Village," was developed at the intersection of North Jackson Street, North Johnson Street, and North 15th Street.

The Impact of the Citizens Association

The first property owners in Lyon Village were active in the development of their neighborhood, forming a citizens association in February 1926. The first meetings of the association were held in the real estate office of Lyon and Fitch, which was located in Lyon Park (intersection of today's North 7th Street, Pershing Drive, and Washington Boulevard). Officers were elected at the second association meeting, held in March 1926. Monroe Stockett, who lived at 1722 North Danville Street, was chosen president. Provoked by a deficiency of local government services, the citizens association created a number of committees to oversee needs in the community. The committees included census activities, city planning, constitution and by-laws, education, entertainment, law and legislation, membership, police and fire protection, public health, public utilities, publicity, recreation, streets and sidewalks, and water.³³ As the county services expanded, however, the number of committees diminished. The flourishing woman's department committee separated from the association in 1927, forming the Woman's Club of Lyon Village. The following year the organization joined the Greater Federation of Women's Clubs. One of the earliest, and most significant, joint accomplishments of the Woman's Club was the establishment of a county library system.³⁴

The citizens association immediately instigated a working relationship with the many real estate companies and builders erecting buildings in Lyon Village in an effort to maintain stylistic continuity and massing.³⁵ Typically, the association stressed the use of American revival styles

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and forms popular in suburban neighborhoods in the 1920s and 1930s. The Colonial Revival style was the most popular. Consequently, more than sixty percent of the dwellings in Lyon Village illustrate elements of the Colonial Revival style of architecture.

By the end of the 1930s, the citizens association was meeting in a variety of locations, including the Clarendon Citizens Hall, Chamber of Commerce rooms, James Monroe School (now Key School), Community Methodist Church, and the homes of Lyon Village residents.³⁶ A committee had been formed in April 1927 to locate or oversee the construction of a community building and fund raising events began in earnest. Yet, by 1940, the association was still without a permanent home. Association president Stanley Collins contacted Lyon Incorporated (formerly Lyon and Fitch) regarding a clause that appeared in many of the first sales contracts that stated "that there would be a trust fund set aside of 10% of the purchase price of each lot. The fund was to benefit the home owners by providing a community house, a park and other amenities. When 75% of the lots were sold the fund was to be turned over to three trustees chosen by the home owners."³⁷

As Carolyn Boaz narrates:

No satisfactory response was received to Mr. Collins' letter about the fund. Mary Smith Bittinger, Frank Lyon's granddaughter, told the author that when her grandfather heard about the request he responded "Let them sue!" Her father, Charles W. Smith, a partner in the company, advised his father-in-law to settle but his advice was ignored. Mr. Collins and three other lot owners did bring suit on behalf of all lot owners on the Cruit tract, but they lost the case in the Arlington Circuit Court. They appealed and the Superior Court of Appeals for the State of Virginia reversed the decree of the trial court and sent the case back for settlement.³⁸

The March 1943 opinion of the Appeals Court was:

It is our considered conviction that the defendants (Lyon Incorporated), when they publicized the alluring features of becoming a lot owner and an inhabitant of that charming vicinage, Lyon Village, with parks and playgrounds, and springs and

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trysting places, and went even further and described an existing and growing fund of stately proportions to guarantee the future actuality of all these enticements, did not intend to paint a picture such as dreams are made of, but rather intended to set up a legal structure. They never intended to erect a house of cards to be knocked down but to present one founded upon a rock....³⁹

An agreement between the residents of Lyon Village and Lyon Incorporated was reached in October 1944, and finalized by the courts in November of that same year. Accordingly, Lyon Incorporated agreed to give two lots (719 and 710 in Section V) and \$20,000 to the trustees that were appointed by the court at the request of the property owners. The same trustees, William Watt, Alden Towberman, and Hannah Livingston, were reappointed by members of the community for a three-year term beginning in November 1949. A board of governors was also appointed to advise and counsel the trustees on the use and management of the community house. Lyon Incorporated also agreed to sell six lots to Arlington County. The unimproved lots, earmarked for use as parking and a playground, were adjacent to the two given as the future site of the community center.

Construction of the community house began in June 1949 and was completed by December of that year. The cost for constructing the Colonial Revival-style building exceeded the \$20,000 granted by Lyon Incorporated, requiring residents to contribute \$4,000 and a bank loan of \$8,000. Architect Eimer Cappelmann, a native of Charleston, South Carolina, and new resident of Lyon Village, designed the community house. The one-story brick building is located at 1920 North Highland Street.

The Development of Lyon Village and its Residents

The area east of North Highland Street was the first section of Lyon Village to develop, beginning in the late 1920s with the construction of inexpensive wood frame and brick-faced dwellings. More than thirty of these modest houses were the product of mail order companies. Magazines led the way in introducing affordable housing to consumers. Among the most influential was *Ladies Home Journal*, which began at the turn of the 20th century to publish

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designs for small model homes -- often in chalet and period styles -- complete plans for prefabricated frames, specifications for fireproofing, and such novel conveniences as electricity, plumbing, and gas ranges. For a few dollars a reader could purchase working plans for a house that could be built for as little as \$1,000. The largest, and by far the best known, of the mail-order companies was Sears, Roebuck and Company of Chicago, Illinois. The company began to design and sell house kits in the mid-1890s, and in its three decades of operation, Sears made a substantial contribution to 20th-century housing in America. Sears, however, was not the only American company to manufacture or sell houses through mail-order catalogs, nor was it the only company to sell house designs. The late 19th and early 20th centuries were ripe for entrepreneurs who sold architectural plans as well as the houses themselves. The Hodgson Company, Aladdin Homes, Ray H. Bennett Lumber Company, and Montgomery Ward all had their start in the housing business between 1895 and 1910. All shipping was done by rail; consequently the largest concentration of mail-order houses is in the Northeast and Midwest, areas that were served by most of the nation's rail lines.⁴⁰

Among the most popular Sears, Roebuck and Company designs selected by residents of Lyon Village were the Vallonia, the Crescent, and the Westly bungalow models, the Americus foursquare model, and the Barrington model. Many of these dwellings exhibit elements commonly associated with the Colonial Revival style as recommended by the citizens association. One such example is the house at 1548 North Edgewood Street, which was constructed in 1929. The two-story Dutch Colonial Revival-style dwelling is a "Van Jean," which was produced by Sears between 1928 and 1929. It is complemented by Sears' Simplex model garage.

Local realty companies and builders, such as Lyon Park resident Arthur Orr and Keith A. Brumback of Clarendon, were responsible for the construction of a substantial number of inexpensive dwellings in Lyon Village. Brumback was president of the Brumback Realty Company, Inc., a real estate and building company based in Clarendon. The company began in August 1925, working first in Cherrydale and expanding to Country Club Hills, Devonshire Gardens, Sylvan Estates, and Lyon Village. A promotional brochure produced by the company claimed the Brumback Company had "...been operating for several years [in Lyon Village];

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building charming, comfortable homes in the price range of \$10,000 to \$18,000 [and] conveniently near Clarendon shops, schools, churches, and theaters, and only a few minutes from Washington."⁴¹ The buildings designed and sold by the company presented a wide variety of American revival styles and forms, including Colonial Revival, Tudor Revival, Spanish Revival, bungalows, foursquares, and Cape Cods. The buildings, constructed of either wood frame or brick, provided housing for middle-income residents as well as some of the upper-middle-income residents living in Lyon Village.

Development ultimately moved to the west of North Highland Street, with the construction of larger brick houses. Frederick E. Westenberger served as developer for many of these brick dwellings between 1933 and 1940. Westenberger was a German immigrant who worked in Norfolk as a carpenter before moving to Arlington. In the 1930s, he purchased a parcel of land at North Hartford and North 18th Streets in Lyon Village from Frank Lyon. Westenberger built twenty-three houses, all of which were constructed of brick with slate roofs. All of the bricks were made by hand on a wood press in Glasgow, Virginia.⁴² The Lyon Village Citizens' Association guided the choice of architectural appearance, insisting on the fashionable Colonial Revival style. Although the overall designs of the residences produced by Westenberger were similar, each dwelling was given an individual characteristic, such as a recessed window, fluted columns, copper-roofed portico, or wood shingling. Kenton D. Hamaker, an associate architect with the Clarendon firm of Ernest Dorsey Stevens in 1935, designed many of the architectural plans initiated by Westenberger.⁴³ The houses began in the \$12,000 range, aimed at the upper-middle-class buyer.⁴⁴ Westenberger's own house was constructed in Lyon Village at 1842 North Hartford Street in 1938.

The development of Lyon Village coincided with that of many other Arlington suburbs, each with its own street design and street names. Consequently, by 1932, there were nine streets or avenues named Virginia in Arlington that had no connection. In protest, the United States Post Office Department refused to build a central post office to serve Arlington until a street name system was instigated. Under the direction of Lyon Village's own Monroe Stockett, a committee was formed to address the street name problem. A new street name system was adopted on July

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1, 1935. This new system changed the name of every existing street in Lyon Village. Accordingly, the Clarendon Post Office was constructed in 1937.⁴⁵

The real estate firm of Lyon Incorporated continued to operate until the 1940s, overseeing the construction and operation of the Lyon Village Shopping Center (which is now associated with Maywood) and apartment buildings. Frank Lyon continued to prosper as a lawyer, although his contributions to Arlington County as a real estate developer ended with the platting and development of Lyon Village. He died in 1953.

By the second half of the 20th century, Lyon Village was substantially developed with single-family dwellings. Larger commercial buildings and low-rise apartment complexes framed the neighborhood, particularly along Lee Highway and Wilson Boulevard. Late-20th-century infill has occurred, although minimally on the interior lots of the neighborhood. This infill construction mainly consists of single-family dwellings on platted lots that have not yet been improved. Along the borders of the neighborhood, however, modern construction has caused the razing of historic resources in the Courthouse Square area, along Lee Highway, and near the *Clarendon Commercial District*.

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Verbal Boundary Description

Lyon Village Historic District is located in northern Arlington County, Virginia. It is set to the immediate north of the Clarendon Commercial District, which flanks Wilson Boulevard at Washington Boulevard and the Courthouse area at Wilson Boulevard and Clarendon Boulevard. The neighborhood, with Wilson Boulevard to the south, is bounded by Lee Highway to the north. It extends east to North Veitch Street and westward to North Kirkwood Road. The Lyon Village Historic District occupies approximately 191 acres.

Boundary Justification

The boundaries of the Lyon Village Historic District encompass a portion of the original Cruit tract. The district also includes Aurora Heights and portions of Clarendon with residential buildings constructed prior to Lyon's platting of Lyon Village in 1923. Adjacent blocks were improved as additions to Lyon Village between the 1930s and the 1950s, showing a similar development pattern to the original plan as designed by William Sunderman. As a result, these properties are included in the historic district.

The southernmost boundary of the historic district is to the north of Wilson Boulevard, excluding all those commercial properties fronting this major transportation corridor. Established as a thoroughfare before the American Revolution, Wilson Boulevard is a longstanding boundary between Lyon Village and the commercial centers to the south. Part of the original Cruit tract lies along Wilson Boulevard, roughly between North Barton and

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North Fillmore Streets. The commercial buildings that serve the neighborhood are largely confined to this southern boundary, historically having provided the residents with access to goods and services. Yet, these commercial building has been excluded from the historic district because their development more fully reflects the evolution of Wilson Boulevard and commercial enterprises than residential development. Additionally, the four blocks to the south of 13th Street, between Washington Boulevard, Wilson Boulevard, and North Hartford Street have been excluded from the district. These blocks were not originally part of Lyon Village and are more clearly associated with the Clarendon Commercial District. In fact, a number of these buildings are contributing to the Clarendon Commercial District.

Kirkwood Road primarily creates the western boundary. The additions to Lyon Village, platted between the 1930s and 1950s, are situated between the Cruit tract to the east and Kirkwood Road to the west. Contributing to the historic district, these additions include part of the "Alonzo Hayes Plan" (1945), "La Porte's First Addition" (1952), "Culler's Second Addition" (1956), "Baldwin's First and Second Additions" (1957), "Mitchell's Addition" (1958), and "Butler's Addition" (1965). These later additions to Lyon Village are in keeping with the construction patterns and resources that were constructed throughout Lyon Village in the early 20th century. As such, the additions are a reflection of the evolution of the historic district, although a number of the resources are denoted as non-contributing simply because of their construction dates. At the southwest corner of the district are townhouses that are currently being constructed. A number of historic resources were demolished to allow for the construction of these buildings. As these modern buildings are not consistent with the neighboring historic resources in form, ornament, or scale, they have been excluded from the district.

The northernmost boundary of the district is situated along Lee Highway. Like Wilson Boulevard, Lee Highway was established as a thoroughfare before the American Revolution. Likewise, it provides the residents of Lyon Village with access to commercial services. With the advent of the automobile, Lee Highway has emerged as a major commuter corridor with modern gas stations and services, as well as some late 20th century domestic buildings, replacing historic buildings. These modern buildings, erected during the last half of the 20th century, have been excluded from the historic district, as they are not compatible with the contributing resources within the Lyon Village Historic District.

LYON VILLAGE HISTORIC DISTRICT, ARLINGTON COUNTY, VA

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The easternmost boundary lies along North Veitch Street, connecting Lyon Village with the Courthouse center to the southeast. North Veitch Street originally lay in Aurora Heights, which has been subsumed within the Lyon Village Historic District. A few domestic resources have been excluded from the district along North Veitch Street because they were replacement and/or infill housing erected in the latter part of the 20th century and do not reflect the architectural evolution of Lyon Village. Furthermore, the Francis Scott Key School at the intersection of North Veitch Street and Key Boulevard has been excluded. This school has undergone numerous additions and alterations, with the original building subsumed within the circa 1999 addition. The adjacent buildings to the south of the school have also been omitted from the district. The high-rise buildings, consisting of apartments above commercial space, are not consistent in form, date of construction, style, and type to the contributing resources of Lyon Village.

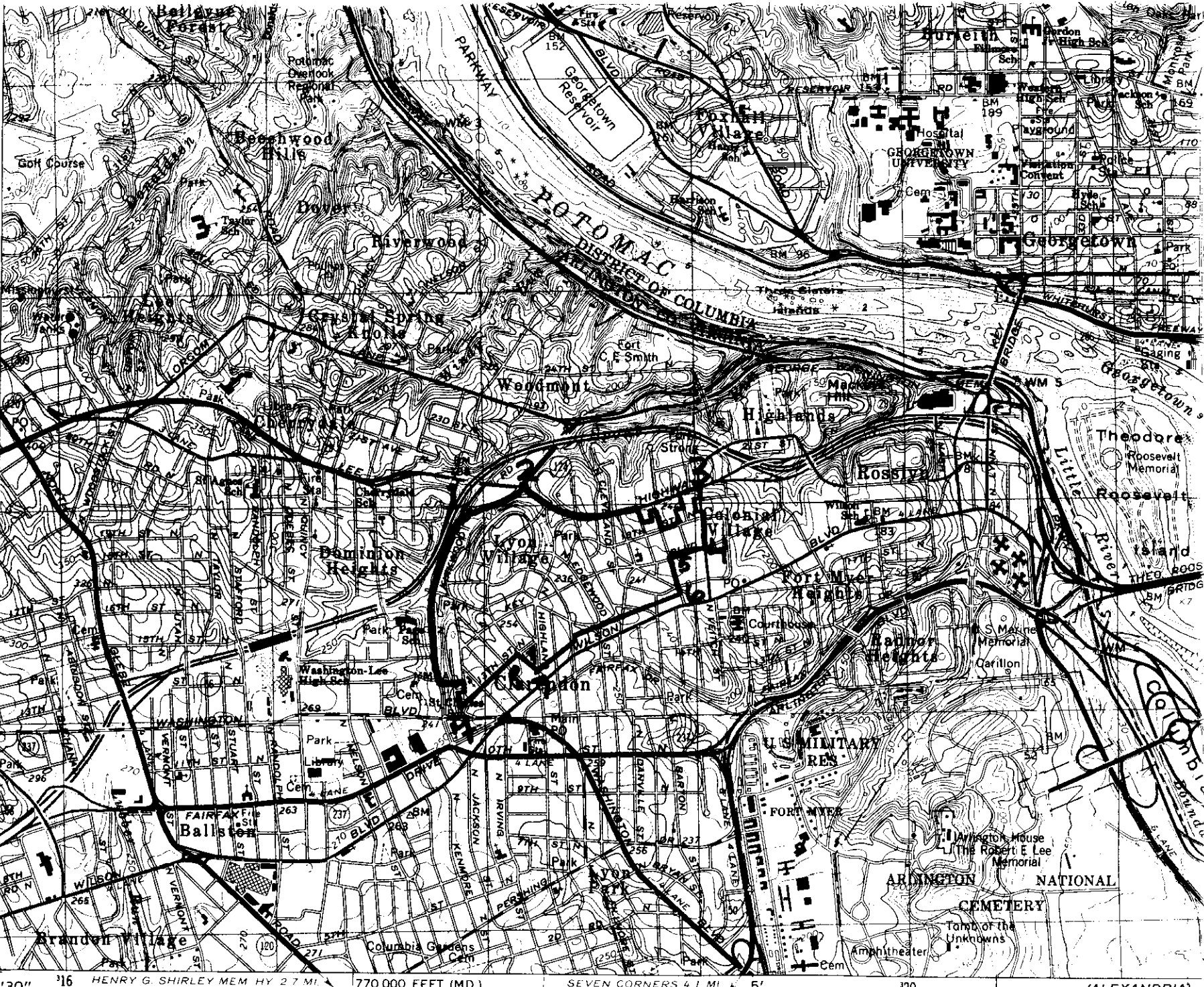

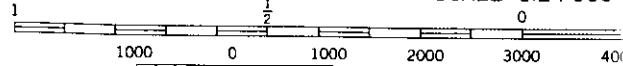
