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Narrative Description:

The Ballard-Maupin House (Plainview Farm) is located on a 56.32-acre property, approximately four acres of which are included in this nomination, on the east side of Ballard's Mill Road (County Route 671), one mile west of Free Union in northwestern Albemarle County. The four contributing historic resources on the nominated property include three buildings (the main house and two outbuildings) and one site (a spring). There are not any non-contributing resources. The main house consists of three clearly identifiable sections. The original part of the house is the one-story with attic, three-bay, gable-roofed, frame section on the east. Architectural evidence, including the use of beaded ceiling joists, rose-headed nails, and some ogee moulding on the interior, suggests that this section probably dates from the 1750-1790 period. Archival research suggests it was built by the settler Thomas Ballard. Around 1800-1820, the house was extended on the west by an additional two bays and an attic story was added. Most of the interior woodwork of both sections of the house, including handsome reeded mantels and paneled wainscot, date from this remodeling. In the late 19th-century, during its ownership by the Maupin family, a shed-roofed frame addition with a porch was added to the present rear (north) elevation. Several changes to room forms were carried out in the 1930s. In 1994-1995, the present owners removed the late-19th century addition, and replaced it with a modern kitchen and dining room addition. They also restored the interiors of the two earliest sections of the house to their original appearance. The house is in excellent condition throughout. Also on the property are a mid-19th century, gable-roofed, frame shed; and frame tractor shed that may date to the mid 1940s.

Location

The Ballard-Maupin House (Plainview Farm) is located on 56.32-acre property, of which approximately four acres are included in this nomination. The Ballard-Maupin House is located on the east side of Ballard's Mill Road (County Route 671), approximately one mile west of Free Union in northwestern Albemarle County, Virginia. The surrounding topography is gently rolling with views of the Blue Ridge Mountains to the north and west. Its immediate surroundings consist of fenced pasture land. Wards Creek flows to the north of the house; Rocky Creek flows to the south, and there is an active spring found between the main house and the road. The main house and outbuildings are reached by a short gravel drive leading east from Ballard's Mill Road.

The three contributing historic resources on the property including three buildings: the main house, a shed, and a tractor shed. There are no non-contributing resources within the nominated boundaries.

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Exterior Description

The Ballard-Maupin House is oriented north-south and measures approximately 34 feet wide and 30 feet deep. The house consists of three clearly identifiable sections. The one-story, three-bay, single-pile, gable-roofed frame section with rubble stone foundation on the east is the oldest part of the house and probably dates from the 1750-1790 period. Although mostly covered with modern weatherboard siding, the south face of this section retains its original beaded, flush, tongue-in-groove horizontal board siding. The attic collar tie is ship lapped with rose-headed nails and the rafters are pegged and mortised.

This section of the house features an off-center entrance flanked by windows with 9/6 double-hung sash. The east window retains the early moulded frame; the west window is a modern replacement. There is a window with 6/6 double-hung sash on the east gable end. Much of the original handmade glass is still intact in the sashes. The six-panel wooden door with applied mouldings dates from the early-1800s. A buttressed brick chimney laid in Flemish bond on all three exposed sides is on the east gable end. It has a modern brick stack. This section of the house originally consisted of a single room on the first story connected to an attic loft by a winder stair in the northwest corner (since removed).

Evidence for the proposed 1750-1790 construction date for this section of the house includes the many wrought iron rose-head nails used in the rivens, the exposed beaded ceiling joists, and an ogee moulding around the north door. The random-width, heart pine floor seems original. Most of the rest of the interior woodwork in this original portion of the house dates from the early-1800s.

Sometime between 1800 and 1820, the original house was enlarged and remodeled significantly. A two-bay, single-pile, frame addition was constructed on the west, and the two sections were raised by an additional one-half story with a gable roof. The two sections were joined by a connecting door, and additional outside entrances were placed on both the north and south elevations. This later section of the house has a 9/6 double-hung sash window on the south and a 6/6 double-hung sash window on the west. The south door has six panels with applied mouldings, moulded trim, and a spoon latch. The north door has beaded vertical board, with HL hinges and a spoon latch. Both doors date from the early-1800s. Four-pane, fixed-sash windows are on the attic level of each gable end. There is a brick chimney on the west gable end. It is laid in a five-course bond on a raised, rubble-stone foundation. Portions of the two gable-roofed dormers with 6/6 double-hung sash and moulded surrounds may date from the late-1800s/early-1900s.

The one-story, shed-roofed frame south porch with chamfered posts is a replacement of a 19th-century porch torn down in the late-19th or early-20th centuries. Evidence for this porch and part of a chamfered post and bed moulding was found in the northeast corner during the 1994-1995 restoration.

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In the late 19th century, a one-story, shed-roofed frame addition with a porch was added to the north elevation. By this time, the front of the house was oriented toward the north. On the interior, a closet was inserted between the two oldest rooms on the south and the center window was sealed. The stair, previously accessed from the north porch, became an interior stairway. In the early-1900s, the original beaded weatherboard siding was replaced by asbestos shingle siding. During the first half of the 20th century, several historic outbuildings, including a summer kitchen and smokehouse, were torn down.

In 1994-1995, the present owners undertook a thorough restoration and renovation of the house. The late-19th century addition was removed and replaced with the present one-story, shed-roofed, frame addition. This addition contains a dining room, kitchen, and two baths. Its stone chimney on the east was retained. The asbestos siding was removed and replaced with modern weatherboard siding. Exterior mouldings, window sizes, and doors were designed to be in character with the original section of the house. On the interior, the original room configuration was restored and floors, woodwork, and windows cleaned and repaired as necessary. The remaining outbuildings were stabilized and rehabilitated.

Interior Description

For the purpose of the interior description, the Ballard-Maupin House consists of two parts: the 18th- and early-19th-century sections on the south, and the 1994-1995 addition on the north.

The south section of the house consists of two rooms of unequal size on the first floor, an enclosed stairway, and two attic rooms. Although the east room is older than the rest of the house, the entire south section of the house was remodeled in the early-1800s and little of the original 18th-century fabric remains. The east room, now used as a living room, features random-width pine floors, moulded baseboard trim, and a paneled wainscot and moulded pedestal chair rail. There are doors on the south, north, and west. The south and north doors are original, the west door was cut into the wall in the 1800-1820 remodeling. The doors have moulded three-piece architrave trim. There is a closet at the northwest corner, approximately where the original winder stair was. Beaded ceiling joists were covered with plaster sometime in the 19th century, but were exposed during the 1994-1995 restoration. The fact that they were beaded suggests that they were originally intended to be exposed. The second floor floorboards are delicately planed on their undersides. A portion of the original plaster walls is also still visible on the west.

The fireplace mantel is one of the most significant architectural features in this room It consists of a moulded surround, paired reeded pilasters with moulded caps and bases, a wide frieze with a reeded center panel, and a moulded mantel shelf with projecting corners. Although the carving shows fine craftsmanship, the design is somewhat provincial in character, particularly the horizontally reeded center panel. The brick hearth and firebox are not original.

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The west room features pine floors, moulded baseboard trim, a paneled wainscot, and a moulded pedestal chair rail. There are doors on the south, north, and east. All have moulded three-piece architrave trim. The trim around the north door has an ogee design that may be somewhat older than that found elsewhere in the house. It may have been moved here from the east room. This entrance features a batten door with beaded boards, a spoon latch, and HL hinges with leather washers. This door was moved six inches (6") to the west during the 1994-1995 restoration to conform with county building codes. There is a closet in the north corner beneath the stairs.

The fireplace mantel is similar to that in the east room, although simpler in design. It features a moulded surround, reeded pilasters without caps or bases, a plain frieze, and a moulded mantel shelf with projecting corners, as well as a projecting center section.

The stairway on the north dates from the 1800-1820 expansion. It leads from what was originally the rear porch, but is now a hall in the 1994-1995 section. The stair has fifteen (15) steps with moulded treads and very wide diagonal beaded tulip poplar wall boards. There is a small closet at the top of the steps with a vertical-board door with spoon latch and HL hinges. The two attic rooms (currently used as bedrooms) both have batten doors with beaded edges. The door on the west has HL hinges with leather washers and an upside-down wooden box lock. All three doors have moulded architrave trim.

The rear addition, built in 1994-1995, consists of a kitchen, dining room, closet, and two bathrooms. There is an outside entrance and hall on the north. Mouldings, floors, ceiling heights, and windows closely match those in the original sections of the house. The dining room features a stone hearth and chimneybreast.

Outbuildings

A one-story, one-bay, gable-roofed frame shed with metal standing-seam roof stands approximately 30 feet north of the main house. It is sheathed with vertical boards and rests on a rubble-stone foundation. There is a vertical board door with butterfly hinges on the south. This shed appears to date from the mid-19th century and is in good condition.

A one-story, four-bay, shed-roofed frame tractor shed is located approximately 30 feet northeast of the other shed. It dates from the early-20th century (with sections that may date as late as the mid 1940s), and is in good condition.

Statement of Significance:

The Ballard-Maupin House (Plainview Farm) is significant under Criterion C on the local level as an example of a well-preserved, early vernacular domestic building in Albemarle County. Architectural evidence and archival research suggests that a portion of the house may date from the 1750-1790 period. This portion was probably built by Thomas Ballard, one of the earliest settlers in the Free Union area. Less than a dozen houses are known to date from this period in Albemarle County. The majority of the house dates from the 1800-1820 period and was probably built by one of Ballard's sons. The level of craftsmanship evident in the extensive hand-carved woodwork and mantels is unusual for a vernacular house of this period. The house received several small additions in the 19th century. The present owners have built a sympathetic addition on the north. The outbuildings are remanants of the working farm that was at his site well into the 1940s.

Historical Background

Although the earliest history of this property is unclear, it may have been part of a 400-acre parcel sold by William Ballard to Thomas Ballard in 1750 (Louisa County Deed Book A, page 403). The oldest part of the present house was probably built by Thomas Ballard sometime after this date. Only a few other houses from this period survive in Albemarle County, and, like the Ballard-Maupin House, they are simple, vernacular houses that have received several additions since their original date of construction. Thomas Ballard gave his house, spring, and all lands south of Rocky Creek to his son James Ballard, Sr., with the remaining land going to his other son John (Albemarle County Deed Book 13, page 475).

Architectural evidence indicates an extensive remodeling and expansion of the house after 1800. This coincides with the transfer of the house and property with the death of James Ballard, Sr. in 1804 (Albemarle County Will Book 4, page 162). The house was inherited by his son James Ballard, Jr. The architect/builder of this newly expanded residence for James Ballard, Jr. is unknown, but its uniformly high-quality woodwork is unusual for an otherwise vernacular dwelling in a relatively remote area of Albemarle County.

By 1854, James Ballard and his wife Sarah Ann had moved to New York City and had sold their 130-acre farm to Gabriel Maupin for \$1,950. At Gabriel Maupin's death in 1866, his holdings were divided among his children. Lucy Maupin (who had married her cousin James R. Maupin) inherited the 130 acres, the house, outbuildings, and the spring. In 1877, James R. Maupin sold the farm to another cousin, John D. Maupin.

On John D. Maupin's death in 1904, his land was further divided and 55 acres with the house, outbuildings, and spring went to his wife Elizabeth F. Maupin. Thomas R. and Virginia Via Maupin moved to the house and farm in 1934 and renamed it "Plainview Farm". They took down the original paneling in the second floor rooms, removed the plaster and lath throughout the house, put in closets between the east and west rooms, thereby boarding up the western 9/6 window in the east room, and altered the front porch. Most of the farm's outbuildings were torn down during their ownership.

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The present owners have carefully restored the house. They removed the asymmetrical and dilapidated kitchen wing on the rear, and replaced it with a shed-roofed wing in keeping with the scale of the original house. They restored the original floor plan of the front two rooms and removed the 20th century closet. The house, including woodwork, floors, windows, and chimneys is in excellent condition throughout.


