### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Harnsberger octagonal barn is set on the west bank of a field overlooking Middle River west of the small community of Mount Meridian. The frame barn is one of three octagonal structures in the northern Augusta and southern Rockingham county area clearly inspired by Orson Fowler's book on octagonal houses. Although this building adopted a novel shape, it continued the local bank barn tradition in both form and use. Fowler also had advocated a bank setting "so that the farmer can drive in on his main floor several feet above the foundation." Sliding doors on the west side provide such an entrance, with a central octagonal focus for turning around wagons and equipment. The main floor design did not utilize "different bays for different things" to economize space as Fowler suggested, but instead enclosed hay storage space to the north and south sides of the central wagon floor, in the usual local manner. The builders constructed the traditional forebay on the lower end of the barn, here across three sides, to provide access into the cattle stalls. The partitions and mangers on this lower level again are arranged on an east/west axis, as on the main level, rather than radiating from the center as Fowler suggested.

The major heavy structural framing members remain, although several rafters, studs, and floor boards have been replaced. When this restoration work was completed in 1978, aluminum siding and a tin roof were added. The taller, lattice-work cupola shown in a 1950s photograph has been cut off to the present, lower octagonal shape.

### BOUNDARY JUSTIFICATION

The nominated acreage of the Octagonal Barn consists of an acre and a half of land on the west bank of a field overlooking the Middle River at Highway 256. It represents a fraction of the acreage of the original farm owned by Robert Harnsberger in 1867.

#### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Harnsberger octagonal barn was built ca. 1867 under the direction of carpenter William Evers. The unusual structure is possibly a unique example of its type in Virginia and reflects the penetration of popular architectural ideals into the vernacular cultural patterns of rural Augusta County after the Civil War. While most local carpenters were constructing the familiar bank barns, a form which derived from the Pennsylvania region and spread into the Valley of Virginia, Robert Harnsberger drew inspiration from the octagonal building styles popularized by Orson Fowler's A Home for All, or the Gravel Wall and Octagon Mode of Building (1853). The Harnsberger barn did not copy Fowler's pattern book designs directly, however. Augusta builders combined these new ideas with more traditional barn building concepts, integrating the new shape with the older bank barn form. Several older residents recall that the basic octagonal shape posed many problems for the local carpenters, who failed to get the barn to fit together correctly and called in others, specifically William Evers of Centerville, to complete it.

### BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Robert Samuel Harnsberger acquired the farm in 1867 and had the barn built soon thereafter. He obviously was aware of this octagonal style through his brother Stephen M. Harnsberger's octagonal house, only two miles to the northeast along the South River. The two buildings are rare examples of the Fowler mode in the Valley of Virginia and suggest the prominence and sophistication of the Harnsberger family. The Harnsbergers had extensive landholdings in the area and were involved in the incorporation of the town of Grottoes along the South River in the late 19th century.

The barn has been used for agricultural purposes since its construction. The Harnsbergers only owned the farm until 1880, when it was acquired by the Felger family. The present owner, Dwight Houff, restored the barn in 1978 after he purchased it from the Fultons, who had owned it since 1917.
