Greenway Court was in Fairfax's time a small complex of buildings. The main building was a story-and-a-half structure with long sloping roof in back and front. There were chimneys studded with swallow and martin coops at each end of the house. Two small belfries were evenly spaced on top of the roof in between the two end chimneys. The front roof was pierced by four dormer windows and sloped down in the old Virginia fashion into low projecting eaves that formed a verandah extending along the entire length of the house. From the flagstone pavement of this porch one looked out across a terraced lawn to a green meadow and the Blue Ridge. Negro servants lived in log huts scattered about in the woods. The only other significant structure was the limestone Land Office, 28.4 ft. x 18.4 ft., where quit rents were received and land records kept.

The main building at Greenway Court was intended to be the steward's house (explaining the belfries) and the first of a series of buildings. None of the others were ever built. Of the main building put up by Fairfax, nothing now remains. When the roof collapsed in 1834, the rest of the house was torn down. The Land Office still stands. It was probably built in 1762, when the land records were transferred to Greenway Court. The door is made of hewn boards given double thickness by other boards laid diagonally on the inside and secured to those on the outside by hand-wrought clinched nails. The limestone walls, 28.4 ft. x 18.4 ft., are extremely thick. The four narrow windows are fitted with heavy wrought iron staples and hooks for the purpose of boarding up the windows at night. The fireplace has a triangular flagstone hearth. The building was restored in 1930, but has deteriorated since then with disuse.

Nearby is a log smokehouse, 10 ft. x 10 ft. of hewn logs squared, which instead of being notched at the ends are fitted into four upright corner posts by a sort of tongue and groove arrangement. The walls are nine feet high and are surmounted by a conical roof with a flat overhang of about three feet. The door is 5 ft. 3 in x 3 ft. and 3 in. thick; its construction is similar to that of the Land Office door. This building, like the Land Office, is suffering from disuse but still sturdy.

The brick farmhouse at Greenway Court was built around 1828 and is in use as a private residence today.

BOUNDARIES: Greenway Court is located on the property of J.C. Digges, a farmer. He runs a modern farm and is not interested in maintaining the historic buildings on his land. Since the rest of the Digges property has been enormously altered since the time of Lord Fairfax, the boundaries include only that parcel of land, about ⁵ acres, containing the Land Office, Smokehouse, and 1828 brick building.

As shown by the bright red line on the accompanying copy of an aerial photograph, labelled "J.C. Digges & Sons, Inc." and initialled as being accurate in 1974, from a point on a side road running west from Virginia Route 658, at the junction of lot P18 (1.7 acres) and the road, proceed north along the western
