#### DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Woodlawn, or the Trible House, is a story-and-a-half, two-bay, gambrel-roofed frame structure with a rear lean-to. Its low, brick basement is laid in three-course American bond, and a random American bond is employed under the lean-to. The two end chimneys on the southwest side are also laid in three-course American-bond. The front chimney has two sets of stepped weatherings, and the rear chimney has one long stepped weathering roughly following the slope of the roof. A pent sheltering the basement entrance connects the two, and there is another pent serving the basement closet at the north end of the chimneys. The front window has 8/12 sash, with 6/9 sash used on the southwest side, 6/6 sash on the northeast, 3/6 sash on the southeast (rear), and 4/4 sash in the two shed-roofed dormers on the front slope of the roof. Plain weatherboards clad the sides of the house, and standing-seam sheet metal covers the roof.

Woodlawn originally had a single-pile, side-passage plan, which was altered to a double-pile plan by the addition of the lean-to in 1840. The present stair rises from the rear of the passage and was installed at the time of the addition. The full basement has a dining room under the original section and a storage room under the rear.

All of the trim is plain but well-crafted. The basement dining room mantel has a plain surround and molded unsupported shelf. In the front room on the first floor was a handsome federal mantel consisting of fluted pilasters supporting a tall frieze with plain entablature blocks and central tablet. The whole was surmounted by a tall, molded cornice shelf. This mantel was stolen during renovation but has been reproduced from measured drawings made in 1976.

All of the doors in the house have five raised panels: a single panel at the top replaces the usual two square panels of a six-panel door. Most of these doors have wooden string latches of varying ages, some original and some made during this century by one of the last Tribles to live there.

A 19th-century smokehouse with a rebuilt roof stands behind the house. Attached to it is a 20th-century shed chicken house with a board roof, a 20th-century example of a feature rare after the early 19th century.

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## BOUNDARY JUSTIFICATION

The boundaries have been drawn arbitrarily to include the house and the five acres of open field surrounding it and the above-mentioned outbuildings.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Built in two sections in the first half of the 19th century by the Haile family, Wood-lawn was owned through most of its existence by the Trible family. The original one-room-and-passage house is an excellent specimen of a class of small, single-cell dwellings built in great numbers in the late 18th and early 19th centuries. As such, it reflects the newly acquired ability of modest Virginia farmers to build substantial dwellings. The house retains many later features, such as wooden latches and a board-roofed outbuilding, which exhibit an unaltered continuity of rural folk life rarely found in Tidewater Virginia houses.

In 1816, John Haile, Jr. of Essex County sold his old farm and purchased the present Woodlawn tract of 214½ acres. Haile died ca. 1820, and the land books of that year credited his estate with the land and \$150 worth of buildings. The latter was probably the front section of the present house. The valuation and ownership (John Haile estate) remained unchanged until 1840, when George N. Trible bought the property and increased the buildings to \$350 value. This suggests that the lean-to was added in that year and that the house decoration may have been improved then as well. Trible died ca. 1848, and George Hill bought the house in that year. The property, first called Woodlawn in 1852, was sold by Hill's son Albert Hill in 1857 to Richard Atkins, from whom Adolphus Norris purchased it in 1868. Samuel Trible married Norris's sister Atway Norris and the property remained in Trible hands until it was sold in 1974. The present owner, Miss Peggy Vahle, is renovating the house.
