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The Point of Fork arsenal site, as rebuilt after the Revolution, consisted of three or four large buildings of frame, brick, and stone plus several houses, barns, quarters for the troops, and other buildings necessary to the community.

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The ruins of two buildings may be seen today. The smaller ruin is twenty-four feet square and was once vaulted into two rooms, clearly marking it as the stone magazine of 1788. The other ruin is rectangular and is probably one of the "longhouse" arsenals frequently mentioned in the records.

Also known to have existed are a one-story (40' x 15½') stone magazine, a mill built circa 1786, an arsenal of 1788 (40' x 20'), and an office erected in 1791. The site is on an open hilltop pasture on a private farm.

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8. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

It is not known precisely when an arsenal was established at Point of Fork but the earliest existing documents date from 1781. The arsenal was raided on June 5, 1781 by Lt. Col. John Graves Simcoe, Commander of the Queen's Rangers, in a move coinciding with Tarleton's raid on the legislature at Charlottesville. Buildings were burned and supplies destroyed.

After the war, new buildings were erected on or near the sites of the original structures, and Point of Fork was operated as a state arsenal from 1783 until 1801 when it was abandoned in favor of a better-situated arms manufactory at Richmond.

During its brief history, the arsenal was used for the manufacture and repair of arms and equipment, and as a stockpile of weapons for fighting the Indians on the frontier. In 1794 the arsenal supplied arms to the federal army, to the Virginia militia to suppress the Whiskey Rebellion in Pennsylvania, and to the Fallen Timbers campaign in Ohio.

Future archaelogical exploration, in conjunction with written records, may provide a more complete picture of Virginia's only eighteenth century post-Revolutionary arsenal. (See attached sheet for Bibliography)
