The Rock Castle estate consists of scenic farmlands and woodlands situated on a high bluff overlooking the upper James River. The original house, now known as the Queen Anne Cottage, stands several hundred feet from its original location. The house is a small, five-bay, story-and-a-half frame structure with clipped gable ends and two interior end chimneys. The cornice on both front and back features large unscrolled modillions. The entrance motif is individually treated; it has a single eight panel door flanked by solid panels in much the same manner as sidelights.

Except for two window walls, the first floor of the house is fully paneled. Each room on either side of the hall has a segmental arched fireplace flanked by windowed chimney closets. The staircase features a finely molded hand rail, vase-and-column balusters, and scrolled stair ends. The two second-floor rooms are very plain and have little wood trim, while the new basement rooms have been outfitted with modern facilities.

The Queen Anne Cottage is fronted by a brick wall which surrounds an extensive formal garden set between the house and the modern Normandy manor-style house. The modern house is a picturesque but sizeable brick structure and is dramatically located at the edge of a steep incline which leads to the James River bottom lands. Just to the south of the house is the original site of the Queen Anne Cottage.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Rock Castle, named for a high rock bluff overlooking the James River, was patented in 1718 by Charles Fleming of New Kent County. Colonel William Byrd II referred to Rock Castle in his "Progress to the Mines," in 1732, indicating that the house was standing by this time. The house was built by Tarleton Fleming, son of Charles Fleming, and was inherited by his son Tarleton in 1750. The second Tarleton Fleming married Mary Randolph of nearby Tuckahoe, and it was he who owned Rock Castle when, in 1781, Lieutenant Colonel Banastre Tarleton stopped at the house on his return from the unsuccessful attempt to capture Thomas Jefferson and the Virginia Legislators at Charlottesville. Seeing the Tarleton coat of arms displayed above the parlor fireplace by a patriot, Tarleton set fire to the house and carried off the coat of arms. The servants extinguished the fire with little damage to the house.

In 1843 Rock Castle was purchased by John Rutherfoord, Governor of Virginia from 1841 to 1842. His son, John Coles Rutherfoord, built an Italianate front onto the house and laid out the garden. The house was raided by a marauding company of Federal cavalry under General Philip H. Sheridan in 1865. In 1908 Mrs. George Ben Johnston, daughter of John Coles Rutherfoord, restored and improved the garden. James Osborne bought the property in 1935 and decided to erect a Norman manor-style house on the site of the first house. During the dismantling, the original house underneath the Italianate-style villa was discovered. The house was moved several hundred feet to a new location on the property and today stands facing the same direction it did when originally built. The restoration and moving of Rock Castle was carried out under the direction of Herbert Claiborne, who also designed the new house. From the time the house was moved and restored, it has been known as the Queen Anne Cottage, while the estate retains the name of Rock Castle.
