Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The Rife House is located on a large lot in the rural landscape along U.S. 460/11 northeast of Shawsville. The weatherboarded two-story frame house incorporates a flat-topped hipped roof with cast iron ornamental cresting. The north and south sides and the west front incorporate two-story undercut bays beneath projecting gables. The cornice is equipped with modillion blocks, and the gables incorporate windows with The west gable has a Palladian window with diagonal muntins. keystone. The one-over-one double-hung sash windows are equipped The first-floor windows have leaded with added modern blinds. There is an irregular chimney arrangement. A onetransoms. story porch wraps around the north, south, and west walls supported by Doric columns on pedestals and equipped with a turned balustrade. The porch is curved where it wraps around the An undercut two-story porch with sawn brackets and turned house. balusters is located at the rear (east). The basement is lit by windows in a stuccoed masonry foundation. Cornerboards on the weatherboarded walls feature small capitals. A contributing frame outbuilding of early twentieth-century date is located to the east of the house adjacent to a noncontributing modern The outbuilding, probably a meathouse, has a slate roof. garage.

The interior features a series of three rooms along the north side, and a stair hall behind the entry door on the south with two rooms behind. The irregular and complex floor plan is atypical of regional traditional floor plans and marks the house as an example of popular pattern-book-influenced Queen Anne-style architecture. The interior features simple molded trim, Queen Anne mantels, and an open stringer stair in the entry hall.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The Rife House is eligible under criterion C as an unusually large and stylish house incorporating decorative and planning elements adapted from published pattern books. There are very few Queen Anne houses in Montgomery County. The Rife House is the only nominated example in rural Montgomery. The other Queen Anne houses included in this submission are in urban areas and few in number. The Lee House in the Cambria Historic District (154-12) and The Oaks (154-1-5) in the East Main Street Historic District, are good examples. One of the best Queen Anne houses, the Black House in Blacksburg (now Hoy-McCoy Funeral Home), has been severely altered and is not eligible.

The richness of decorative treatment and the choice of unusual materials such as iron cresting and slate roofing mark the house as the home of a wealthy family. The interior, though somewhat altered by the installation of lowered ceilings, retains most of its features, and the alterations are reversible. The frame outbuilding along with the house demonstrate the form and use of domestic space in the period.

K. M. Rife, the first owner of the house, came to the Shawsville vicinity from the coalfields of western Virginia and exhibited his wealth and taste by erecting this home (Hawes). Deed research indicates that K. M. Rife purchased 279 acres in 1904, formerly known as the Ryan Farm, from J. W. Walters and his wife Lola for \$6,000.00 (Deed Book 51, p. 348). The nearby home of Captain "Black" Barger, Walnut Grove (60-451, part of this submission), was built on a grander scale by another wealthy man who made his wealth in the coal fields near Bluefield, West Virginia.
