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Approximately twelve miles southwest of Lovingston in Nelson County, adjacent to the James River Wildlife Management Area on Route 743 near the James River stands historic Midway Mill. Constructed in 1787, minor alterations to the fabric of the mill took place about 1810, but it has remained basically unchanged since then. The terrain around the mill is quite hilly and the mill stream has many branches in the area.

Said to have been constructed by master Italian shipwrights, the 42-story masonry structure is best known for its magnificently dressed stonework and fine interior joinery. The structure is rectangular in plan, of stone construction with granite lintels and sills on all the door and window The stones are laid in uncoursed ashlar: each stone cut to evenly join the next. The mortar joints are well executed. The roof has frame gables and is covered with heavy slates. The facade is five bays in length with two entry doorways in the second and fourth bays. The doorways contain the original Dutch doors with rosehead nail studding. elevations are of two bays and three staggered bays on the fourth floor. The walls are three feet thick at their base and have splayed window reveals, The sash is twelve-over-twelve and appears to be original. There are four openings in the frame gable.

Although little remains of the mill's exterior water wheel, most of the early mill machinery is intact, but is inoperable at the present time. Much of the machinery, including the gears, is made of wood, and is of unusually fine craftsmanship. The wood framing of Midway Mill is also noteworthy. Huge handhewn beams constitute the main supporting means of each floor. All lumber is of top grade chestnut and other premium woods.

To the rear of the mill, there is a well-executed arched stone bridge over the old mill stream bed. The bridge has a fine keystone and is in good condition.

The Simpson House, located on a high hill overlooking Midway Mill is the longfime home of the Simpson family, operators of the Midway Mill (Simpson) Plantation during the nineteenth century. This late-nineteenth century house is wood frame, "T" shaped in plan on a brick basement. A tetrastyle porch stretches the entire length of the three-bay facade and the center bay projects. Elaborate bargeboards grace the end gables and the center gable. The windows have two-over-two sash.

At the present time, the Simpson House is undergoing a thorough restoration. Restoration work on the Midway Mill is to commence in the near future.

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Midway Mill is located on land that once was part of a large plantation owned by William R. Cabell, Covernor of Virginia from 1805 to 1808. Cabell had the mill built in 1787. The name "Midway" was chosen because the mill was situated at the halfway point on the James River between Lynchburg and Richmond. It is said that the mill was constructed by master Italian shipwrights. A group of about twenty of these men had become stranded in Virginia following the cancellation of a ship construction project for which they had been brought over from Europe. The quality of the mill's stonework and joinery does show that the builders were highly skilled craftsmen.

During the ante bellum period the James River and Kanawha Canal passed in front of the mill, and the large stone structure became a familiar landmark for passengers. The canal traffic prompted the establishment of a small settlement at the mill, containing passenger station, post office, and general store. The mill's owner, William H. Cabell, at one time served as chairman of the James River and Kanawha Canal Company.

Midway Mill has remained basically unchanged following some minor alterations undertaken in 1810. During the War Betweeen the States the mill became an important source of flour and meal for Virginians. Milling operations continued until about 1925 when competition and out-dated machinery rendered the mill non-profitable. Following its closing down the mill's various owners made minimum repairs to keep it from falling into ruin. The massive stone walls stand in generally sound condition, but many of the interior fittings are in disrepair.

Nidway Mill remains one of the Commonwealth's few eighteenth century mills. The beautifully constructed building is evidence of the high standards maintained in the building arts of that period.
