#### DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Situated on a ridge northeast of the city of Roanoke, the Denton Monument is surrounded by the modern Tombstone Cemetery, so-called after the monument's popular name, the Old Tombstone.

A monolithic freestone carving marking the grave of nine-year-old Robert Denton, it is four feet long, two feet six inches wide, and, at its thickest, one foot six inches deep. It takes the form of a rectangular slab with clipped corners, upon which rests a ridged hexagonal coffin which is open from its widest point up, exposing the head and torso of a child. There was once a removable lid which covered the corpse, but it has been stolen. The upper and lateral surfaces of the coffin and the slab are inscribed in German, English, and Latin. As one faces the coffin from the feet, the top right panel contains the beginning of "A Famaly Rigester" of Benjamin Denton (b. 1769) and his wife Peggy Anderson (b. 1774), who were married in 1793. The listing is carried over onto the right side panel of the coffin and the adjacent top surface of the slab and records the birth dates of the four Denton children born by the time of Robert's death in 1805. The left top and side surfaces of the coffin are inscribed with a poem in English relating to death, resurrection, and family remembrance; the same poem is repeated in German on the top of the slab and in Latin on the long left vertical side. At the foot of the slab on its vertical surface is carved a moon and three stars; the flanking oblique panels are embellished with baskets of German-style tulips. The head of the slab is decorated with Germanic hearts on the oblique panels; these flank a central panel embellished with the rising sun of resurrection and, in the upper corners, with the artist's signature-"Laurence Krone Ston Mason."

The depredations of vandals have unfortunately prompted the complete enclosure of the monument in a sheet-metal-roofed, chain-link cage, making it difficult to see the stone and virtually impossible to photograph it.

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#### BOUNDARY JUSTIFICATION

The boundary coincides with the perimeter of the concrete base on which the fence-enclosed monument sits -- all measuring approximately  $15' \times 15'$ .

### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Denton Monument, popularly known as the Old Tombstone, is an important product of the traditions of funerary art which flourished in western Virginia in the early nineteenth century. It is a masterwork of Laurence Krone, one of the most skilled Virginia German carvers and the only one known by name. Erected sometime after 1805 to commemorate the death of nine-year-old Robert Denton, the monolithic monument combines decorative elements of the German folk art tradition with sentimental poems in German, Latin, and English. Its representation of the corpse in its coffin is similar to some found in New England. Its form is unique in Virginia yet vividly emblematic of the vitality and eclecticism of folk art and life in early western Virginia.

Laurence Krone (d. 1836) apparently came to America from central Europe in the late eighteenth century, reaching Virginia around 1800. He settled near Wytheville and is responsible for most of the best work in the cemetery at St. John's Lutheran Church, Wytheville (which contains his other masterpiece, the Rev. George Flohr tomb of 1826); the McGavock family graveyard at Fort Chiswell, Wythe County; and several others. He is also known to have carved the gates for the Cloyd family burying ground at Back Creek Farm, Pulaski County.

The Denton Monument, which legend attributes to Krone's gratitude for care received during an illness, is his only signed work, and it is in many ways characteristic of his art. It displays decorative motify popular among German artists -- the hearts, the tulips, the rising sun--and it is generously provided with products of the great lettering ability for which Krone is known and particularly of his singular willingness to carve German Gothic script and to use the German language in general. Other German and British carvers had used coffin representations before Krone, but he seems to have been particularly fond of using them for his larger works. representation of an open coffin displaying a corpse (indeed of any human likeness) is unique in Virginia, so far as is known, but it was not unusual in eighteenthand early nineteenth-century New England. The use of this specific motif in common with the northern states is probably a coincidence, but Krone, drawing upon the resources of ethnically mixed western Virginia for his symbols and decorative details, was expressing with them, as with his trilingual poetry and with the whole notion of a family monument, a new, national tendency to sentimentalize death, childhood, and the family in general. The poem urges the "sweet babe" to "sleep on" secure in the memories of the family whose membership is carefully recorded on the monument, until the archangel calls him to the "blest abode" of God. Denton Monument thus reflects a particular moment of cultural flux when the traditional life of several western Virginia ethnic groups was beginning to meld into a national culture, a process which can be traced in its later developments in other artifacts from the area.
