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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (If known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Beery Farm complex consists of nearly a dozen structures clustered at the base of a steep hill near the junction of Buttermilk and Linville Creeks. The irregular terrain protects the complex from modern intrustion on nearby State route 42.

The rectangular five-bay two-story house is fifty feet long and eighteen feet wide, and has a one-story, three-bay wing to the east. The foundations and walls are random rubble limestone. A long one-story lateninetcenth century porch supported by plain piers with simple brackets and a sawn balustrade runs along the front of the house. A similar one-bay porch shelters a rear door. An interior stone chimney occurs at either end of the main block and at the east end of the wing. The windows and doors have simple molded frames; the wooden double-hung windows have lateninetcenth century two-over-two sash. The house retains a few of its original chevron paneled doors. The gable roofs have a nonoriginal sawn cornice resembling widely spaced dentils ornamenting the eaves of the main block and the wing.

The house has a center hall plan with two rooms with corner fireplaces to the west and a large room to the east. The fireplace in the east room has a carved limestone lintel and a mantel with fluted pilasters, paneled frieze and broad shelf. The walls are plastered and have baseboards and chair rails. The east wing has two doors leading to the exterior. A movable partition which divides the wing space into two rooms may be pushed back to make one large room used as a Mennonite meeting room. A small flight of stairs descends from this room to a tunnel running the entire length of the building and emerging at the west end. This passage leads to a small root cellar at the western extremity.

The most impressive outbuilding is a rare stone bank barn with slotted The end openings appear as slots on the exterior, but widen to ends. provide some light and ventilation on the interior. Three walls are of 0 random rubble limestone; the fourth side is of horizontal siding. The barn is supported by massive hewn timber framing. This structure is one of the few ante-bellum barns surviving in the county.

Northeast of the house is a one-room, one-story random rubble limestone loom house with an interior end chimney. The random rubble limestone singlebay spring house is south of the main house. A tall metal windmill is adjacent to the spring house. At the southwest corner of the complex is a two-room, one-story random rubble building with a massive exterior chimney, and two entrances. This structure probably served as a wash house and kitchen. Several other later outbuildings are of wood, including a granary sheds, an outhouse and other assorted necessary farm buildings. A stone mounting block remains in front of the house.

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STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

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The Beery Farm comprises one of the most picturesque and complete early nineteenth century rural homesteads of the Valley of Virginia. Nestled in a secluded vale in the beautiful Linville Creek area of Rockingham County, the nearly one dozen household and farm-supporting structures express the self-sufficiency of the early Valley settlers. Unlike the Tidewater planters, the Valley farmers of Pennsylvania origin generally had few servants or slaves and ran their farms and households with the help of their family. As a result, the house, outbuildings, barn, granary and sheds were all arranged in a single convenient grouping typified by the Beery Farm complex.

The impressive limestone bank barn is one of the handful of antebellum barns in the region to escape destruction by the troops of General Philip Sheridan. The dwelling house has particular architectural interest as a result of its blending of Scotch-Irish and German building traditions. The Scotch-Irish influence is seen in the plan and the placement of the chimneys, while the German influence is evident in the fine stonework and decorative details. An unusual feature is a special wing often used for religious services.

The Beery family was originally from Switzerland and settled in Adams County, Pennsylvania around 1736. They migrated to Rockingham County some fifty years later. John K. Beery built the present house and outbuildings in 1838-39 on land purchased by his father in 1796. The Beerys were strict Mennonites, belonging to a branch who opposed the use of church buildings for religious services. The meeting room in the east wing of the house served a large congregation of Mennonites for a number of years.
