# NARRATIVE DESCRIPTION

The Danville National Cemetery is located at 721 Lee Street, within the corporate limits of the city of Danville, Virginia, one mile from the depot of the Richmond and Danville Railroad. The main entrance on Lee Street has 8-foot, 6-inch-wide wrought iron entry gates attached to concrete pillars, with a 3-foot-wide pedestrian gate on the side. The pedestrian gate is attached to a stone pier. The cemetery is surrounded by a stone wall (1,590 linear feet) approximately four feet high.

The cemetery was established in December 1866, and is of an oblong shape. It is divided into ten burial sections by numerous walks and drives intersecting one another at right angles. All graves are marked with upright marble headstones, except for four group burials, which are marked with flat marble markers.

There is one Lincoln's Gettysburg Address plaque and a bronze plaque mounted on an old cannon bearing the inscription "United States Military Cemetery, Danville, established August 14, 1867 - Interments 1314 - Known 1171 Unknown 143." The flagpole is located on a rise in the center where Sections B, C, F, and G meet.

The cemetery officially closed to new interments on October 23, 1970. A small number of interments still occur yearly, which include second interments in occupied graves, interments in reserved gravesites, or interments of cremated remains. As of September 30, 1994, there were 1 uncommitted and 20 reserved gravesites available as well as 26 sites available for the interment of cremated remains.

The original superintendent's lodge was constructed in the early 1870s and demolished in 1928, when the present lodge was built. It is a one and one-half-story brick and stucco structure, with a Swedish gambrel roof covered in asbestos shingles. All windows are double-hung sash with six-over-six lights. The roof has double dormers in the front and rear. The first floor contains a living room with fireplace, dining room, kitchen, 1/2 bath, and a small office. The one-half story above has three bedrooms and a full bath. The basement is unfinished, and there is a front porch.

In the rear of the lodge was a small brick outbuilding that was used as a tool shed, fuel house, etc. This building was demolished in May 1934, and a new 33' x 22', 671-square-foot, brick-and-concrete combination garage/tool house/comfort station constructed. The walls are brick, the foundation and floors are concrete, and the roof is asbestos shingles. In 1936, a 46-square-foot brick-and-concrete gasoline storage building was constructed.

There is a brick compost pit between the utility building and gasoline storage building, which was constructed in June 1949.

### NARRATIVE STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Danville National Cemetery is significant under Criterion A and is an important component of the multiple property submission of Civil War Era National Cemeteries. It is significant because of its association with the Civil War.

The cemetery was established in 1866. Original interments were of the remains of Union soldiers who were prisoners of war and who died in the Confederate Prison at Danville. These prisoners were confined in seven tobacco warehouses situated in the city of Danville about 1/2 to 3/4 mile from the cemetery. The principal causes of death of these prisoners of war were pneumonia, chronic diarrhea, and a disease indicated as "scorbutus," somewhat like scurvy. Those who died at Danville as prisoners of war and interred in the national cemetery were, for the most part, privates, corporals, and sergeants. Many state regiments were represented: Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, Wisconsin, Michigan, New Jersey, Tennessee, Kentucky, Indiana, New York, New Hampshire, Vermont, and various regiments of the U.S. Colored Troops. All available records show that there are 1,170 known and 143 unknown Civil War soldiers buried in this cemetery, the same as the number inscribed on the cannon monument.

There are four group burials in the cemetery, all located in Section K. They are:

<u>Grave 1550</u> - Five (5) Engineers who died on January 8, 1945, and were originally buried in Pietramala, Italy. Their remains were reinterred in the Danville National Cemetery on March 10, 1949.

<u>Grave 1553</u> - Four (4) U.S. Army veterans, who died on December 11, 1944, one (1) who served with the 451st Bomb Squadron, 322 Bomb Group, and were originally buried in Selers-Melum, France. Their remains were reinterred in the Danville National Cemetery on April 21, 1949.

The cemetery, at first, comprised a little more than 2 1/2 acres of land, appraised in 1867 at \$350 per acre. At this price, it was transferred to the United States, in fee simple, on July 19, 1873, \$920.50 being paid for the entire tract. On the same date, a small parcel of land adjoining the original site on the east and south sides (about 4/5 acre) was purchased by the United States from the executor of N. D. Green, deceased, for the sum of \$280.

The present lodge is the second lodge on the site and replaced the lodge that was built in the 1870s and demolished in 1928.


