This pentagon-shaped Fort is a perfect example of its type and is remarkably well preserved. It includes an outer wall about 8 feet high, a moat, and an inner wall 18-20 feet high and covers approximately 7.5 acres, excluding the outer wall and moat. The Crafford family graveyard, the Crafford slave graveyard, three magazines, two bomb-proofed shelters, and seven gun emplacements are contained within.

Also within its walls is the foundation of the colonial house. The house was used as headquarters for the Fort during the War Between the States and in World War I was repaired and used for observing and plotting artillery fire. In 1925 the house was sold by the U. S. Army for forty-five dollars to the College of William and Mary which urgently needed the Colonial bricks to repair the Wren Building.

Located on Mulberry Island Point within the military reservation of present-day Fort Eustis and overlooking the James River is an historic site now known as Fort Crafford which has figured in American history since 1610.


In that year, disheartened colonists plagued with sickness and near starvation decided to give up the settlement at Jamestown and attempt the return journey to England. They were met off Mulberry Island Point by a supply ship from the Mother Country, thus making it possible to continue the first permanent English colony in the New World.

In 1749, Carter Crafford obtained land here, built his home, and operated a ferry between Mulberry Island Point and Isle of Wight on the other side of the James.

It is believed that during the Revolutionary War a fortification was built here by the Patriots to defend the river against British ships and to fend off possible landings by the British attempting to reinforce Yorktown.

Fort Crafford itself dates from the summer of 1861 when it was constructed at General Lee's order to serve as the James River anchor of General "Prince John" Magruder's line which stretched from Yorktown across the Peninsula to Mulberry Island. In conjunction with another fort across the river and with the James River Fleet of gunboats, the Fort served to control the advance of Union shipping and prevented a Union landing on Magruder's right flank. It played a part in the April-May 1862 Peninsular Campaign in which the Union Army advanced from Fort Monroe up the Peninsula in an attempt to take Richmond. Magruder's line, weak as it was, served to delay General McClellan a month, giving the Confederate Army enough time to assemble a force capable of successfully defending Richmond. No major action occurred on Mulberry Island; the fortifications were abandoned 3 May 1862 when the Confederate forces withdrew to Williamsburg.
