The Olde Towne Conservation Project encompasses nearly twenty blocks in the northeastern section of Portsmouth overlooking Crawford Bay. The district's streets are laid out in a grid pattern, with the east-west streets generally more narrow than the north-south streets. Nearly all the streets are tree-lined, and they retain their granite curbs and their brick or stone slab sidewalks. The district is densely built up, primarily containing two- and three-story townhouses set close together on narrow lots. Brick and frame construction is used in nearly equal proportion throughout the area.

While the district is noted chiefly for its many Federal and Greek Revival townhouses, it is also interspersed with numerous post-Civil War and early-twentieth-century structures. Architecturally, the later structures are generally compatible with the earlier ones and serve to unify the block facades.

Nearly all of the Federal and Greek Revival townhouses stand on high English basements, with exterior access to the principal floor gained by a long flight of wooden steps. This arrangement is a characteristic feature of Portsmouth architecture, and it gives the district a distinctive quality.

Although many individual structures have been restored in recent years, the district has never been in a state of serious decay. At present it is about to undergo a general redevelopment, with plans calling for the closing of several streets, the creation of park-like malls and neighborhood parking lots within the blocks.

Portsmouth was founded in 1752 when Colonel William Crawford set aside approximately sixty-five acres of his plantation on the Elizabeth River to be laid off for a town. The new town was named in honor of the great English naval port and dockyard city. The original western boundary of Portsmouth was Court Street, although in 1763 it was extended to Chestnut Street, thus encompassing the entire area of "Olde Towne." Portsmouth was occupied by the British four times during the Revolution, but it did not suffer such extensive damage as Norfolk did. The town, however, retains few structures that can be identified positively as colonial. Most of "Olde Towne's" early structures were built in the Greek Revival period, though several date from the late-eighteenth century.

Predominate throughout "Olde Towne" is the so-called "basement house," an early-nineteenth-century architectural form characteristic of Portsmouth. Because of Portsmouth's low-lying situation, basements could not be dug, and on the town's small lots outside kitchens were not feasible, so the serving and dining areas were located in an above-ground "basement." Perhaps the best example of the "basement house" is the Hill House, built in the first half of the nineteenth century by Captain John Thompson and now used as a house museum and as headquarters of the Portsmouth Historical Association.

Other important houses in the area include the 1799 Watts House, in which Chief Black Hawk and Henry Clay were entertained; the Washington Reed House and the Bain House, two excellent examples of Federal architecture; the recently restored Grice-Neely House, an important Greek Revival townhouse with outstanding iron decoration; and the Nivison-Ball House, an eighteenth-century gambrel roof house moved several blocks in 1869 to its present location on Middle Street. Probably the oldest house in the area, the Nivison-Ball House received both the Marquis de Lafayette and Andrew Jackson.

A significant assemblage of late-eighteenth and nineteenth-century urban architecture, "Olde Towne" is also the only early townscape in the historic Hampton Roads area. The efforts of interested citizens to restore and develop this area to its fullest potential resulted in the establishment in 1968 of the Olde Towne Conservation Project, the first federally-assisted conservation project in Virginia.
