DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Belle Aire is set on a wooded knoll above Lee Highway between Roanoke and Salem. imposing, two-story, double-fronted, L-shaped house is built of brick laid in a variety of bonds. The main, or south, facade is three bays long and is an early example of allstretcher bond. Stuccoed Doric pilasters mark the corners; fixed to the top of the pilasters are original metal downspouts with applied diamond ornaments. The first- and second-floor frontispieces, window frames, and many other details are adapted from Asher Benjamin's The Practical House Carpenter (1830). Both frontispieces are similar to the one illustrated in Benjamin's Plate 28, "Design for a Front Door Case," but with the blocking course deleted and transom lights, more elaborately sculpted symmetrical moldings, and bull's-eye paterae added. The window lintels are derived from Plate 31, "Design for a Window," to which the builder, Benjamin Deyerle, added an additional symmetrically molded element with paterae. The principal feature of this facade is the twostory pedimented portico, which is supported against the house by colossal stuccoed pilasters and at the front by four fluted Doric columns at each level, those on the second floor being somewhat more delicately proportioned than those on the first.

The secondary (west) facade is laid in Flemish bond and has corner pilasters and window lintels similar to those on the south front. Here a one-story porch with paneled pilasters, a dentil cornice, and a low hipped roof has been closed in to create two small rooms off the back stair hall.

The ends and rear walls of the building are laid in four- and five-course American bond. Six-over-six sash are used throughout the house, and a full entablature is carried around the eaves of the low hipped roof which is covered with standing-seam sheet metal. There are three tall interior end chimneys.

The plan of Belle Aire is a common one, consisting of a single-pile, central-passage main block with an open-well stair in the passage. Set off from the main block by a secondary passage with a straight-run stair is the dining room in the ell. The principal stair consists of a plain molded banister and rectangular balusters scrolled around the newel which takes the form of a diminutive fluted Doric column. Paneled wainscoting, used throughout the house, is carried up both the stairs.

The east parlor mantel is adapted from Benjamin's Plate 51, "Chimney Piece," with a cornice and a symmetrically molded surround more elaborate than those Benjamin illustrates and with a single horizontal panel substituted for Benjamin's fret-work frieze. A simplified version of this mantel is used in the dining room. Bold architrave blocks reminiscent of an earlier style of mantel are added to emphasize the fluted Doric colonettes, but the frieze panel and molded surround of the parlor mantel are omitted.

In the west parlor is a mantel freely adapted from Plate 50, "Chimney Piece," of The Practical House Carpenter. Benjamin's frieze has been shortened to allow the insertion of an architrave element under it, and a central tablet and moldings similar to those used in Valley mantels of the 1820s and 1830s have been added.

#### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Belle Aire, in Roanoke County between Salem and Roanoke, is an outstanding Greek Revival house which illustrates the popularity of builders' guides in the mid-nineteenth century as well as the uses to which an imaginative local craftsman could put them.

The house was built in 1849 by Benjamin Deyerle (1806-1883), who probably employed one Gustavus Sedon as his carpenter. Deyerle, like other builders of his time and region, was an entrepreneur of broad-ranging interests. In addition to being a contractor and brick mason, he kept a grist mill, a still, and a store. Belle Aire is the second of his known large houses, and like most of them was built in the Greek Revival style. Though his work shows at least a passing knowledge of the handbooks of Edward Shaw and Minard Lafever, Deyerle clearly relied most heavily on the publications of Asher Benjamin (1773-1845), a New England architect and popularizer of new styles. Many of Deyerle's embellishments can be traced directly to details in Benjamin's books, notably The Practical House Carpenter of 1830. In no case, however, does he merely copy Benjamin's design; he always adds some touch of his own-either a variant or an element from another handbook plate or, at times, some customary local element such as the tablets and moldings of the west parlor mantel at Belle Aire, which recall Valley work of the 1820s and 1830s.

Belle Aire was built for Madison Pitzer (1799-1861), a large landowner in the Salem area. In 1896 it was sold by his heirs to Mary L. Brown and remained in the possession of her family for about thirty years. A brief period of ownership by a bank was followed by the purchase of Belle Aire by Roger DuBose in 1935. DuBose sold it to the present owners, Mr. and Mrs. Richard S. Whitney in 1957.
