

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND OHIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE
Queen Mary's Port popularly known as Capitol Landing, was established by the Virginia Assembly in 1699.

Although a 1699 survey by Theororick Bland established the boundaries of Williams-burg and its two ports, the boundaries of Capitol Landing were lost during the eighteenth century urban expansion. Shops, houses, and light industries developed along the road leading to the port as Williamsburg expanded. No remains of these structures have survived above ground.



With the aid of eighteenth century maps and historical documents, the archaeological remains of Capitol Landing may provide a significant record of commercial and domestic interactions at what was Williamsburg's most important port.

At the water's edge were located a succession of tobacco inspection warehouses and a public wharf. A ferry ran regularly from Capitol Landing, across the York River to Gloucester County. Near Capitol Landing were two taverns which provided lodging and entertainment for travelers. (Photo #2).

During the eighteenth century a succession of wooden bridges extended Capitol Landing Road across Queen's Creek providing a link between Williamsburg and the residents of Upper York County. A stone bridge was erected in 1775, the remains of which survive in the marshes of Queen's Creek. (Photo # 3).

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

In 1699, Capitol Landing was established as one of two significant ports on navigable tidal creeks, intended to provide Williamsburg with a means of easy access to commercial shipping. It also provided an indispensible communications link be-

- * tween the colonial capital and the rest of the English colonial world. Through
- Capitol Landing Williamsburg participated in the colonial mercantile system, exporting tobacco and other raw agricultural products in exchange for English material goods. It was the site of a tobacco inspection warehouse.

After the Revolutionary period, Capitol Landing entered a period of economic decline. The taverns, warehouses, and industries which had flourished in its heyday fell into disrepair. The archaeological record of these structures and their inhabitants, in conjunction with existing court records, can provide an excellent index of the lives and interactions of the inhabitants of the Landing.

Ferryman Giles Moody is known to have established a tavern at Capitol Landing ca. 1717, which, in turn, was operated by his son and grandson throughout most of the eighteenth century. The archaeological investigation of this tavern site may provide evidence of architectural application to meet a particular commercial demand. Moreover, excavation would provide valuable evidence of material consumption.

In addition, archaeological study of the site of the bridges which once spanned Queen's Creek, may provide considerable insight into colonial bridge construction technology.
