Built around 1820 by Michael Higgins and Alexander McCollom, the Bank Building is Accomack County's best preserved Federal-style commercial building. Designed along a longitudinal axis, the Bank is a two-story brick structure above a full basement. Although the southeast facade and foundations to the off-set watertable were stuccoed and scored to simulate ashlar masonry at a later date, the remaining walls have their brickwork exposed. Ornamented with beautifully executed Flemish bond with king closers around the windows and doors, unadorned wooden lintels with splayed ends, and an original modillion cornice with a delicately detailed fretwork frieze, the Bank Building retains a great deal of its original architectural charm. A single interior-end chimney with a rebuilt stack serves the rear office. Although the first floor entrance doors have been altered, an original flush-paneled six-panel door survives on the second floor level of the southeast facade indicating the arrangement of a now vanished cat's head and hoist for the raising of merchandise to the second floor storage area. Directly over the second floor door in the gable end is an exceptionally fine period fanlight with a simply molded architrave and unadorned wooden keystone. Access to the cellar is gained through an early, though rebuilt, shed bulkhead entrance.

The interior trim of the Bank Building has been masked on the first floor by modern alterations, although it reputedly retains an early ogee cornice behind the present veneer of sheet rock. The mantel in the present office while reflecting the original period of construction is not original to the building, but was moved from a dismanteled early-nineteenth-century office. Because of its use as a storage area the second floor interior was originally left roughly finished.

Built by Michael Higgins and Alexander McCollom shortly after their joint purchase of a quarter-acre lot in Drummondtown in 1819, the Bank Building originally housed one of Accomack County's principal mercantile enterprises. In 1825 Michael Higgins died intestate and McCollom purchased his partner's interest from the heirs. Four years later in his own will, McCollom specified that the store continue in operation until his son James came of age and was able to assume the financial responsibility of these two operations.

After several subsequent ownerships, the Bank Building, referred to in property title by this time as the Brick Store, was purchased in 1867 by Dr. Edward Young. Dr. Young in turn willed the building to his granddaughter Sarah and her husband Thomas W. Blackstone. Blackstone established his banking business there, and this gave the building its present name. Until its merger with the Eastern Shore Citizens' Bank of Onancock, Thomas Blackstone's bank was a privately owned banking enterprise. The Bank Building is now owned and maintained by the Eastern Shore Chamber of Commerce.

Beautifully preserved, the Bank Building is one of Virginia's finest high-style Federal-period commercial buildings. With its delicate exterior detailing and interesting treatment of interior spaces the structure survives, despite minor alterations, as an extremely refined illustration of the combination of pragmatic mercantile requirements with early-nineteenth century architectural style.
