SUMMARY DESCRIPTION:

The Shenandoah Historic District lies in the Town of Shenandoah, in extreme southwest Page County, Virginia. Located along the banks of the South Fork of the Shenandoah River between the Blue Ridge Mountains and the Massanutten Ridge, the community was first settled in the late 1830s. It developed around an iron furnace and was originally known as Shenandoah Iron Works. The current town of Shenandoah dates to after 1870 when a devastating flood destroyed most of the original community. Much of the rebuilding that occurred after the flood was initiated by William Milnes, Jr., who in the late 1860s, had purchased the Shenandoah Iron Works and most of the land on which the current town of Shenandoah sits. Milnes worked to rebuild the community and was influential in securing rail service to the area. The Shenandoah Valley Railroad (now part of Norfolk Southern) was completed from Hagerstown, Maryland, to Shenandoah in 1881 and on to Roanoke the following year.

The town was known as Milnes when it was officially incorporated in 1884, but later changed its name to Shenandoah City, then shortened it to Shenandoah. While the 198-acre district encompasses less than a third of the official town limits, it includes the oldest portion of community and includes the architectural resources that tell of the story of the town's development from the late 19th century to modern times. The boundaries generally include all the buildings along First, Second, Third, Fourth, Fifth, Sixth, Seventh and Eighth Streets between Denver Street and Maryland Avenue. Some resources on the western side of the railroad tracks along Long Street are also included as well as the metal truss bridge that crosses the Shenandoah River and leads into Rockingham County. Concentrations of non-contributing resources were not included in the boundaries and archaeological resources were not considered.

When Shenandoah was created, it was laid out in a formal grid pattern with uniform building
lots, numbering 10 to each side of a block with an alley behind. According to 1885 maps, only
the part of the district that includes First through Fifth Streets and Maryland, Virginia and,
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Pennsylvania Avenues was laid out. The Shenandoah Land and Improvement Company, formed in 1890, further expanded the town by laying out about 4,200 lots. Sixth through Eighth Streets

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within the district were part of the new development of the Land and Improvement Company. First through Eighth and H Streets generally run north-south, while the cross streets of Maryland, Pennsylvania, Virginia, Denver, Central, and Coverstone run east-west. Most of the earlier properties in town sit on single lots, particularly along the commercial street of First Street (also known as Front Street). Many of the other buildings in the town are sited on multiple lots. Concrete sidewalks line most of the streets, and many of the lots above the grade of the road have concrete steps leading down to the street as well as retaining walls of stone or concrete.

The Shenandoah Historic district contains 311 individual properties, the majority of which are dwellings and their associated outbuildings. A large concentration of commercial buildings is located along First Street facing the railroad tracks, although a few are scattered throughout the rest of town. Seven churches, two cemeteries, a school, train station, former fire station and city hall, as well as an early-20th-century power station with dam and water works are also included in the district. Almost half of the contributing resources are from ca. 1880 to 1910 and reflect the town's period of greatest growth and development. The vast majority of buildings are of the vernacular tradition, yet some fine examples of high-style architecture including the Queen Anne, Italianate, Colonial Revival, Gothic Revival, Classical Revival, Tudor Revival, and Craftsman styles are also found. Much of the modern development in Shenandoah has occurred along the edges of town in areas not included in the district boundaries. The noncontributing elements in the district are primarily modest vernacular dwellings and outbuildings.

The mid-20th century saw a decline in the role of Shenandoah as a major rail transportation center, due in part to the advent of the automobile as well as the dieselization of railroads. Since that time Shenandoah has struggled to remain a viable commercial center. Many commercial buildings were either abandoned or lost to fire while others relocated from First Street to Fourth Street (US Route 340) in order to take advantage of automobile traffic. In recent years Shenandoah has actively pursued public/private partnerships and State and Federal grants to help in its revitalization. The Town's motto, "A Progressive Minded Small Town with a Planned Future" is helping to bring Shenandoah back to its former glory.

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ARCHITECTURAL ANALYSIS

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Shenandoah is a small incorporated town in southwestern Page County, Virginia, in the heart of the Shenandoah Valley. It is picturesquely nestled between the Blue Ridge Mountains and the Massanutten Ridge on the banks of the South Fork of the Shenandoah River. The town owes it development to its location near mountains rich with iron ore and lumber, and the river which provided a means of transporting these goods to other markets. Although a community first developed here in the 1830s, present Shenandoah dates to the era after 1870 when a flood devastated much of the community. Rebuilding occurred during the 1870s and was boosted by the arrival of the Shenandoah Valley Railroad (now Norfolk Southern) in 1881.

The earliest buildings that survive within the district date to the period after the "Great Flood of 1870", when William Milnes, Jr., one of the new owners and general manager of the iron works, began the process of rebuilding the town. He had lobbied for the Shenandoah Valley Railroad, which would link Hagerstown to Roanoke, to come by way of the iron works. The community was called Shenandoah Iron Works until it was officially incorporated in 1884. It was then named Milnes, after William Milnes, Jr, and later changed to Shenandoah City and finally shortened to Shenandoah. The earliest map of the community dates to 1885 as part of Lake's Atlas, and is labeled as Milnes. The map shows that First through Fifth Streets and Maryland, Pennsylvania, and Virginia Avenues were laid out in their current grid-like pattern by that time. It also indicates that almost all the lots on First Street were built out as were many of the ones on Second Street. The area south of Maryland Avenue, outside of the district boundaries, was the site of the Big Gem Furnace as well as several houses. The site of the Shenandoah Iron Company just west of the railroad tracks is included within the district (now Long Street), but contains domestic resources that date to the period after the demolition of the industrial complex. The map also shows the railroad line and the multiple tracks that made Shenandoah a major switching point along the Shenandoah Valley Railroad.

The architectural resources in the Shenandoah Historic District illustrate the story of the community's development. Most buildings date to the late 19th and early 20th centuries when the town experienced its greatest growth. Approximately 40 % of the buildings in the district date to the era from 1910 to 1941; 15% are post-World War II.

The district contains 19 dwellings from the ca. 1880 period, most of which are located on First	st
and Second Streets, and all of which vary in their degree of preservation. First Street, also	
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known as Front Street, because of its location directly fronting the railroad tracks, not only contains some of the oldest buildings within the district, but also the majority of commercial ones. A collection of six dwellings along the northern end of First and Second Streets are almost

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identical in form. Fairly large and substantial, these frame buildings were probably built for workers involved with the iron furnace operation and later for railroad employees. These include 202, 206, and 210 First Street (069-5209-0001, 0002, and 0003) and 202, 206, and 209 Second Street (069-5209-0033, 0034, and 00062). All are 2-story, 3-bay, vernacular dwellings on stone foundations with side gable roofs and appear to have been built by the same builder. A prominent central-front gable contains full-sized, paired 6/6-sash windows. The best preserved of the group are the ones on Second Street, two of which feature an ornately pierced wooden vergeboard in the center front gable (**Photo 1**).

Other early dwellings in the district along First and Second Streets include the house at 416 First Street (069-5209-0010), a 2-story, 3-bay I-house with a bracketed cornice, central-front gable, and side cross gables. Recently gutted in anticipation of rehabilitation, the house was briefly used as town offices in the 1980s. The houses at 314 Second Street (069-5209-0042) and 316 Third Street (069-5209-0090) are 2-story frame I-houses, as is 418 Second Street (069-5209-0048), which features a central-front gable, and 420 Second Street (069-5209-0049), which follows an L-shaped massing with a cross-gable roof. The house at 506 Second Street (069-5209-0052) is also a variation of an I-house and features a hipped roof instead of the more traditional gable. The house at 307 Second Street (069-5209-0064) and its neighbor at 309 Second Street (069-5209-0065) have gable-end orientations with shallow-pitched roofs and gable-end returns.

A group of nine early dwellings are also located along the northern edge of the district, well away from the railroad tracks or site of the furnace. These include 703, 705, 709, 711, and 801 Coverstone Lane (069-5209-0225, 0226, 0227, 266, and 0310). Three of them are 2-story, 3-bay hall-parlor-plan houses, one of which has a later cross-gable wing that projects forward. One is a traditional vernacular I-house form and the other is a side-passage, gable-end form. While all vary on basic forms that were popular in the region during this era, all are fairly subdued in their use of exterior decoration which is generally limited to interior brick chimneys and wooden porch supports.

The earliest surviving commercial resources in the district are generally located along First Street, directly across from the railroad tracks, as is indicated in the 1885 Lake's Atlas map. While many of the original buildings have been replaced by later ones due to several fires in **Section 7 Page 8**

town, First Street remains relatively intact as a commercial corridor, albeit somewhat neglected. The commercial buildings are located on the east side of the street facing the railroad station and are sited abutting the sidewalk (**Photo 2**) Many are built into a gentle hillside so that the second

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story is nearly at ground level as viewed from the rear alley. According to the December 1905 Sanborn Fire Insurance Map of Shenandoah, First Street contained a variety of commercial structures including several general merchandise stores, two restaurants, a butcher, a drugstore, a furniture store, a bank, a barbershop, a coffee shop that also sold toys, a tin shop, and a hay and feed store. One of the oldest surviving commercial buildings on First Street is located at 418/420/422 (069-5209-0011) and was constructed around 1885. It is typical of many of the buildings along First Street because it has had several modern alterations yet still retains many of its character-defining features. The first floor of the building is comprised of three stores while the second story was used as a residence, a typical feature of many of the commercial buildings in town.

Other late-19th and early-20th-century commercial buildings on First Street include 406-410 First Street (069-5209-0009), which originally housed general merchandise and a furniture store, the Eagle Hotel (096-5209-0019), and the Eagle Hotel Annex (069-5209-0020). The Eagle Hotel and annex are located in the 500 block of First Street and were constructed in the first decade of the 1900s. The annex building was built in two stages and adjoins the former hotel and in part predates it. The west half of the 2-story building was built about 1900 and the eastern section added about 1910. The Eagle Hotel, now in somewhat deteriorated condition, is the tallest nonindustrial structure in town and still retains an impressive presence on the streetscape of First Street (Photo 3). According to a sign on the building that appears in a historic photograph, the hotel opened on or around October 1, 1907 and catered to "Traveling Men" who were probably salesmen and other business travelers using the railroad (**Photo 4**). The historic photograph shows that the three top stories of the building were clad in weatherboard siding and that the first-floor level was faced with stone. The building has since been abandoned but still retains its original form and tall bracketed parapet with some original doors and windows. From the historic photograph, it is apparent that the building was originally decorated with typical Victorian-era details including a bracketed cornice, corner boards, 2-story porches, contrasting paints, and prominent signage and flags, indicating a desire by the owners to market the building as a modern and fashionable commercial enterprise in town.

At the same time of the construction of the hotel at the south end of First Street, the Norfolk-Western Railway Young Men's Christian Association was constructed at the north end (069-Section __7__ Page __9__

5209-0004). Located at 308 First Street, the 2-story, hip-roofed frame building rests on a brick foundation and was constructed as a YMCA for the railroad workers offering a restaurant and dormitories (**Photo 5**). The rear addition was constructed in 1917 and the building is now used as apartments.

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Another early commercial building in town is located at 113 Maryland Avenue (069-5209-0270). One of the few commercial brick buildings in the district, the 2-story building is laid in 6-course American bond and features an original storefront and an unusually peaked wooden parapet (**Photo 6**).

The Shenandoah Land and Improvement Company was formed in 1890 and boosted the town's growth during the late 19th century, despite the death of William Milnes in 1889 and the decline of the Shenandoah Iron Works. The Norfolk and Western Railway bought the Shenandoah Valley Railroad in 1891. Shenandoah was prominently sited just about mid-way between Roanoke and Hagerstown and was a major division point where crew changes took place. Speculative land and improvement companies sprung up in many valley towns during this period. Usually funded by wealthy Northern developers and aggressive local entrepreneurs, some were more successful than others in creating a "boom" to the town. The Shenandoah Land and Improvement Company aggressively promoted the town of Shenandoah by acquiring substantial acreage, laying out streets, and constructing several buildings. One of the most prominent buildings in town, and the only one individually listed on the Virginia Landmarks Register and the National Register of Historic Places, was constructed in 1891 as the office of the Shenandoah Land and Improvement Company (069-5209-0273). Located at 201 Maryland Avenue, this 1 ½-story Shingle Style cottage blends Queen Anne-style elements and Craftsman/Bungalow influences (Photos 7). Designed by Washington, D.C. architect, William M. Poindexter, the building is clad in wood shingles and features an enormous gable roof, part of which is interrupted by a 3-part window at the second-floor level and flanked by inset rectangular stucco panels resembling half-timbering. Other details include an integral porch, massive brick chimney, and complex dormers. Although the influence of the boom was great in Shenandoah, the Land and Improvement Company moved out by 1902 and sold the building to Mary and Edna Stevens who used it as a dwelling. Commonly referred to as "Stevens Cottage," the building was acquired by the Page County Heritage Association in 1968 and is now a local history museum.

The Shenandoah Historic District contains more than 50 dwellings that were built around 1900, on land probably sold by the Land and Improvement Company. Many of these houses were built **Section __7__ Page __10__**

for employees of the railroad. The vast majority of these dwellings are of the vernacular but a few follow high styles popular in the region during the period. Some examples of typical vernacular dwellings that follow well-established architectural forms popular during the period include: 114 Second Street (069-5209-0032), an I-house with a central-front gable; 313 Second

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Street (069-5209-0067), a gable-end form; 415 Second Street (069-5209-0071), a 3-bay hall-parlor-plan form; 501 Second Street (069-5209-0073), a cross-gable-roofed form with wraparound porch; and 707 Denver Street, (069-5209-0249) an I-house with a hipped roof and decorative brackets in eaves (**Photo 8**). These vernacular forms are repeated over and over again throughout the district with variations in the type and amount of exterior decoration and alteration.

A well-preserved example of a vernacular form dwelling with Italianate-style detailing is the house at 404 Virginia Avenue (069-5209-0302). The 2-story, 3-bay, cross-gable-roofed frame house has overhanging eaves supported by sawn brackets, bracketed window hoods over 2/2-sash windows, multiple cross gables, corbeled interior brick chimneys, and a 5-bay wraparound porch with chamfered posts and sawn brackets and balustrade (**Photo 9**).

Most of the houses along the 100 block of Second Street were constructed ca. 1900 and almost all are of the Queen Anne style. The collection of buildings is notable not only because the houses are all in fairly original condition, but they tend to be larger and more rural in setting than many of the other houses in the district. The house at 100 Second Street (069-5209-0027) is a well-preserved example of the Queen Anne style and features a steeply-pitched cross-gabled roof, a projecting 2-story Queen Anne-style cut-away bay, a door with transom and sidelights, and weatherboard siding with fishscale wooden shingles in the gable ends (**Photo 10**). Almost identical in form are the neighboring houses at 105, 107 and 108 Second Street (069-5209-0058, 0059, and 0030).

The house at 112 Second Street (069-5209-0031) is also a fine example of a typical Queen Anne-style dwelling in the district (**Photo 11**). The 2-story, 5-bay frame building has a front cross-gabled roof with a 2-story cut-away bay. The well-preserved building features decorative sawn work in the gable ends and on the 2-story rear porches, original wooden shutters, transom and sidelights around the oval-glass front door, a front porch with balustraded deck, and a second-story door leading out onto a roof deck. In the district, the Queen Anne style was most often used in the 1910s.

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finest is located at 402 Third Street (069-5209-0094). The 2-story frame cottage is diminutive in size compared to the surrounding houses. It features weatherboard siding, a hipped roof, 2/2-sash windows, bracketed overhanging eaves, and a 2-tier front porch (**Photo 12**).

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The district also contains several duplexes that were constructed at the turn-of-the-century, indicating the rapidly expanding industrial workforce of the town at that time. One of the largest of these is located at 316/318 Third Street (069-5209-0091). Others include 309/311 Third Street (069-5209-0106) with Italianate-inspired detailing; 515/517 Third Street (069-5209-0121); and 511/513 Third Street (069-5209-0120), which is of the Gothic Revival style (**Photo 13**). One of the few examples of this style in the district, the 2-story, 4-bay duplex has a hipped roof of slate shingles, projecting side gables, twin front gables with pointed-arched attic windows and metal cresting, and a bracketed cornice, window, and door heads.

Many of the dwellings in the district still maintain some of their original outbuildings. The earliest ones generally included a meat house, summer kitchen, chicken coop, and in a few cases, a barn. Although these have traditionally been converted into sheds since their original use has been abandoned, many are in a fairly good degree of preservation. A common design feature noted on many of the late-19th- and early-20th-century, small, rectangular, gable-end outbuildings in the district is the frequent use of an overhanging gable roof that shelters the front entrance. Although it is not certain that all outbuildings that have this type of feature were originally used as meat houses, it appears that the majority were. Some of the properties noted that include this type of outbuilding are 513 Second Street (069-5209-0078); 404, 313, 317, and 509 Third Street (069-5209-0095, 0107, 0109, and 0119); 518 Fourth Street (069-5209-0139); 504 Fifth Street (069-5209-0161); and 505 Seventh Street (069-5209-0203).

The buildings in the Shenandoah Historic District reflect the community's continued growth during the early 1900s. The first decade of the 1900s saw the erection of several significant buildings in town, including the previously mentioned Eagle Hotel and the YMCA building in 1907. Several institutional buildings were also constructed during this period. In 1903, Verbena Lodge, an affiliate of the Independent Order of Oddfellows, constructed part of the building that is located at 119 Pennsylvania Avenue (069-5209-0286). The left portion of the structure is the original and is composed of a 2-story frame building with an intact first-floor storefront, and three bays of 6/6-sash windows on the second floor (**Photo 14**). The building has a prominent bracketed front parapet with a half-round central arch that contains the lodge's name spelled out in wooden letters "VERBENA LODGE NO. 42 IOOF." The 1905 and 1910 Sanborn

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Maps show that the first floor was used to sell hay and feed with the lodge hall presumably on the second floor. The eastern side of the building, which matches the original except for the lack of the half-round arch in the parapet, was built between 1910 and 1917. According to Sanborn maps, in 1917 the first floor of the addition was used as a local post office while the second floor housed a movie theatre. This building, although in somewhat derelict condition, displays

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decorative elements of the Italianate style, and is one of the most intact of the early commercial buildings in the district.

While it is known that Shenandoah had an African-American population during the early 20th century, few resources remain that are solely associated with that community. The commercial building at 304 Maryland Avenue (069-5209-0265) was constructed as Shiloh Baptist Church sometime between 1905 and 1910. It was originally located across Maryland Avenue from where it currently sits and was sited next to a brick African-American school that appears on the 1905 Sanborn Map. The frame church was moved to its current location between 1932 and 1942 and the brick school is no longer standing. Although significantly altered and used as a business, it is an important surviving resource in Shenandoah's African-American history.

As the residential growth expanded into the areas of town away from First Street that were laid out by the Land and Improvement Company, commercial buildings were constructed there to cater to the needs of the immediate neighborhood. Some of these include the former Davis Store on Sixth Street (069-5209-0181) constructed in the early 1910s (**Photo 15**). The 2-story, 3-bay, gable-end former store has a 2-story side lean-to, gable-end returns, and paired 6/6-sash windows flanking the entrance. The former store at 409 Pennsylvania Avenue (069-5209-0291) is 1 story with a shed roof hidden by a tall front false parapet ornamented with jigsawn wooden console brackets. The intact 3-part storefront features a central recessed entry with double-leaf doors beneath a transom. Although the tall display windows have been covered with plywood, they appear to be intact. The bulkheads beneath the display windows as well as the parapet are covered in narrow tongue-and-groove vertical boards. Shenandoah General Store, located at 199 Maryland Avenue (069-5209-0271) is still used as a commercial building on the first floor and a residence on the second (**Photo 16**). Constructed around 1920 by Clarence Foltz, who lived next door, the building was constructed on the site of the former jail which burned. It is a typical example of a commercial building from the early 20th century.

The early 20th century also saw the construction of several churches in Shenandoah, all in the

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Gothic Revival style. The earliest church in the community was Fields Methodist Church, whose congregation was organized in 1868. The original 2-story frame building was located in a complex near Field's Cemetery (069-5209-0282), which also included a brick parsonage. Although the church relocated to its current site on the corner of Third Street and Pennsylvania Avenue, the cemetery is still in use. Field's Cemetery contains more than 100 burials that include both above ground and flat tombs along with three family plots surrounded by wrought

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iron fences (**Photo 17**). A terra cotta gable-roofed mausoleum, an interesting memorial with a metal anvil commemorating the earliest settlers of the community, as well as the tomb of William Milnes is found in the cemetery. One of two cemeteries in the district, some of the burials here date back to the late 1860s

Fields United Methodist Church (069-5209-0099) is a stuccoed Gothic Revival-style building that was constructed sometime between 1917 and 1924 (**Photo 18**). The building has a gable-roofed main section with stepped buttress supports along the side and front walls and a 3-stage corner tower with a pyramidal roof.

Christ United Methodist Church (069-5209-0218) is located on Central Avenue at its intersection with Second Street. The original frame church was constructed in 1896 and expanded in 1914. The current Gothic Revival-style exterior reflects alterations made to the church in 1951 that included bricking over the building and substantially expanding it.

Shenandoah Baptist Church (069-5209-0136) is prominently located at the corner of Fourth Street and Pennsylvania Avenue (**Photo 19**). The 1-story, 3-bay Gothic-Revival-style church is constructed of formed rusticated concrete block, considered a very modern material when the building was constructed in 1908. One of the finest churches in the district, the church has a cross-gabled roof and a central tower. Details include a 2-stage tower with pyramidal roof, sawtooth wooden shingles in the gable ends and tower, lancet-arched windows, and an L-shaped addition of concrete block with an unusual raised triangular surface.

St. Peter's Lutheran Church (069-5209-0141), located near the northern edge of the district, was constructed in the late 1930s. Designed by Roanoke architect Alba K. Simmons, this Gothic Revival-style brick church is fairly conventional in form and features a gable-roofed nave, side castellated bell tower, and lancet-arched windows with concrete decoration in their surrounds (**Photo 20**). The Lutheran congregation, one of the earliest Protestant congregations in Page County, was first organized in Shenandoah in 1884. The two other churches in the district are **Section 7 Page 14**

modern buildings.

All these buildings illustrate how Shenandoah was a vibrant and thriving community during the early 20th century. It was among one of the earliest small towns in the Valley to have a municipal water system. A steam electric power plant was built in 1906 and supplied electricity to local citizens, businesses, industry, the railroad, as well as provided street lighting. The building was succeeded by the construction of the power station currently at 575 Long Street (069-5209-

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0262), which was built around 1920 (**Photo 21**). This Classically-inspired brick building has elegant round-arched openings and is one of a very few surviving historic power houses along the South Fork of the Shenandoah River and is complete with its concrete dam. Two brick buildings located nearby and now used as maintenance shops by the town were originally part of the Shenandoah Water Works Pumping Station (069-5209-0261). Constructed around 1908, these were part of an early municipal water system in Shenandoah.

The first railroad station in Shenandoah was constructed by the Shenandoah Valley Railroad shortly after rail service reached the town in 1881. It was replaced with a board-and-batten station constructed in 1895 by the Norfolk and Western Railway which had recently purchased the line. The current brick train station (069-5209-0025) replaced the frame one sometime around 1915 and is still in use today (**Photo 22**). Located directly adjacent to the railroad tracks on the west side of First Street, the rectangular, hip-roofed brick building is of the Shepherdstown type, a fairly typical form used by the Norfolk and Western at the time. The walls are dark red brick and the building has projecting polygonal center bays with deep overhanging eaves and hipped dormers, elements characteristic of the Queen Anne style.

Located just south of the train station are the ruins of the Shenandoah Milling Company (069-5209-0026). Constructed around 1920, the building once boasted large terra-cotta silos and is now a ruin. According to the 1924 Sanborn Map, part of the building was used as a wholesale grocery warehouse and by 1932, a portion of it was used as a flour mill.

Further south of the site of the Shenandoah Milling Company is a railroad tunnel bridge (069-5209-0269) built in 1918 of reinforced concrete (**Photo 23**). The structure consists of two 1-lane vehicular traffic tunnels separated by a concrete wall. The one to the north is wider to accommodate pedestrian traffic along a sidewalk. This tunnel bridge provides an important link from town along Maryland Avenue which becomes Route 602 as it crosses the Shenandoah River. The current bridge across the river (069-5209-0268) was constructed in 1954 and is a **Section __7__ Page __15__**

polygonal top chord through Warren truss bridge type. An earlier bridge was located south of the current one.

The earliest public educational facility in Shenandoah was in operation by 1878 on land donated by the Shenandoah Iron Works and was located south of the historic district boundaries. The current school in town (069-5209-0154) is prominently located on the corner of Fourth Street (current US Route 340 through Shenandoah) and Maryland Avenue (**Photo 24**). The core of the building was constructed in 1916 after a design by Roanoke architect George R. Ragan as the

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Shenandoah High School. A matching 2-story detached brick Graded School was built on the site around 1930 and in 1936 the central semicircular portico and other additions were made to link the two formerly detached structures. A brick Manual Training Building was constructed on the northwest corner of the property around 1940. Although the building has undergone some major modernizations, it still retains its architectural integrity and continues to be used as the town's elementary school.

Residential construction in all parts of town continued in the early 20th century. While the majority of buildings (approximately 48%) within the historic district date to the Reconstruction era after the Civil War to 1914, about 37% of the buildings date from the period of 1915 to 1941-a time of continued growth in Shenandoah. As with earlier periods, established vernacular forms such as the I-house, the hall-parlor, and the side-passage plans were used, often with limited exterior decoration. Modest, 1-story vernacular examples from this period include 208, 210, 211, 212 and 214 Second Street (069-5209-0035, 0036, 0063, 0037, and 0038). Larger ones are found at 210, 214, 216, and 302 Third Street (069-5209-0081, 0083, 0084, and 0087).

Many of the houses on Fifth, Sixth, and Seventh streets are also of the vernacular and vary in size and amount of decoration. The concentration of buildings from Fourth Street west to the railroad tracks is much greater than those found east of Fourth Street. One reason is that First to Fourth Street was the first part of town to be laid out. It also appears that some of the houses in the area of town west of Fourth Street are sited on multiple lots with large yards, and some of the lots have never been built upon.

The buildings on Long Street, west of the railroad tracks contain the old water works, modern commercial buildings, as well as dwellings, the oldest of which date to the mid-1910s. These include the houses at 400, 406, and 601 Long Street (069-5209-0253, 0254, and 0263), all 2-story vernacular dwellings. The houses at 333 and 407 Long Street (069-5209-0258 and 0260) **Section __7__ Page __16__**

date to about a decade earlier and use decorative elements of the Queen Anne style. The two houses are large and their rear yard backs up to the banks of the Shenandoah River. The one at 333 Long Street features a nice collection of outbuildings including a chicken coop, corncrib, meat house and summer kitchen.

While the majority of houses in the district are of the vernacular, some fine examples of high-style architecture are also found. The Queen Anne style, most popular around 1900, was still used well into the 20th century. One of the best-preserved examples of this style in the district is the house at 623 Maryland Avenue (069-5209-0279). The 2 ½-story house, constructed around

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1910, features a gable roof clad in pressed tin shingles, Queen Anne-sash windows, a 3-bay porch with Modern Ionic columns, and a fine corner octagonal turret on the second floor (**Photo 25**). Other examples of the style from this period were noted at 306 Second Street (069-5209-0039), 206/208, 210, 317, 408, and 501 Third Street (069-5209-0080, 0081, 0109, 0097, and 0017), 403 and 407 Fourth Street (069-5209-0143, 0144), 505 Fifth Street (069-5209-0172), and 613 Denver Street (069-5209-0244).

The Italianate style was rarely found in the district on buildings from after 1910, although some elements of the style were used as decoration for commercial buildings. Three examples include 504 First Street (069-5209-0017), Reiss Apartment Building (069-5209-0285), and 123 Pennsylvania Avenue (069-5209-0289).

Duplexes for railroad workers were still being built during this period and are found scattered throughout the district. A particularly notable group of duplexes from ca. 1920 are located adjacent to each other at 507/509, 511/513, and 515/517 Denver Street (069-5209-0235, 0236, and 0237). These three 2-story, 4-bay, frame buildings are identical in design and feature hipped roofs with jerkinhead-roofed front projections, and a wraparound porch with matching jerkinhead detail (**Photo 26**).

The bungalow with Craftsman-style detailing was a very popular form for dwellings from the late 1910, 1920s and 1930s. Thirty examples in the district were noted, most of which were 1½ stories in height with overhanging eaves, dormers, and full-width porches. The vast majority are of frame construction in varying degrees of preservation and include 315 Second Street (069-5209-0068), 411, 502, and 505 Third Street (069-5209-0114, 0101, and 0118); 428, 433 and 530 Fourth Street (069-5209-0135, 0150, and 0140); 300 and 415 Fifth Street (069-5209-0155 and 169); 404, 406, 414, 407, and 411 Sixth Street (069-5209-0176, 0177, 0180, 0183, and 0184); **Section** __7__ **Page** __17__

504, Seventh Street (069-5209-0193); 406, 514, 501, Eight Street (069-5209-0206, 0211, and 0212); 123, 427, and Maryland Avenue (069-5209-0272 and 0276); 707 and 711 Pennsylvania Avenue (069-5209-0295 and 0296); and 109, 111, and 305 Virginia Avenue (69-5209-0305, 306, and 307) (Photo 27). The larger, more substantial Bungalows were of brick construction, with wood shingle in the ½-story gable ends. Four examples were noted: 400, 414 and 425 Fourth Street (069-5209-0132, 0133, and 0147) and 406 Seventh Street (069-5209-0189). All are well preserved and retain details such as wide eaves with corbeled brackets, exposed rafter ends; battered porch supports and projecting rectangular bay windows (Photo 28). Some of these may in fact be mail order houses, which were popular during this time period and would have been easy to obtain due to Shenandoah's location on the railroad.

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The Colonial Revival style, which looked to colonial buildings for inspiration but freely combined decorative elements for a variety of styles, is not commonly found in Shenandoah. Shenandoah Elementary School (069-5209-0154) is the most prominent building in the district of the Colonial Revival style. The other examples are all confined to dwellings and date anywhere from 1910 to 1950. Several are examples of the Dutch Colonial variant of the style, characterized by a gambrel roof. These include 508 Pennsylvania Avenue (069-5209-0283); 407 Third Street (069-5209-0112), and 517 Eight Street (069-5209-0217), the largest of the three (**Photo 29**).

The Colonial Revival style was often translated into vernacular forms in the use of Tuscan columns as porch supports or in other detailing. The American Foursquare, typically a cube-shaped 2 ½-story dwelling, is represented by several dwellings in Shenandoah. The largest and best preserved is located at 501 Pennsylvania Avenue (069-5209-0292). This brick dwelling was constructed ca. 1920 and is characterized by overhanging eaves, hipped dormers; multi-light windows; and a 16-bay wraparound porch with Tuscan columns and a gabled angle corner bay (**Photo 30**).

The Tudor Revival style, nationally popular during the first half of the 20th century, is seen in fewer than ten examples in the district. One of the best is located at 424 Fourth Street (069-5209-0134). Constructed around 1927, the reference to Tudor architecture can be seen in the false half-timbering in the gable of a front wing and in the Tudor arches of the front porch (**Photo 31**).

Shenandoah continued to grow modestly during the 1930s and 40s, as is reflected in the architecture of the period. The Norfolk and Western Railroad was still a dominant employer, yet other industries had also moved into town. The former city hall, located at 413 Second Street, Section _7 & (Inventory)__ Page __18__

was constructed around 1930 and housed the town's fire hall on the first floor and town offices on the second, reflecting the growth of the town during this period. By the early 1950s, Shenandoah had assumed much of the appearance it still retains today (**Photos 32, 33, 34, 35**). A relatively small number of modern buildings have been constructed within the historic district boundaries. Although the town has continued to grow, the historic district retains its picturesque setting and resources that tell the story of its growth and development as a late-19th-century Shenandoah Valley town.

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NOTES ON FORMAT AND ORGANIZATION OF INVENTORY:

The properties are listed numerically by street address. All resources are contributing unless otherwise noted and are keyed to the map in regular order. The survey was conducted in January 2003. Interns from the University of Virginia Department of Architectural History helped in conducting the fieldwork. Some properties had already been documented as part of the Page County Historic Resources Survey conducted by Landmark Preservation Associates of Lexington, VA in 1998.

8. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE:

The Town of Shenandoah, located in the extreme southern section of Page County, in Virginia's Shenandoah Valley, is significant in the area as a well-preserved late-19th-century town located on the main north-south rail line of the Norfolk and Western Railway. This district is distinguished by a collection of commercial, domestic, religious and railroad-related buildings dating from the 1880s to the 1950s, with the largest number of structures dating from 1880-1914. That many of these buildings survived both disastrous floods and fires is an enduring tribute to the heartiness and optimism of Shenandoah's residents. With roots dating to the early 19th century, the area that became the town of Shenandoah was strategically located on the South Fork of the Shenandoah River, the main transportation route for the rich ore and lumber that was found in the nearby Massanutten Mountain range for much of the 19th century. The completion of the railroad line linking Hagerstown, Maryland, with Big Lick, or the City of Roanoke, in the 1880s, led to the town's most prosperous period, expanding the markets for the pig iron and

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other iron products of the Shenandoah Iron Works. Moreover, Shenandoah stood at nearly the mid-point of the Shenandoah Valley Railroad (later the Norfolk and Western) that ran the length of the Shenandoah Valley, which led to its becoming a significant transportation center well into the mid-20th century.

The Shenandoah Historic District is eligible for inclusion on the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion C because of its varied collection of late-19th- and early- to-mid-20th-century buildings. It is also eligible under Criterion A in the area of industry for its association **Section _8_ Page _87_**

with iron ore production as well as transportation because of its affiliation with the Shenandoah Valley Railroad. The locally significant district possesses a high degree of integrity and its interesting history as a Page County community that first developed at the site of an iron ore furnace and continued to develop as a major rail center after the arrival of the railroad in 1881 further enhances its significance.

HISTORICAL BACKGROUND

"Throughout the 18th and 19th centuries iron mining and manufacturing emerged as an integral component of the regional economy of the greater Shenandoah Valley..." So begins Dr. Charles Ballard's history of the town of Shenandoah and the Shenandoah Iron Works written in 1998. White settlement in the Shenandoah Valley began as early as the 1730s, with most residents settling on the rich farmlands along the Shenandoah River. Colonial iron-making expanded in the 18th century and as early as 1760, Nicholas Yager built the "Isabella" cold blast furnace just north of present-day Luray, the county seat for Page County. It was not, however, until the early decades of the 19th century that many were combing the Blue Ridge and the Massanutten range for iron ore. Southern Page County was discovered to be particularly rich in the type of iron ore required for iron manufacturing. Many of the settlers in this area came up the valley from Pennsylvania where mining and iron manufacture had already been underway, among them Samuel Forrer, Sr. His two sons entered into a partnership with Samuel Gibbons, a Page County magistrate who owned substantial acreage in that area of Page where ore deposits were particularly rich. The Shenandoah Iron Works came in existence on February 13, 1836, with the business name being Forrer, Gibbons, and Forrer. In the 18th-century, the "iron plantation" was the largest single business unit; it included the various stages of production, including timber for construction and fuel. Forges produced tools and machinery parts. Grain was ground on the plantation and agricultural produce raised. In this way, iron plantations were not unlike their agricultural counterparts, purchasing only the few items that they were unable to manufacture.

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The Shenandoah Iron Works was among the largest iron plantations in antebellum Virginia. What would become the site of the future town of Shenandoah was ideally sited between ore-rich mountains where raw materials did not have to be hauled very far, and a large river that offered the transportation route needed to transport iron to the eastern markets. Because of their success in the iron manufacturing business, the two Forrer brothers were referred to as the "Tubal Cains of Shenandoah," a biblical reference to iron manufacture.³ Soon after the launching of the Shenandoah Iron Works, a post office of the same name was established at the site.⁴ The **Section 8 Page 88**

community name continued in county records and census tract records until the 20th century. despite various official name changes in the last two decades of the 19th century. Apparently there were a half dozen or so dwellings constructed near the river below the present bridge to house forge laborers, teamsters, colliers, wood choppers, ore miners, both black and white. None of these buildings survive. In addition, manufacturing buildings including a mill and shops stood on the banks of the river. Workers were both white and black, free and slave. Large plantation owners would send their slaves to work in the iron manufacturing establishment, just as Tidewater plantation owners often sent their slaves not needed in the fields to work in Richmond's tobacco factories. Three furnaces comprised the Shenandoah Iron Works during the antebellum period: Catherine, No. 2, and Shenandoah. A forge stood near the east end of the bridge across the river where "iron was melted and hammered out into articles, blocks or "blooms" of wrought iron. The manufactured iron was hauled by six-mule teams to Harrisonburg or floated down the South Fork on "flat boats" to Front Royal. Flat boats were "made of two-inch boards, 76 feet long, two feet wide and fourteen inches high." After the journey, the flat boats were scrapped for lumber and sold. Those who piloted the flat boats would then walk home.⁶

The Civil War years saw the construction of a gun powder plant by the Confederate government about a mile north of the present-day bridge. No bridge stood at that time; residents crossed the river by ferry. Cannon balls manufactured at the No. 2 Furnace were shipped by flat boats down the river. Pig iron manufactured at Shenandoah Iron Works' Catherine Furnace was shipped to Richmond, presumably to supply the extensive munitions and iron works there. There appeared to be no significant military activity recorded in the Page County vicinity during the war, and the Iron Works managed to escape the depredations inflicted by Union forces on other manufacturing and agricultural resources in the region.

For what would ultimately become the Town of Shenandoah, the most significant date was probably 1865 when Daniel and Henry Forrer, --the Tubal Cains—decided to sell the Iron

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Works; they entered into a sales agreement to convey the entire operation, including Forrer Iron Works and considerable acreage to William Milnes, William Milnes, Jr., John Milnes, and Thomas Johns, all of Pennsylvania. The family had long associations with coal mining and marketing in Pennsylvania and sold all their Pennsylvania holdings upon moving to Virginia. William Milnes, Jr. became manager of the new company. Milnes was a native of Yorkshire, England, and moved with his family to Pottsville, Pennsylvania, in 1829. He went on to serve in the Virginia legislature in 1870 and as a member of Virginia's first congressional delegation from

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the sixth district following Reconstruction in 1870-71.8

With the purchase of the Shenandoah Iron Works by the Milnes family, a new era for the area began. A charter of incorporation was granted by the Virginia General Assembly in its 1869-1870 session. The charter, dated June 30, 1870 – a mere two months prior to the huge flood described below -- lists its initial incorporators as William Milnes, William Milnes Jr., John Fields and Thomas Johns, with the operation capitalized at \$1,000,000. Of particular importance, the charter states that all the land to be conveyed should be in fee simple. ⁹ All three furnaces resumed production and "new homes and shops and an expansion of the work force signaled an economic revival at Shenandoah Iron Works." However, a devastating flood known as the "Great Flood of 1870" struck the Shenandoah and its tributaries in September of that year. Damage in the area was estimated at \$100,000, and the iron works were forced to shut down. As many as sixty buildings were swept away in the flood waters including all the manufacturing buildings associated with the iron works, the store and warehouse, and some of the best residential dwellings. ¹¹ Thankfully no lives were lost.

With the energetic leadership of Milnes and the hard work of residents and employees of the Iron Works, the entire operation was rebuilt. The best description of what was put in place during the 1870s appears in Jed Hotchkiss's The Shenandoah Iron, Lumber, Mining and Manufacturing Company of Virginia – A Report, published in 1878. Hotchkiss is best remembered as one of the leading cartographers of the Civil War and as a consulting engineer was well qualified to assess and describe the Iron Works. Hotchkiss describes the improvements at the Shenandoah Iron Works as including "four large, convenient and well finished 2 ½-story mansions, one brick and three frame, one in cottage style, dwellings for the proprietors or officer and managers of the company with ... other out-buildings...cisterns, ice houses; some 20 large frame dwellings of various kinds... a carpenter and two blacksmith shops; a boarding house for workmen; a stable...the forge and refinery and their coal house... [a] large store and offices and numerous warehouses... A flying ferry furnishes means of access to the other side of the river." Hotchkiss

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mentions that the "old stack of the Shenandoah Iron-works furnace is still standing..." Hotchkiss goes on to describe a "large and handsome church...mainly built by the contributions of member of the Company on land donated by the Company to the Methodist Episcopal Church;... a school house erected by the state...on land donated by the company in which the state maintains a public school, free to all...thus affording educational facilities to the children of the operatives of the Company;" His description goes on to describe "The Farm," as "the part next to the Shenandoah River, on which the village of Shenandoah Iron Works, embracing about **Section 8 Page 90**

1000 acres [of farmland]; he cites "numerous dwellings [that have] connected to them large productive gardens. The forge itself is described as a "large and substantial frame [structure] well adapted to its purposes. From this description, albeit probably somewhat laudatory in tone due to Hotchkiss obviously having been employed by the Iron Works to prepare the report and extol its virtues, it can be determined that the Iron Works was surely among the most sophisticated and extensive iron manufacturing operations in the state. None of these structures is extant as many would have stood outside the boundaries of the historic district but the description provides a good picture of the type of building activity associated with Milnes and the iron works.

Milnes was very aware that without convenient, cheap transportation in the form of a railroad to ship the manufactured iron to markets both north and south, his rebuilt enterprise would flounder. He traveled to both Hagerstown and to Roanoke to lobby for the route of the new Shenandoah Valley Railroad to run through his Shenandoah Iron Works. ¹³ So it must have been very gratifying to him when the new rail line was begun in Hagerstown, Maryland, in 1880 and reached the Shenandoah Iron Works in 1881. Rail line spurs were constructed to link the furnaces with the main line of the new Shenandoah Valley Railroad. Milnes worked hard to get the line completed to Roanoke and the western reaches of the state. In actuality, Roanoke offered \$5000 to get the Shenandoah Railroad to intersect with the Norfolk and Western at Roanoke. Ultimately, the headquarters of the Shenandoah Railroad was moved from Hagerstown to Roanoke, completing N&W's control of the entire line. The tracks were completed to Big Lick, or Roanoke as it would soon be known, where it linked with the Norfolk and Western Railway. ¹⁴ A new telegraph line followed the railroad, thus providing vital communication with other communities and markets along the line. With rail transportation assured, Milnes borrowed \$800,000 to construct the Big Gem Furnace, the largest undertaking of the iron-operating operation, completed in 1882. It stood on the flat land adjacent to the river, just below the "Pee Dee" section of the town as illustrated in an early photograph of the area. 15 With its tall smokestacks, the Shenandoah Iron Works must have been an impressive sight on the landscape. Because Milnes owned most of the land and nearly everyone in the community

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worked for him, either directly or indirectly, the name of the town was changed on June 27, 1887 to "Milnes" from "Shenandoah Iron Works." The name "Milnes" appears on a map of the town in Lake's Atlas (1885). However, the county tax records continued to call it "Shenandoah Iron Works." According to one local story, the name change was accelerated because the postmaster felt it took too long to write "Shenandoah Iron Works." Some, according to one historian, referred to the Town of Milnes, located on the South Fork of the Shenandoah River as the "Pittsburg [sic] of the

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Valley," comparing it to Pennsylvania's large steel and iron manufacturing center located at the confluence of the Ohio, Monongahela, and the Allegheny rivers. ¹⁷

During the 1880s, following the completion of "Big Gem" and the opening of rail service, Milnes prospered. A number of new commercial operations opened, including several drugstores. Kerosene-burning lamps were installed to light some of the streets, followed in the 1890s with gas lights fueled from a new acetylene gas plant. 18 Lumbering in Milnes was a growing industry due to the demand for both fuel and building materials. A large planing mill was built with facilities located in the Pee Dee section of town from 1882-1888 and on Junior Avenue from 1888-1890. On February 12, 1884, the Virginia General Assembly granted a charter to the town of Milnes, thus officially recognizing the new named acquired for the post office two years earlier. Several large residences were built in the early 1880s in the same time period that Big Gem was completed to provide housing for furnace laborers and others associated with the Iron Works, including three residences on First Street at 202, 206, and 210 (069-5209-0001, 0002, 0033); and three houses on Second Street at 202, 206, and 209 (069-5209-0033, 034, and 0062). Also dating from this period are the J. Edins House at 705 Coverstone Lane (069-5209-0226), the E. T. Powell House at 709 Coverstone Lane, (069-5209-0227) and the house at 801 Coverstone Lane (069-5209-0310). Mr. Milnes donated land to each of the religious denominations in the town to build their churches, along with 60 acres to the railroad to build their facilities and lots on Third Street to erect a school. 19 Although none of the church buildings survive from this period, many of the denominations continue to have their sanctuaries in the town including the Fields United Methodist Church (1920), on Third Street, organized in 1868 (069-5209-0099); Shenandoah Baptist Church (1908) on Fourth Street (069-5209-0136); St. Peter's Lutheran Church (1936) also on Fourth Street, whose congregation is believed to have originated in the Naked Creek area of Page and Rockingham counties in the 1730s (069-5209-0141). In 1884, 25 members organized a congregation in Shenandoah; the present church dates to 1936. Christ United Methodist Church (1896) was built originally for a Brethren congregation (069-5209-0218); and the African American Shiloh Baptist Church built on Maryland Avenue c. 1910 next to a no-longer extant African-American school that had been

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erected in 1885 (069-5209-0265). This building is one of the only structures directly related to Shenandoah's African-American community, an important presence in the town. A school building for white children was described as having two stories with two rooms on each floor.²⁰ This school building was succeeded on the same parcel by a new school in 1916, now the Shenandoah Elementary School. (069-5209-0154).

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With the opening of the railroad to Roanoke in 1882, the future for the town of Milnes appeared rosy; however, a substantial economic Depression in 1884 forced both the Shenandoah Valley Railroad and the Shenandoah Iron Works into receivership. Ultimately, in 1890, the so-called "Shenandoah Division," formerly the Shenandoah Railroad, was acquired the Norfolk and Western and the Iron Works were operated by a number of owners under various names. Milnes had resigned as president of the Shenandoah Valley Railroad in 1881, citing his responsibilities to the Shenandoah Iron Works. Milnes was described as having "unflinchingly labored for many years to secure construction of the railroad," a measure of his broad influence in the economic vitality of the town. The town continued to thrive, however, poised for the boom years of the early 1890s. Milnes died in 1889 and is buried in the "Old Cemetery," according to the congressional directory, presumably the Methodist Cemetery in the Town of Shenandoah.

Several explanations are offered for the change in name to Shenandoah City from Milnes which took place March 8, 1890 when both the post office and the incorporated town abandoned the Milnes name. In one case it was cited that the town was known for its rabble-rousing crowds and bars and it was believed to project a better image to use the name "Shenandoah." Writing in 1915 about the name change, the town's Methodist minister, A. P. Broude said that "with the coming of the railroad came also the Bar Rooms, which demoralized the people and destroyed the good name of the place...the name of *Milnes* having become such a stench in the nostrils of the public, it was necessary to change the name."²² Another more plausible explanation was the coming of the Shenandoah Land and Improvement Company who was anxious to promote the town for settlement, trading and manufacture and perhaps to put the less happy economic times behind. The name "Shenandoah" had long been associated with settlement in the area and with its largest employer and economic engine. In a period when massive advertising was launched to promote land development, the use of a name with long association with both the iron works and the railroad must have seemed more appropriate.

Shenandoah City (later "City" was dropped from the name) was about to embark on its most exciting boom times. The Shenandoah Land Improvement Company, like many of its counterparts in other valley towns such as Buena Vista, embarked on a major land development

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program. The Company acquired substantial acreage around the town and conducted a survey of the entire corporate limits of the town; it then proceeded to lay out lots and conduct a major sale. The most impressive building that it constructed that survives today was the office for their operations, now know as the Stevens Cottage. Built in 1891, this structure served successively as a private residence and finally was acquired by the Page County Heritage Association and today **Section 8 Page 93**

houses a museum. (069-5209-0273). In the illustrated promotional booklet published by the Company, a line drawing of the Stevens Cottage is prominently displayed to attract both residents and investors. The booklet extols the virtues of Shenandoah with pictures of the elaborate Shenandoah Hotel, a somewhat stylized drawing of the N&W passenger depot which had not yet been built, and other drawings of industrial and manufacturing facilities. Promoting an inflated picture of the community, the booklet declares that the present population of Shenandoah is 1500, a far cry from the actual number of 751 in 1890 and 1220 in 1900.²³ The Company constructed a number of other buildings, including four large brick buildings on Maryland Avenue. One of these buildings was the Masonic Hall and the other the D. & J. Auto Parts, formerly a skating rink.²⁴ According to one local historian, Mr. Jake Best and Mr. Tom Beaghan bought the building known as the skating rink from the Land Improvement Company. They established a foundry and manufactured water faucets. Later, in 1907, they acquired a moving picture machine and showed movies upstairs in the building.²⁵ In succeeding years, it housed J. W. Bateman's Garage.²⁶ Neither the Masonic Hall nor the skating rink survives. However, the Independent Order of Odd Fellows, organized in 1885, and its 1903 building still stands at 119 Pennsylvania Avenue (069-5209-0286). Constructed at about the same time was a large frame hotel known as the "Shenandoah" which burned and was rebuilt; it does not survive today.

Despite more floods and several fires in the 1890s, Shenandoah continued to thrive, primarily due to the activity and expansion of the Norfolk and Western Railway. The early years following the ownership transfer to N&W were difficult for the railroad, particularly due to extremely cold weather with drifting snow. The Norfolk and Western built a board-and-batten station ca. 1895 that replaced whatever the Shenandoah Valley Railroad had in place prior to that. The depot was described in a contract with Peter Dougan and Company, dated September 4, 1895:

The siding to be of one inch pine boards of first quality laid with the verticle [sic] joints in uniform widths...roof to be sheathed with one inch pink boards...the floors to be on one inch tongued and grooved first quality clear, dressed flooring boards...the roof to be covered with "Cameret" tin, painted one coat on underside

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before laying...²⁷

An early photo of this building in 1916 shows that the contract was adhered to.²⁸ This structure did not stand for long, and was replaced with a brick depot around 1915 (069-5209-0025). Shenandoah served as a division point on the line from Hagerstown to Roanoke as it was located at mile post 105.6, just about mid-way between Roanoke and Hagerstown. It was at the division **Section _8_ Page _94_**

point that train crew changes took place. Shenandoah continues this role today. In addition to the depot, the N&W constructed a number of other railroad buildings over the next forty years. One of the most impressive that does not survive was a major round house. Illustrations show that the Round House was a dominant building in the Shenandoah train yard until after the mid-20th century.²⁹ Another significant structure built by the N&W that still stands is the Railroad YMCA building, constructed in 1909 (069-5209-0004). This facility served as a boarding house for railroad workers, and provided bathing facilities and food service. The Railroad YMCA was organized in 1893, and in its early years rented facilities to provide services to railroad workers. Membership was estimated at 500 in 1907, with daily attendance numbered at between 250 and 300. The restaurant fed 250 men on a daily basis, and the building also provided space for classes, meetings and gospel meetings.³⁰

Records indicate that a number of residents of Shenandoah (still called Shenandoah Iron Works in the tax records and census reports) were employed by the railroad as yard crew members, engineers, firemen, brakemen and clerks. Other residents of Shenandoah worked as road men, working on the rail lines between Roanoke and Hagerstown.³¹ Census records for 1900 indicate locomotive firemen, clerks, car (presume railroad car) inspectors, and teamsters. Other occupations reflect the large number of laborers associated with the Iron Works and mining, with many ore miners, stonemasons, laborers "at furnace," rock quarrymen, iron ore miners, time keepers and day laborers who may have been employed either by the railroad or the iron works. Both blacks and whites are employed by both the railroad and the furnace.³² There also appear to have been two black barbers in the town, along with house painters, teachers, physicians, carpenters and a bridge foreman. The latter suggests that there was in that year a bridge spanning the Shenandoah River, a structure that was often washed away in the many floods.

Following the closing of the Shenandoah Iron Works in 1907, due to overwhelming competition from the north and the mid-west and the shift to steel from iron, the Norfolk and Western Railway was the dominant employer and business in Shenandoah. Maps of the time period show Shenandoah as one of the primary stops along the Shenandoah Division of the N&W. From the histories of the town, one learns that the railroad workers even fielded both a baseball team

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known as the Shenandoah Indians and a basketball team in the 1920s and 30s. Their group photograph taken in 1927 shows the prominent "S" on their uniforms. Telling, as well, are the large number of photographs of various locomotive engines, special passenger cars, views of the train yard and railroad buildings, and photographs of various early railroad section "gangs." The coal tipple and water tower, along with the enormous stack at the round house were prominent **Section 8_ Page _95_**

landmarks in the small town. Through the history of the railroad in Shenandoah, photographs document railroad workers at both work and play. Along with the railroad YMCA (cited above) and the large volume of business and commerce generated by the railroad in Shenandoah, it is clear that Shenandoah was a remarkably important transportation center for the mid-Shenandoah Valley for the first half of the 20th century. The Eagle Hotel (069-5209-0019 and 0020) was constructed in 1907 and served a thriving clientele until 1937, demonstrating the demand created by the traveling public in that area. The building subsequently housed a furniture store.³⁴ An interesting story about the hotel is that an itinerant painter once stayed there, apparently in the early years of the hotel, and was unable to pay his bill. The owner, a Mr. Harris, furnished him with whiskey and in return, the painter produced remarkable murals in his room in return for his fare. As late as 1983, these murals survived, illustrating a race track, street scenes in the town, and details of trains.³⁵ Among the commercial and industrial enterprises that continued to prosper and operate in Shenandoah were an ice plant, a large flour mill, a clothing store, and a bakery. The Casey Jones Overall Factory opened in 1925, employing more than 50 people; it later became Blue Bell, Inc. U. S. Rinaca opened a large bakery in Shenandoah as well. A knitting mill was built at the north end of the town in 1938, remaining in operation until 1956. Sullivan Mechanical Contractors began operation in the mid 1940s. ³⁶ A number of bridges were erected during the period to link the east and west banks of the Shenandoah River, the most recent having been built in 1954. Remains of an earlier bridge stand just south of the present crossing. During periods when the bridge was washed out or irreparably damaged during floods, ferry service was used to provide transportation for residents of the town.

World War II was a busy time for Shenandoah and the railroad. Most of the young men went into military service. The trains were packed with troops and other travelers passed through Shenandoah, stimulating commerce for the area. "Traffic on the (Shenandoah) Division doubled" and then trebled during the war years as freight trains hauled war materials between Roanoke and Hagerstown. "By 1943, the Shenandoah line was handling six times the maximum pre-war volume of freight." Eight trains—four passenger and four freight trains—passed through the Shenandoah train yards in each direction during these years. However, following the war, with the move to more automobile travel, passenger trains saw their ridership decrease significantly and ultimately all passenger service ceased. The dieselization of railroads in 1957 was the death

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knell for most rail traffic along the line beyond some freight trains. The large roundhouse and many of the other railroad-related structures were removed. The railroad ceased to be the driving force for this tiny town. It was the end of the "largest railroad yards in the Shenandoah Valley," the end of an era.

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Just as the Shenandoah Iron Works was the impetus for the coming of the railroad to Shenandoah, the railroad in turn stimulated other industries such as the Casey Jones Overall Factory (1925) and a knitting mill (1838) as well as on-going commercial activity. Nearly fifty commercial structures constructed between 1900 and 1950 are still standing in the town. Many more were destroyed by the various fires that kept the Shenandoah Fire Department busy over the five decades. The former fire station from 1930 still stands as part of the former Shenandoah City Hall (069-5209-0070). Small industry, milling, brick making and lumbering operations all thrived because of the proximity to rail transportation and a viable population to work in them and to use their goods. A measure of the prosperity of the town in its railroad heyday is the Shenandoah Water Works Pumping Station, dating from 1908 (069-5209-0261), demonstrating that Shenandoah was among the early small communities to have a municipal water system. In 1906, a steam electric power plant was constructed to provide electricity for residents, industry, commerce and the railroad as well as street lighting. The facility was succeeded by the construction of the Power Station on Long Street, now the Alleghany Power Company structure in 1920 (069-5209-0262).

Shenandoah represents the cycle of town development with its vicissitudes from the late 19th century through the mid years of the 20th century. Transportation, either by river in the early years or by rail during the later decades of the century and into the 1950s defined the success of both its industry and commerce. Shenandoah suffered from major floods and disastrous fires, but managed to come back after all of them. Many of its buildings have survived, portraying a vivid picture of one of the most active and lively communities in the region. A measure of the energy and devotion of its residents is the remarkable collection of photographs and first hand histories of the town. Shenandoah, with its surviving plan, buildings, photographs and writings provides social historians of the future with a rich panoply of information upon which to interpret American towns centered on transportation.

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BOUNDARY JUSTIFICATION:

The Shenandoah Historic District boundaries were drawn to include the largest concentration of historic buildings in the town of Shenandoah along parts of First, Second, Third, Fourth, Fifth, Sixth, Seventh, Eighth, Denver, Long, and H streets; parts of Central, Maryland, Pennsylvania, and Virginia avenues; and part of Coverstone Lane. District boundaries coincide with property lines whenever possible. Concentrations of noncontributing buildings were excluded where possible.


