

historical physical appearance the Multiple Property delineated in Documentation Form for the Boundary Markers of the Original District of Section F, Item Columbia, in Description.

Located between the curb and the sidewalk on the east side of Russell Road just north of King Street in the city of Alexandria, Virginia, just downhill from the George Washington Masonic National Memorial, the Southwest No. 2 Mile Marker is easily seen. This stone bears no inscription, is completely flat on top, and measures 16" X 10 1/2" X 29 1/2". It is not an original marker but is of sandstone. The wrought iron fence

surrounding this marker needs repairing. One spoke has been broken off. The ground on which the marker rests is maintained well. The bronze plaque reads: ORIGINAL FEDERAL BOUNDARY STONE/ DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA/ PLACED 1791-1792/ PROTECTED BY MT. VERNON CHAPTER/DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION/ 1916. The property is owned by the city of Alexandria. The stone was surveyed on 25 October 1989 by Mrs. Richard H. Kemper and is under the stewardship of the Mount Vernon Chapter, VADAR, of Alexandria, VA.

The significance of the Boundary Markers as a group is stated in the Multiple Property Documentation Form for the Boundary Markers of the original District of Columbia, Section F, Item III, Significance. The justification of criteria and areas and periods of significance are stated in the Multiple Property Documentation Form for the Boundary Markers of the original District of Columbia, Section E, Statement of Historic Contexts.

The Southwest # 2 marker is significant because it marked the second mile on the southwest side of the District of Columbia, two miles from the South Cornerstone at Jones Point.

In both the surveys done in 1894-971 and 1906, the original stone could not be found. It was apparently placed on the east side of and very close to the Alexandria and Leesburg turnpike, on the eastern slope of Shuter's Hill, in a subdivision known, in 1906, as Spring Park, and within a stone's throw of Fort Ellsworth, built by federal forces in May 1861. When the inquiry was made in 1906, there were a number of workmen carting away loam and gravel for new The road foreman said a strange condition was known to exist there, called 'creeping down hill', a movement of the surface of the earth, which may have had something to do with the loss of the stone. In 1921, the annual report of Mount Vernon Chapter to the Virginia Daughters of the American Revolution stated that the stone was relocated and fenced in 1920. It is believed that the relocated stone was not the original stone but was the replica that stands within the fence today. Due to its size, shape and total lack of inscriptions, the stone is obviously not the original. was indicated on a 1927 aerial survey map located in the archives of the George Washington Masonic Memorial. Another source Although not indicates that the marker was there in 1929. original, this stone has marked the area of the second mile stone for approximately seventy years.

Criteria Consideration B is applied because the marker has been relocated. It is exceptional, however, because it is an integral component of this important group of rare surviving resources. Consideration E is applied because the marker has been reconstructed. However, its significance is exceptional because of the marker's close association and identification with the other resources of its type.
