DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (II known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE										

Corbin Hall is located in the northeast corner of Virginia's Eastern Shore, overlooking Chincoteague Bay and Chincoteague Island beyond. The house retains its isolated plantation setting and is approached by a mile long axial avenue through a forest and across broad level fields. The house's immediate grounds are unusually handsome and are impeccably maintained. The west, or land front, faces onto an informal park featuring a broad lawn, circular drive, boxwood and other ornamental shrubbery, and very large shade trees. The east front overlooks a series of earth terraces leading down to the water. The terraces are probably an original feature to the grounds, but the planting, walks, and steps all appear to be modern. No early outbuildings survive.

The main body of Corbin Hall is a large brick dwelling 60' 8" long and 38' 3" wide above the watertable. In general feeling it more resembles its Maryland neighbors than the Tidewater mansions of the mainland. two-story structure is covered by a gable roof with two interior chimneys at either end and a modillion and dentil cornice on each front. are laid in Flemish bond without glazing and appear to have been repointed in all areas but the decorative work. The repointing is consistent and unobtrusive, however. A brick inscribed CCT 1787 is located below the north window of the first floor on the east side, and near the peak of the gable on the north end are three bricks set in a diamond shape and inscribed with a three bladed ornament at the top, G+C in the center, and 1787 at the A rubbed brick belt course extends around the entire structure, and gauged brick arches are located above all the openings. noteworthy are the gauged brick arches above the Palladian windows on the The only significant exterior additions second story of both fronts. include a one-story frame service wing on the south end, and an enclosed brick entrance around the original stoop on the west front. The service wing was an early addition but was completely rebuilt in 1951; the brick entrance was added in the early twentieth century.

Corbin Hall's interior contains a wealth of fine paneling and other Indeed, few houses of such quality survive with as handsome woodwork. The west entrance leads into a wide stairhall with much original fabric. The stair features a molded the stair ascending in the northeast corner. handrail, slender turned balusters, scrolled end brackets, and paneled The stair hall is separated from the center hall of the west side Both halls by a tall arch framed with fluted pilasters set on pedestals. The house's principal are further decorated with paneled wainscoting. chamber, the northeast room is fully paneled and is one of the best examples of its type in Virginia. The paneling is ornamented with a Wall-of-Troy On the end wall the chimneycornice molding, and a molded chair rail. piece is flanked by fluted Doric pilasters set on pedestals. Beyond the pilasters are small doors opening into the chimney closets. The three other first floor rooms have paneled end walls but only half paneling around their The southeast room features interesting glazed closet other three sides. The second floor rooms contain much doors with round arch top panes. original woodwork, but it is more simple than that below it. Some of the second floor spaces have been altered with the insertion of bathrooms. Corbin Hall's attic is a large unfinished storage area given interest by the exposed original roof framing.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Corbin Hall is a Georgian plantation house of superior architectural quality - perhaps the best brick example of its style on the Eastern Shore. The beauty of the house is enhanced by the retention of its rural setting, with its broad prospect across Chincoteague Bay. Not only is Corbin Hall notable for its fine exterior proportions and careful brickwork details (especially evident in the second story Palladian windows), but for its superb interior woodwork and paneling, nearly all of which survives in an excellent state of preservation. The superior quality of Corbin Hall thus exhibits the high level of craftsmanship and design achieved on the Eastern Shore in the eighteenth century.

Because of insufficient documentation there has been some question of the house's date. It is reasonable to assume however, that the date 1787, inscribed in the brickwork in two places, refers to the construction date. The architectural style of the exterior would support such a date, although the style of some of the paneling is often associated with an earlier period. Assuming 1787 to be the construction date, the house would have been built by George Corbin, son of Convention and Barbary Corbin, who apparently lived on the property in an earlier house. Convention Corbin acquired the land known variously as Chincoteague Farm, Rowley Farm, and more recently Corbin Hall, in 1745 from John and Ann Potter. The property was originally part of Colonel Edmund Scarbrugh's tract of 3000 acres, patented in 1664.

George Corbin, who died in 1797, stated in his will: "To my daughter Agnes Drummond Ker my whole estate, provided she have a son, my son-in-law John Shepherd Ker call such son George Corbin, to which son I will my Chincoteague plantation Island, and swamp land." The plantation remained in the hands of Agnes Drummond Ker's descendants until 1873 when it was sold by a trustee to William P. Moore. During the remainder of the nine-teenth century and the first half of the twentieth, the property passed through various owners. In 1961, the house and five hundred acres were acquired by the present owners, Mr. and Mrs. Miur Rogers of Winnetka, Illinois. The Rogers use Corbin Hall to house part of their extensive collection of eighteenth-century English furniture.
