7. DESCRIPTION AND ARCHITECTURAL ANALYSIS:

Brexton is an interesting late-nineteenth-century, two-story dwelling located along Route 255 in the village of Millwood, adjacent to the Carter Hall property and the Greenway Historic District boundary. The property was constructed as a dwelling but was later used as a private school for young women. It is composed of three sections, all of frame construction. The main block is a two-story, three-bay, vernacular I-house with a gable roof of standing-seam metal with two interior brick flues, a plain friezeboard, and gable-end returns. Constructed ca. 1870, it features a central-passage, single-pile plan with Late Greek Revival-style interior woodwork. Clad in weatherboard and resting on a random-rubble stone foundation, Brexton has two-over-two-sash windows on the first floor, six-over-six-sash windows on the second floor, louvered wooden shutters, and a two-light transom and sidelights around the front door. The three-bay, one-story, hip-roofed front porch is currently missing, while the one-story, two-bay rear porch has been closed in.

To the south of this section and set back to the east is a two-story, three-bay, gable-roofed wing with two-over-two-sash windows. This section, which was probably added to the original block in 1882, features a large open room (now used as the kitchen) on the first floor and two rooms on the upstairs level. A one-story protruding bay with two-over-two-sash windows is located at the front corner where these two sections meet. Other exterior details include a two-light transom over the central four-panel door, weatherboard siding, louvered shutters, gable-end returns, an interior brick flue, a standing-seam metal roof, and a stone foundation.

To the rear of the original block is a two-story frame wing that is three bays deep and one bay wide and appears to have been added in the 1880s or 1890s. Family tradition suggests that part of Brexton was moved to this location from another unknown site. Although it is not possible to determine which section of the house was moved here, it appears that it may be this rear portion because of several features; a change in floor level between this section and the other two sections of the house, a window along the south wall of the rear wing that was later changed into a door to gain access to the side wing, and the difference in scale and detail in this section versus the other two sections of the house. This rear wing is not as well constructed as the two front sections, and features weatherboard siding, six-over-six-sash windows, an interior brick flue, and a stone foundation.

The property includes one contributing outbuilding; a frame meathouse/icehouse located in the southeast corner of the lot. This one-story, gable-roofed (standing-seam metal) frame building is clad in board and batten siding and sits on wooden piers. The entry is located on the front gable end and the building features a scalloped wooden vergeboard on all sides.

Brexton sits on a small wooded lot (.36 acres). Along all sides but the front is a dry-laid stone wall that is part of the stone walls that belong to the Carter Hall estate. It appears that the Brexton property was carved out of Carter Hall before the current stone wall was constructed.

8. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE:

Brexton is a fine example of a late-nineteenth-century vernacular I-house with fairly contemporary additions. The recessed side wing appears to have been used as a classroom with boarding rooms upstairs, while the original core of the house was used by the Page sisters as their residence. One of several private schools in operation in the county during the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries, Brexton is unique in that a portion of it appears to have been strictly used as a school. In addition to its historical significance in relation to the development of education in the county, the property is in fairly unaltered condition. Brexton appears to have both the architectural and historical significance needed to be added as a contributing resource in to the Greenway Historic District.

Brexton is being added to the Greenway Historic District because of the discovery of new information about its historic use. The property belonged to two sisters, Miss Mary Page and Miss Jane M. Page, who in 1882 enlarged their house with the idea of having a boarding school there. The Misses Page employed two assistants: Miss Agnes A. Walke, a graduate of Hannah Moore Academy; and Miss Evelyn P. Meriweather. According to J. E. Norris, a historian writing in 1890, "A fine school in charge of the Misses Page and known as the Brexton Female Seminary flourishes in Millwood." The school was in operation until 1903. It appears that the side wing was used as the main classroom and that boarders used much of the upstairs. Some names of students along with dates are etched in the glass of several of the second-floor windows.

Education is an area of significance discussed in the Greenway Historic District Nomination dated July 9, 1993.⁴ Several resources related to this theme are found within the district. These range in time period from the early-nineteenth to the mid-twentieth centuries and include examples of public and private schools. Brexton falls into the category of small private schools that were started in the county beginning in the early nineteenth century. The other resource of this type in the district is Clay Hill Academy (DHR# 21-17), a boys secondary school that was much larger than Brexton, and which opened in 1888 and closed in 1902. By including Brexton in the Greenway Historic District, our understanding of the history and development of education in the area is further enhanced.
