a. BACKGROUND INFORMATION: At a bare crossroads in Dinwiddie County, 12 miles west of Petersburg and two miles beyond the right flank of the thin Confederate defense line, Grant, on April 1, 1865, finally achieved the object he had pursued during nearly 11 months of campaigning against the Confederate Army of Northern Virginia. Here, in an overwhelming onslaught by cavalry and artillery, he swept aside a weak Confederate force to outflank the Confederate army and force Lee from the Richmond-Petersburg defenses.

On March 25, Lee, realizing that his position was untenable, attacked the Union siege line at Fort Stedman, hoping to break out and join Joseph E. Johnston in North Carolina. When Lee's attack failed, Grant seized the initiative and began shifting forces westward to outflank the Confederate line. Lee, unable to extend his thin line any farther, sent a scratch force under George E. Pickett and Fitzhugh Lee to Five Forks to keep the Union forces from the Southside Railroad, his last supply line。 On April 1, the Confederates were attacked by a Union force of cavalry and infantry under Philip Sheridan. The resistless Union attack swept forward to cut the railroad and force the abandonment of the Confederate defense lines.

Status: Most of the land on the battlefield is held in private tracts of varying sizes by descendants of the Gilliam family, which owned the land at the time of the war. The crossroads itself still exists, with one corner occupied by a recently constructed general store. Not far from the crossroads is the Gilliam mansion, "Burnt Quarter," built in the late 18th century and occupied by Union soldiers after the battle. Of the light breastworks thrown up by the Confederates on March 31-April 1, only a small portion remains, the rest having been destroyed by cultivation. The battlefield probably looks much as it did during the war.
b. BOUNDARIES: The Five Forks Battlefield, consisting of approximately 600 acres, is partly delineated on U.S. Geological Survey quadrangle map "Church Road" and the remainder on "Sutherland." The area consists of a 431 acre Gilliam tract, 82 acres Continental Can tract, 50 acre Miller tract, 31 acres Gilliam tract, and 5 acre Hill tract. The boundaries, when sketched on paper, gives the appearance of a high-top boot.

Route 627 runs in a north-south direction and Route 613 runs in an east-west direction through the battlefield. Also, Route 645 runs south from the junctions of Routes 627 and 613.

It may be noted that the southern boundary of the battlefield is 600 feet south of and parallel with Route 613. It may also be noted that the western boundary of the battlefield is 600 feet west of and parallel with Route 627.
