The site is in a low gap in the Allegheny Front. Low gaps were used by prehistoric people as convenient camping places when traveling through the mountains (Wall 1987). [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] The political boundary between Pocahontas and Highland Counties, later to become the state line, and recent gating by the Forest Service have broken the connection and limited access to the area. [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] Thus, the function of the site has changed little through the millennia.

Based upon diagnostic artifacts found at the site, it was occupied during at least two major prehistoric periods evidenced by a Raddatz projectile point (Justice 1987) representing a Middle Archaic affiliation, ca. 5,000 B.C. and a Greenville and a Brewerton point (Overstreet 1991) representing Late Archaic, ca. 1,000 B.C.

The site appears to be a temporary camp and lithic workshop. Large amounts of chert debitage are present on the surface and below it. A number of shovel test pits and two small test excavations indicated lithic materials up to ca. 20 cm. below the surface within an undisturbed context (Davis 1992). In addition, one test unit revealed a feature 80 to 100 cm. in diameter containing fire altered rocks, battered rocks, and charcoal. This feature represents a hearth or earth oven (Ibid 1992).

The site was originally documented in 1984 by Jan Brashler (MNF files) and was monitored in 1985 and 1988. [REDACTED]

The GW Jeep Site has integrity, a location important to commerce and transportation, and the potential to answer questions relating to the prehistory of the area. Low gaps in the Appalachians are common prehistoric site locations (Davis 1978), but the majority of these sites have been damaged or destroyed in historic times by modern roads and utility corridors which followed in many cases the prehistoric trails. This site has suffered little from such impacts.

The GW Jeep Site is an upland base camp as defined for the Monongahela National Forest by Lesser and Brashler (1987). These characteristics, large size, dense lithic material multicomponent, and subsurface features are shared with two other sites, the Greenthumb (Lesser and Brashler 1984) and Brushy Ridge sites (Brashler 1984). But the site's geographic location in a low gap at a high elevation is like a transient camp in the model. Thus, the site may be an intermediate form or may represent the mixing of different activities at different times. The extended time range of occupation (5,000 - 1,000 B.C.) and a pattern of variable densities and clustered raw materials on the site suggest the latter interpretation.

A careful study of variability across the site and further study of feature functions has the potential to reveal the activities present as well as patterns of behavior. Several varieties of non-local chert are present providing an opportunity for study of raw material movements through trade. The hearth or earth oven feature contained charcoal providing a possibility of radiocarbon dating.
