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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (II known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Mangohic Church is located at the end of state Route 638 south of The rectangular building measures 61' X 28' and is covered by Along each side of the building is an early and a steep gable roof. probably original modillion cornice. The church's walls are laid in Flemish bond with glazed headers above the water table. The glazing is more regular in the body of the building than in the gables. bond is employed below the water table, and queen closers mark the jambs of the doorways and the end windows on the south wall and the corners. Rubbed brick is used at the four corners, in the arches of all the windows, at the jambs of all openings, on the remaining parts of the arch over the south door, and along the rake on both sides of each gable. windows in the north and the three in the south have gauged brick jack arches, and the two small windows in the west wall above the gallery have segmental arches. All the arches alternate full bricks with pairs of The third window from the west on the north side is smaller than the other windows and suggests the possible existence of a great pew at one time between the pulpit and chancel.

The church contains several inscribed bricks located around the west and south doors. Over the south door is incised "1731" with either "WV" or "WY" between the "17" and the "31", while one brick near the west door appears to be "T A Brown". Another below that reads "T E Moony".

The interior has a raised chancel with a single pulpit and two doors, originally windows, leading to the church offices. These offices are located in a modern brick addition attached to the rear wall. A gallery in the west end contains what possibly are colonial floorboards. The walls are finished with late nineteenth century tongue-and-groove boards. The ceiling, which may have originally been a segmental arch, now has three planes and is sheathed with battened panels.

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STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Mangohick stands as a classic example of the rectilinear type of colonial Virginia church. Because it was built to serve as a chapel of ease, its architecture is much plainer than the larger more elaborate parish churches of the era. The building is distinguished by its fine Flemish bond brickwork with the glazed header pattern.

Mangohick Church was begun about 1730, probably as a chapel of ease, which was built for the convenience of those who lived in remote parts of the parish, for St. Margaret's Parish in King William County. takes it name from its location at the head of Mangohick Creek, a tribu-William Byrd, II, of Westover passed by the tary of the Pamunkey River. church in 1732 on his return journey and referred to it in his journal of "Progress to the Mines" as the New Brick Church. Light is shed on Anglican church practices in colonial Virginia by the fact that in 1738 Mangohick's congregation had reason to complain that John Brunskill, the paid clerk, whose duty, in addition to recording the affairs of the parish was to read the services in the absence of the minister, "...hath Neglected to perform Divine Service at a Chapel of Ease built several years agoe for the Convenience of a great number of Families living remote from the Church of said parish and refusing to preach or Read prayers there as by Law he is obliged."

Mangohick became the Upper Church of St. David's when that parish was formed in 1744, and served in that capacity until the Revolution. Apparently abandoned by the Episcopalians soon after the Disestablishment, it then became a free church for use by any denomination. Later the Union Baptist Church was organized here with both white and Negro members. The Negro congregation alone, however, has occupied the church since the latter part of the nineteenth century, but did not receive legal possession until the 1920's.
