The first definite	record of the 1s		ommers House stand	

The first definite record of the land on which the Sommers House stands appears in 1691 when the northern part of a larger tract of land was given over to Thomas Smith in order to settle an old dispute over the property between Smith's father on the one side, and Argoll Yardley and Thomas Rydeing on the other. There is no indication that a house was standing on the property at the time, and it is known that Smith's own house was located on an adjacent tract. It seems likely that the present house may have been built sometime after 1727 when Thomas Smith gave the land to his grandson, Leaven Smith. The ownership of the property throughout the remainder of the eighteenth century and into the nineteenth century is unclear. However, in 1881 the owners, James W. and Mary A. Edmonds, sold the property to a William T. Sommers. Since Sommers' occupancy, the house has been known by his name.

Despite the obscurity of its early history, as well as its unfortunate alterations and poor condition, the Sommers House survives as a very rare example of a significant architectural type once quite prevalent on Virginia's Eastern Shore. Unlike the mainland with its great plantations, the Eastern Shore was divided into many small but prosperous independent farms, and the owners of the farms took as much pride in their small houses as did the planters of the mainland with their mansions. As an example of this phenomenon, the Sommers House has the architectural quality and detail of a Virginia colonial mansion, but is actually built on an almost cottage scale.
