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In 1680, the General Assembly and Charles City County established a town at Flowerdew for the purpose of carrying out trade and commerce. In 1691, the town was described as having several dwelling houses and warehouses.

Throughout the 18th and 19th centuries, Flowerdew was owned by successive families, and many buildings were built during this time.

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STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Flowerdew Hundred Plantation is one of the best preserved and most significant archaeological localities in the United States. Thirty-five locations at Flowerdew contain approximately seventy-five archaeological sites, Indian and/or colonial. Indian occupation, revealed through house and village patterns, projectile points, pottery, etc., dates from c. 8000 B.C. to c. 1644 A.D. A large number of the colonial sites at Flowerdew date to the c. 1619-c. 1630 period. Two of these sites have been partially excavated: 1) a well-preserved stone house foundation, part of a large complex of buildings, measures 41 ft. by 24 ft., with a 12 ft. by 10 ft. offset room on one side. A large off-center H-shaped fireplace foundation is constructed of brick and stone. The house foundation is architecturally unique, as each corner is interrupted by gaps in which rectangular soil stains are present; 2) a rectangular enclosure or fortified area measures 236 ft. by c. 100 ft. Within the remains of a double-walled wooden palisade, with possible bastions at one or more corners, the remains of four or more structures, a well, and possible forge have been found. Thousands of late-16th-century and early-17th-century artifacts have been found within the enclosure, including armor, chain mail, helmet fragments, cannon balls, sword gear, cross-bow darts, early flint-locks, caltrops, a 1565 silver coin, a completely preserved leather tankard, etc.

The presence of numerous early sites and intact below-ground remains gives Flowerdew a tremendous and unique archaeological potential. The archaeological evidence will provide a rare opportunity to study, in a comprehensive way, early settlement patterns, architecture, industry and crafts, trade, social customs, and other aspects of early colonial life.
