DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

National Valley Bank is an attached, one-story building located on Staunton's main commercial street. It is constructed of granite, brick and carved limestone. The roof is flat, except for the protruding skylight.

The Bank was designed by the local architectural firm of T. J. Collins & Son and built in 1903. One of the finest Beaux-Arts designs in Western Virginia, it was based on the ancient Roman Arch of Titus. Another idea for the design may have come from Boston's Castle Square Theater which appeared in the December 1894 issue of the Brickbuilder, which was in the library of T. J. Collins & Son's office.

Using the triumphal arch form enabled Collins to respect the two-story scale of the surrounding buildings without compromising the unity of the classical three-bay facade. The imposts of the arch are developed into an entablature above the entrance. The attic story above the entablature is actually a parapet wall capped with Greek antefixae and decorated with a circular motif set in rectangular panels. The three-part classical entablature consists of an undecorated frieze and architrave and elaborately carved modillion blocks, egg-and-dart molding and dentils in the cornice.

Semi-engaged, fluted columns, of the Corinthian order, flank the central arched entrance. The large wall spaces between the columns are reduced by the use of windows topped with elaborate cartouches(in the left one is the founding date of the bank, 1865, and in the right one, the date of this building, 1903) and small, circular stained-glass windows set in raised, square panels.

The main entrance arch is decorated with egg-and-dart molding and surrounds a semicircular stained-glass window. The door frame is heavily decorated with carved panels. The original revolving door is set behind the pocket doors which are the main closures.

According to a photograph of the bank in a 1906 news magazine, the present facade appears to be totally original and unaltered.

### The Interior:

The coffered plaster ceiling was done by the Baltimore firm of J. G. Valliant & Co. It consists of 12 square panels, separated by beams decorated with a flattened leaf motif; a boss of acanthus leaves appears at each of the eight beam intersections. Each of these 12 panels is subdivided into 9 square panels. The entire ceiling is decorated with an overall honeycomb pattern overlaid with rosettes and foliated scrollwork.

#### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The National Valley Bank has been Staunton's most notable bank since its founding in November of 1865. Its founder and first president was General John Echols, who served in the Confederate forces during the Civil War. Due to the postwar economic conditions, Gen. Echols had some difficulty securing local subscriptions to his new bank and had to journey to Baltimore in search of stockholders. Here, he solicited from many prominent citizens, including Johns Hopkins and Enoch Pratt(incidentally, the Johns Hopkins Hospital was National Valley's largest single shareholder until the great Baltimore fire of 1904 forced that institution to sell out to Staunton interests). Over the years, National Valley Bank's Board of Directors has included many illustrious Stauntonians. One of the most prominent was Gen. Echols' son, Senator Edward Echols, who served in both branches of the Virginia legislature and was Lieutenant Governor of Virginia from 1898-1902. Edward Echols also served as the Bank's third president from 1905-1915.

The National Valley Bank was originally housed in Staunton at the corner of Beverley and Market Streets. In 1875, the Bank merged with First National Bank of Staunton, but the name National Valley Bank was retained. It was during the next thirty years that Staunton experienced its greatest period of growth and expansion and National Valley Bank grew along with it.

The present building is a monument to the Bank's success. Built in 1903, at a cost of about \$50,000, no expense seems to have been spared to make it a showpiece. Craftsmen were brought in from Baltimore to make the coffered ceiling. Materials used in the interior included marble, bronze, mahogany and stained glass. The furniture and fittings were brought in from Cincinnati.

National Valley Bank is one of Western Virginia's finest examples of Beaux-Arts architecture. The facade is completely original and, although the interior has undergone at least two remodelings, the upper walls, ceiling and skylight are completely intact. Most of the original marble partitions and much of the mahogany woodwork still remains. The original floor was replaced during one of the remodelings.

### 7. DESCRIPTION

The 12-panel ceiling surrounds a magnificent, domed skylight of stained-glass(approximately 10' x 34') executed in green, brown, mauve, blue and various shades of gold. The flattened leaf motif is repeated in the glass.

The three-part entablature rests on fluted pilasters with Corinthian capitals. The cornice has egg-and-dart molding and dentils, and the frieze is decorated with a foliated scroll pattern; the architrave is undecorated.

Each wall area delineated by the pilasters contains a rectangular plaster panel with a smooth oval inset. The "frame" thus formed around the oval is highly decorated with the honeycomb motif, a foliage cartouche in each corner and a rosette boss in the middle of each side. There are five panels along each of the two side walls and three on the end wall opposite the entrance. In this end wall, the central panel is wider and the oval contains the bank's original clock, which is surrounded by elaborate plaster scrollwork.

The entrance wall features the original revolving door, recessed into a solid marble entranceway which echoes the three-bay triumphal arch form of the bank's exterior. The pilasters, attic story and three-part entablature are all undecorated. Above this marble entrance, which is flanked by an office on either side, is the semicircular stained-glass window surrounded by egg-and-dart molding. The small circular stained-glass windows above the two flanking offices are surrounded by elaborate foliage plaster scrollwork.

Of the two side offices, only the President's office still retains the mahogany enclosure. Again, egg-and-dart molding occurs in the cornice line. The frieze has a fleur-de-lis design, and the pilasters have Ionic capitals and ribbon and wheat-ear drop carvings. The mirrored door also has egg-and-dart molding.

Although the interior has been remodeled at least twice, most of the material above head level is still in its original state. The major changes have been the floor and the teller cages. The original floor of hexagonal tiles has been replaced with a plainer one of rectangular stone blocks. A photo taken in the mid-1920's shows the original teller cages running around three walls in a "U" shape. Those along the left wall have been removed completely to enlarge the lobby and to grant a more spacious entranceway to the adjoining

### 7. DESCRIPTION

Trust Department(this building was also designed by the firm of T. J. Collins & Son in 1922). The remaining teller spaces along the right wall and far wall still have the waist-high marble partitions, but the elaborate grillwork teller cages are gone, replaced during one of the remodelings with much plainer grilles.

The original building had a small, rectangular service bay at the back of the main room. This bay has been remodeled and enlarged to accomodate clerical workers and a drive-up teller window.
