DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Bladensfield, an expansive frame 18th-century house with a 19th-century addition, displays both Federal and Greek Revival characteristics. The original section of Bladensfield is a significant part of the homogenous group of Georgian-plan houses which appeared throughout the Tidewater and Northern Neck areas of Virginia in the 18th century as a response to Remaissance-inspired symmetry.

Bladensfield's asymmetrical facade reflects the two building campaigns which resulted in its present form. The original portion is a typical Georgian plan. The entire structure is completely sheathed with plain weatherboards. Bladensfield stands 2-1/2 stories above its basement, and its attic space is lighted by dormers which break the roof line at regularly spaced intervals. A large gabled dormer with sidelights gives emphasis to the entrance bay of the north elevation. The building is lighted by 9/9 sash on the first floor and 6/9 on the second. Transoms crown each door, with the exception of the opening found at the west elevation. The Flemish-bond underpinning of the original portion has been carefully demarked with rodded joints. The panel chimney at the west elevation is an especially fine feature. Executed in Flemish bond, its surface is embellished with glazed headers, putlog holes, and a beveled water table. The square stack has a corbeled cap. An interior chimuey, once marking the original east end, is similarly corbeled. Remnants of glazing can be seen in each stack. The present east end is terminated by an interior end chimney. The front and rear elevations are capped by a thick box cornice with end boards. A bulkhead is located at the west elevation. To accommodate the need for supplementary space, Bladensfield was enlarged in 1854 by the addition of a two-bay schoolroom and passage to the east elevation.

The interior features Federal and Greek Revival details, which for the most part are as simply executed as the exterior details. Rooms in the original portion retain their Federal mantels, most with eared architraves. Symmetrically molded chair rails encircle the rooms. The importance of the parlor (southwest room) is reflected in its more sophisticated Federal mantel and the flat Greek Revival cornice with anthemion-like ornament which compasses the room. This same shallow molded cornice is found in the "studio" (northwest room) but without the decoration. The stair was altered in the 19th century, likely at the time of the addition. The open-string stair has an octagonal newel and a round banister with two rectangular balusters to the tread. A pedestal chair rail runs the length of the stair wall.

In 1854 the Bladensfield Seminary was established, and at this time a single-room school with a central column was added at the east clevation. This space was joined to the original structure with a passage which ran the full length of the house. This room has been divided in half; the north portion now functions as a kitchen.

With the exception of a 20th-century garage, no outbuildings are associated with this structure. It is not threatened.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE Chronicles of the early history of Virginia's Northern Neck tend to e crowded with details of the Carter family, understandably since they determined a major ortion of the area's history. Much of the significance of Bladensfield comes as a result of ts early association with this reputable family. In addition, this regional landmark contined to distinguish itself as a 19th-century seminary for the education of young women.

ladensfield is sited on land that was once part of a large tract acquired by Robert "King" arter from Robert Cary, a London merchant. In 1734 Carter's grandson, Robert Carter "the ouncillor" of Nomini Hall, Westmoreland, received the land in a division of the inheritance f his father Robert Carter "the Younger," who had died in 1732. It seems likely that ouncillor Carter built the original Georgian-plan section of Bladensfield in the late 18th entury. The name "Bladensfield" was probably attached to the land by 1790. It is likely that he plantation was named for Thomas Bladen, who had been Governor of Maryland, 1742-1747. laden was the brother of Carter's mother-in-law.

n 1790 Carter gave the structure to his son-in-law, John C. Peck. Peck had come to Virginia rom New England in 1774 upon the recommendation of Philip Fithian, tutor at Nomini Hall. eck succeeded Fithian in this position. Following Peck's death in 1794, the house and roperty remained in his family until 1847, when his surviving daughter and other heirs sold to the Reverend William N. Ward.

r. Ward was rector of three country churches, and he also founded the Bladensfield Seminary, school for young women. Resigning the ministry in 1854, Ward turned his full attention to eaching. The 19th-century addition was probably constructed at this time. According to an dvertisement printed in the Richmond Enquirer in 1855, the Bladensfield Female Academy, with r. Ward as principal, offered courses in mathematics, the classics, French, drawing, painting, usic and German, as well as embroidery, water colors, oil painting, piano and organ.

ard's daughter, Evelyn, authored a detailed chronicle of life at Bladensfield during the ar Between the States in her published memoirs, The Children of Bladensfield. The fifth eneration of Wards continues to own and occupy Bladensfield.
